I remember well, standing in a running pen on a Friday afternoon watching some hounds run while fielding the first phone call with upper management discussing the potential need to cancel events. Something that, until then, was against normal policy. That was now nearly nine months ago when our country got turned upside down. In the days and months that followed, we cancelled event after event, due to Covid-19. Most all of the World Qualifying Events that were scheduled in the preferred time of year, were amongst those.

Still, most clubs were willing to postpone and reschedule later in the summer months even though it meant much tougher conditions, in many cases, to get dogs qualified.
