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TWO HISTORIC REGISTRIES BECOME ONE Changes and Opportunities In 2024

Six score and two years ago, two different registries were serving the dog world with "working ability first" goals, and they were doing so on similar but separate planes. Both were very successful and rose to the top of their individual areas of expertise. On September 1 of 2021, those two leaders became one when UKC acquired the *Field Dog Stud Book* and American Field Publishing Company. The continued preservation of the decades of work of hunting dog enthusiasts was something worth taking a moment to celebrate. But it was time to get busy, and the work was just beginning.

Bringing together two different institutions is not an immediate nor simple process. Readers of this newsletter have felt the pain, at some level, and for your patience and understanding, we thank you. It was a challenge of the highest degree. I am excited to report that blending these two historic registries has been quite the strategic process, and the next phase is here!

Beginning January 1, 2024, the first installment of one registry serving two revered brands took place. The goal of this article is to offer the first of many introductions to come. I assure you there will be topics to address in the future that have yet to be thought of. The takeaway that I hope readers understand is that going forward, there is but one registry: United Kennel Club. UKC is committed to continuing to grow, support, and enhance both the UKC and American Field brands while continuing to carefully manage the FDSB legacy. That being said, let's look at some changes that took effect on January 1 that will be new to all customers, whether they have UKC or American Field backgrounds.

First, let's discuss event entering eligibility. Dogs previously registered by FDSB will now be eligible to be entered in all UKC events, and dogs previously registered by UKC will be eligible to be entered in American Field events, provided that other breed and age requirements are met. While I don't see a lot of dogs on the extreme end of any sport taking advantage of this, I do think it opens a lot of doors and opportunities for many owners to experience more of what the performance dog segment has to offer them. I do see some *FDSB* continental breeds trying a variety of UKC sports. I can also picture UKC-registered Epagneul Bretons showing up at American Field events. Time will tell.

Next, we need to discuss how your registration numbers will change. Two unique sets of registration numbers needed to be merged into one data system. Fortunately,

both registries use a six-number numerical system. The only difference is that UKC also uses a letter prefix to the six-number numerical identity. Ironically, the letter "F," which you hopefully identify as "Field," was available for a prefix! Since 1979, when the UKC registry was computerized (after being paper-only since 1898) until now, the letter F has gone unused as a prefix. How's that for fate? It means UKC is able to accommodate this monumental step by simply adding the letter "F" in front of your current FDSB registration number. Programmers everywhere will cuss me for calling this a simple fix, but in my mind, it could have been worse! Just remember to add an "F" in front of your dog's number in the future. It might seem like a small detail that is hardly worth relaying to you in this article - but when the credentials you carry are of such major importance to you and us, our goal is to provide you with as much transparency as possible in this landmark development.

Let's talk about the design change to your pedigree. If I hadn't mentioned this, I am very curious as to what percentage of customers would have noticed it on their own. I mean, it is a watermark in the background of the information you are concentrating on. However, since this is of historical significance, it is important to people like you and me. Did you know? All aspects of your dogs' storied lineage, from concept to paper sourcing to printing and packaging of each UKC/FDSB pedigree, occur on UKC property and are conducted by UKC team members. For the past two years since the acquisition, we have maintained the existing look and measurement of the FDSB pedigrees as they were at the time of the acquisition. Now that the combination of the stud books is complete, we are proud to offer you more upgrades and a refreshed product line. Our high-caliber equipment allows us to bring you enhancements like new sizes, superior visual elements, and a more vibrant color scheme.

You will also notice newly commissioned artwork in the background of your papers. It's similar to what has been there for years but is now a refreshed Pointer and Setter scene. What you will notice is that the background is a little less "busy." It looks great, and Pointer owners can take comfort in the fact that although I made a case to reverse the image so that the Pointer was backing the Setter, I failed in my plea.

New to UKC customers is that all pedigrees for UKC registered pointing breeds will be printed on American Field brand pedigrees. Now, keep in mind these are, for the most part, the same pointing breeds that *FDSB* has previously registered; Nothing new there. Performance Pedigrees® will feature a combination of titles, wins, progeny numbers, and other performance data, covering UKC and American Field program accomplishments.

I guess it's time to talk about pricing changes. I believe this will be good news and well received. Previously, an *FDSB* registration cost \$25 and did not include a pedigree. A registration transfer of ownership will cost \$30 and will automatically include a three-generation performance pedigree at no additional fee. There are upgrades available, such as pedigrees with additional generations of ancestry and these you will also find more affordable. For example, a registration with a five-generation pedigree with wins used to cost \$65 and will now cost \$42. Good news for *FDSB* customers, but again, the same price for all UKC customers.

Good news with litters also. UKC has a flat fee of \$34 per litter. *FDSB* previously charged \$25 plus \$2 per pup. So, your average litter of six pups will now cost \$34 instead of \$37. And you don't have to do any math! There are more perks we will get into later as time and space permit, such as each litter registration, including a puppy packet for each pup.

Perhaps the best news of all is the opportunity to submit your litter applications online beginning January 1, 2024. We have been looking forward to being able to offer this convenience to *FDSB* customers since the acquisition, and we are happy to report it is time. This also applies to single registrations, which is less of a factor for *FDSB* customers but is a great opportunity for new customers. No more stamps and envelopes! This is a service we have been offering to UKC breeders for some time, and now, with the databases becoming one, it will be an option sure to be well received by the *FDSB* community.

There will be more announcements to come as we continue to work on projects that will allow us to better serve our entire customer base. We understand that changes are not always easy, and there may be a short learning curve as you digest these changes. Remember that we are here to answer any questions you may have, and look forward to helping everyone get up to speed.

NATIONAL PRAIRIE CHICKEN SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP B G K's Luke Named Champion; Confident Nation, Runner-Up By Ed Liermann | Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin | September 24, 2023

The cover was down, entries were up, and chickens were abundant for the successful running of the National Prairie Chicken Shooting Dog Championship on the Buena Vista Grasslands that started on September 24, 2023. Summer drought restricted growth and parts of many of the courses were a little easier to traverse. We found birds on every course.

We welcomed a seasoned pair of judges for this year's running. Traveling from down south, Scott Little was accompanied by his lovely wife Lisa from Woodlawn, Tennessee, and Joe Hughes from Moulton, Alabama. Both men are well-traveled and bring a wealth of experience in handling dogs and judging championships.

The Winners

B G K's Luke, a white, orange, and ticked 5-year-old pointer male, emerged as the winner and new champion with a great forward race that covered a lot of country. He is owned and handled by Jarrett Bell of Troy, Missouri. He had a back at 6 and a back at 17. He had a nice find at 23 with all in order, and a second find at 39 where he was spotted forward standing high and tight. Several birds were flushed with all in order. Very nice! He had a stop to flush at 57 and finished the hour strong.

The runner-up was Confident Nation, a white, orange, and ticked 5-year-old pointer male owned and handled by Scott Jordan of Grant, Minnesota. He had a big, far-reaching race with a nice find at 15, all in order. He had an unproductive at 30 and a nice find at 40 with all in order and finished strong.

Temperatures were cooler than normal, with rain and gray skies throughout most days. Every field trial has a cadre of people who work tirelessly to make the trial work seamlessly. We appreciate the team effort that includes George and Anne Ihrke and Doug and Judy Reisner for helping out at road crossings throughout the day, along with dog wagon driver Gary Wolf. This is essential, especially on the blacktop roads we have to cross. Gary Wolf has been our dog wagon driver for over 20 years and takes vacation days to help us. Hard-boiled eggs at break time, especially after the first brace, is a trial tradition, thanks to Anne Ihrke and Judy Reisner for a steady supply for all to enjoy.

We value our partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and their 50-plus-year support of this event. Site manager Lesa Kardash continues a long-standing tradition of cooperation to facilitate this event. Special thanks to Lesa and other Wisconsin Natural Department of Resources personnel, including John Soergel, Joey Biebel, and Erin Grossman, for helping when and where it is needed. Our list of guests and dignitaries included Andy Lewandowski from the Wisconsin Wildlife Federation and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources officials that included Diane Brusoe, Administrator-Division Fish, Wildlife and Parks, and Alissa Kakatsch, Assistant Turkey and Pheasant Ecologist, Bureau of Wildlife management for spending the day with us.

Entries were up, and we had a great group of trialers from around the country that included John Mathys, Frank LaNasa, Doug Ray, Scott Jordan, Doug and Judy Reisner, George and Anne Ihrke, Dennis Lutynski, Chad Chadwell and Nancy Browne, Mark Johnson, Sean Patrick Derrig, Jarret and Allison Belle, Tom Hennes and your scribe Ed Liermann.

Purina has been a sponsor of this event for years. Thanks to Purina, Greg Blair, and Terry Trzcinski; we are grateful for their support. SportDOG is another big supporter of this trial, and we thank Jim Morehouse and SportDOG for their continued support.

After the completion of the Amateur Championship, it is a trial tradition to swap morning and afternoon courses for the Open Championship. This year, we were not able to do this as we started on Sunday afternoon.

CS Four Season's Gunner (Ray) and Erin's Southern Comfort (Derrig). Both dogs fast and forward. Four Season's ran a nice forward, consistent shooting dog race but didn't have a bird. Southern Comfort had a nice find at 22, with birds leaving as judge arrived with all in order. He disappeared at 50 and didn't return to judgment.

Miller's Promotional Upgrade (Ray) and Pearl Jam Nation (Jordan). Upgrade started out with a nice race and had a back at 24 and then at 34; with birds in the air and both dogs in the same vicinity, handler elected to pick up. Pearl Jam started out with a nice ground race showing in all the right places, and with birds in the air, handler also elected to pick up at 34.

Walden's Ridge Slap Shot (Ray) and Erin's Country Rebel (Derrig). Slapshot ran a beautiful, snappy race with a strong finish but didn't have a bird. Country Rebel ran a big, far-reaching race throughout the hour and finished strong to the front without birds.

Northern Confidence (LaNasa) and Skydancer Silver Spur (Lutynski). Northern Confidence ran a nice forward race, was gone a bit, and picked up at 58, not pleasing handler. Silver Spur had a breach of manners at 20 and was picked up.

Erin's Tin Lizzie (Johnson) and Sugar

Cane Express (Chadwell). Lizzie had an unproductive at 2. Moving on, she had a nice find at 15 with all in order. At 30, with birds in the air, she was moving and picked up. Sugar Cane had a nice find at 5 with all in order. He had a breach of manners at 50 and was picked up.

Luke's Gospel Reward (Hennes) and Cedar Creek Sixgun (Liermann). Gospel ran a nice race, had an unproductive at 7 and a nice find at 40 with all in order. Sixgun had a nice forward race, gone for a bit at 45, then had a find at 55 with all in order and finished going away.

Cole Fusion (Hennes) and Hard Truth (Ray). Fusion started out with a nice race with some big swings. He failed to stop on a big covey at 39 and was up. Hard Truth had a nice race with a stop to flush at 39 and a nice finish.

B G K's Luke (Bell) and Boumeester's Duramax. Luke's performance was mentioned earlier. Duramax had a nice forward race. He had skunk at 6, a nice find at 15 with all in order and was up at 30, not pleasing handler.

I'm Spartacus (Ray) and Saginaw Luke Skywalker (Johnson). Luke was scratched. Spartacus had a nice race throughout, with a find at 57, where he left with the bird and was up.

Erin's Ty Breaker (Ray) and Skydancer Triple Nickel (Lutynski). Ty Breaker made some big casts and had a nice find at 19 with all in order. Triple Nickel ran a forward race and had a nice find at 5.

Walden's Ridge Rain Storm (Ray) and Notorious Immortal (Mathys). Rain Storm hunted hard throughout the hour and had a back at 14. Immortal had a nice find at 14 with dog high and tight as birds left early. He had a nice forward race throughout.

Cottonwood Bud (Hennes) and Dakota Nation (Ray). Bud was picked up at 25, not pleasing handler. Dakota was picked up at 15, not pleasing handler.

Hatteras Rip Tide (Ray) and Confident Nation (Jordan). Rip Tide had a nice race but failed to back at 29 and was up. Confident Nation's performance was noted earlier.

Hatteras Sand Storm (Ray) and B G K's Lone Gunman (Bell). Both dogs picked up at 9, not pleasing handlers.

Reve's Royal Hawaiian (Chadwell) and Wiggins Pree Dawn Reward (Hennes). Royal Hawaiian ran a forward race and hunted hard. He was picked up at 30, not pleasing handler. Pree Dawn Reward ran a big race covering a lot of ground but was picked up at 35, not pleasing handler.

Great River Stallion (Ray). Southern Confidence was a scratch. Great River Stallion had birds on the breakaway and left with them.

Chief's Rising Sun (Mathys) and Smooth Talking (Ray). Rising Sun took in the country as it was laid out, with a nice find at 11 and an unproductive at 32. He had a breach of manners at 46 and was up. Smooth Talking wasn't pleasing the handler and was collared at 8.

Stone Church Rooster (Jordan) and Murphy's Law (Hennes). Rooster was biddable and hunted hard throughout the hour. Murphy's Law was not pleasing handler and was up at 2.

Cross Country Ryan (Hennes) and Absolute Dominator (Ray). Ryan had a find at 10 and left with the birds. Dominator had a beautiful race and hunted hard throughout the hour.

Two Spot Tommy (Ray) and Elhew Mara Jade (Hennes). Tommy ran a nice race but was up at 40. Mara Jade had a forward race with a find at 5 and an unproductive at 32.

A Buccaneer (Ray) as a bye. Buccaneer had bird contact at 4, left with the birds, and was up.

KANSAS PRAIRIE OPEN ALL-AGE CLASSIC Barshoe Forget Me Not Wins National Qualifier By Doug Meyer | Medicine Lodge, Kansas | October 17, 2023

The Z Bar Ranch and Gyp Hills Field Trial Club again hosted the Kansas Prairie All-Age over the rolling hogback prairie on the 43,000 acres of native prairie in the Red Hills of South Central, Kansas. The multiple courses are routed to take advantage of the ranch's scenic views as well as the riparian areas along the Salt Fork of the Arkansas River, Cottage Creek, and East and West forks of Dry Creek. Water was in all of the creeks this renewal as the ranch had received nearly 8 inches of rain above normal, falling in a timely manner all summer. Despite the presence of 2,000 head of grazing bison and some mowing on the courses, visibility was difficult over much of the venue. The professional handlers and dogs were challenged to stay in contact with each other and still show an all-age race. Most of us have never seen Indiangrass, Little Bluestem, and Big Blue as rank as the cover this year. Ah...but the Bobwhite quail were there in force. The third-place dog, Westfall's Mandalay, pointed a covey early in the brace, and Andy Daugherty flushed 20 birds right in front, with another separate covey of over 20 flushing behind the dog 30 yards away. All the coveys pointed or moved were robust, showing just how rainfall benefits wildlife in the more arid ranges.

Barshoe Forget Me Not, a pointer female handled by Allen Vincent, was in a hurry everywhere she went, nailing a covey of birds in the created wetland on Course 2 right after she entered one of the feed strips planted for all the Z Bar wildlife. This came at about the 45-minute mark, and "Patch" then showed a driving race through the rest of that country and out onto the prairie beyond. Vincent wisely kept her in check along the west side of Cottage Creek even though she was jumping to take off despite the warm conditions and heavy cover. When Allen let her go, her finish was fast and strong over the hill ahead. The race, find, and endurance was a no-brainer for judges Dr. Buck Neil and Jon Humphrey, who named her first place.

Ramblin Rivers Unplugged, a pointer female handled by Brian Gingrich for owner Bill Stapleton, in their first trip to the Z Bar, ran a strong race through the native prairie on the second hour. Her run in the hot part of the first afternoon was impressive as she was driving the whole way in her always-forward race. Unplugged made good casts when afforded

an edge or spotting an objective far to the front. Despite not pointing birds for this effort, the judges put her up for second place after the impressive all-age ground performance. Good judges in an all-age stake know the importance of proving a dog's credentials on the ground through speed, drive, hunting the objectives, and endurance. Unplugged was all of that in the conditions.

Westfall's Mandalay initially ran a very strong race in the morning cool across the prairie with a find at 20 on a very nice covey. While Andy Daugherty flushed his birds, a second huge covey exploded from the native grass cover behind the dog, slightly unnerving Mandalay, but all was in order. His race was strong and forward until we entered the Salt Fork bottom, and Daugherty chose to keep a close handle on him until getting through this very tight section. When turned loose afterward, the dog had shortened, detracting from what likely would have moved second place.

Another dog in the mix was pointer male Big N Wild, for handler Matt Cochran. Big was busy hunting the country in a controlled manner. He had an unproductive early, an STF on a big covey after a nice cast along the edge of Cottage Creek, and then scored a good covey find at 40. Big then dove into the wide creek bottom along Cottage and was absent, with both scout and later handler coming back to search the woolly confines. Big popped out at the front without handler about 15 minutes later to actually record a strong finish. The judges weighed his effort long and hard for third place but ultimately chose the other dog for third. It was a good showing, especially in terms of hunting the country and his finish. Texas Wild Rex, a pointer male for Vincent, was lost after an excellent ground effort and a good find. Disappointing but easy to have happened in the cover conditions this year.

Other dogs in the 18-entry stake included Mayfield Storm Charger (Vincent) and Reed's Yellowstone (Cochran), who were both picked up by handlers on the sunny, warm first afternoon. Firefly's Invictus (Vincent) and Westfall's Power Trip (Daugherty) were both picked up about 45. Sandridge Big Iron (Vincent) was braced with the second-place dog and ran pretty well but was leashed at 50 after an unproductive. Texas Wild Rex (Vincent), braced with Mandalay, was strong on the ground with an excellent find, only to be lost around 30 minutes with the tracker required. Dream Chaser (Daugherty) was lost off breakaway braced with Big N Wild. Wynona's Nickleback Sugar (Vincent) had owner Bruce Sooter riding in support, braced with former winner Westfall's River Ice. Sugar had an unproductive at 10 while running a race that maintained good contact with her handler and finished the hour without game. River Ice had a find at 18, but the tracker was required late in the hour. Worsham's Spitfire (Joe Worsham) and Westfall's Pioneer Pete (Daugherty) were picked up in the heat; Spitfire at 40 and Pete at 25 after recording an STF on Bobwhites earlier. Dunn's True

Reign (Vincent) and Westfall's Wheels Up (Daugherty) were lifted early. Westfall's True Grit was scratched due to torn pads and would have been braced with the first-place dog.

Despite the heavy cover, warm conditions, and only one cooler morning to run, we moved a surprising number of birds. Scouts and gallery all rode up birds fairly frequently, and we moved four additional coveys in the Derby stake, which was run on a separate continuous course area on the first morning. I was pleased and will try and determine a good place on the schedule for an amateur club trial this spring. Hoping the bison and some winter precipitation help to lower the warm-season grasses a bit.

Notes on Barshoe Forget Me Not

Allen Vincent picked up "Patch" as a small puppy from a litter bred by yours truly. She was precocious and had the opportunity to go north at 7 months to knock and chase sharp tails in the Columbus, North Dakota environs. She was probably Allen's strongest derby prospect the next summer, and he requested Lee West's daughter to use the Barshoe prefix on her registered name; it was granted, and the winning began. She made the season-ending Derby Invitational and had other major circuit placements before winning this qualifier to take a big step to Grand Junction.

Thanks to club officer Joe Worsham for handling the marshaling as I was laid up (again) and forced to the dog wagon. We also had a brand-new tent this year provided by the AFTCNJ, which was a crowning touch.

The Garden State Open Shooting Championship had a great entry of 32 top shooting dogs. The birdwork this year was breathtaking, with enormous covey rises at numerous places on finds throughout the course. Taking the championship this year was Harbor City Sure Shot, a white and liver pointer female owned by Richard Gillis of Minnesota and Karen Lordi of Tabernacle, New Jersey, and ably handled by Matt Basilone. "Sadie," as she is called, scored six finds with her usual high head-on-point style. Her winning performance came from the 15th brace overall, which ran at 1:40, the first brace on

Thursday afternoon. Her race was strong to the front throughout the hour—a very good effort to gain the judges' nod this day.

Welcome weather conditions for Southwest Florida greeted our first trial of the season. Sure, there were more mosquitoes than quail, but Joe Hicks was keeping count, and we had a good show of 13 coveys for the All-Age and Derby. Not all the birdwork was stellar, and not all the quail were under the dogs' noses, but there were plenty of birds around. As always with wild birds, they will try to sneak away when possible, and it was noted that a dog might point in one direction, and the birds were making a loop and putting on their track shoes, giving the dog the old "run around." Thankfully, the grounds were dry where needed, with plenty of water for the dogs.

Many thanks to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FFWC) for having the grounds so presentable, including the feed plots and burn and timbered areas. Landmarks for the last 70-plus years look vastly different to the benefit of those with all-age dogs. The courses, while marked, had not been driven on during early training, and a keen eye was needed for marshaling in some areas. That said, the helpfulness of all was so appreciated as we kicked off our season in typical "big field trial family style."

As mentioned earlier, while plenty of birds were seen, not all the birdwork was stellar due to wily birds, even with some very experienced dogs, and conditioning was a factor for other entrants, as expected for the first trial of the season. The first and last braces of the day had more favorable scent and temperature conditions, while the late morning and mid-afternoon entries were recognized for their fortitude and ability to keep a solid run going. The judge's decisions were well placed, and we thank them for their time in the saddle accommodating our first trial.

The Winners

Trey called point at 20 minutes, where both dogs were standing once again. Birds flushed for both divided finds. Jake continued his race with a relocation at 28 minutes. The handsome male pointer ended his impressive winning brace with his last classy find at 34 minutes and a sizeable covey up.

The second-place winner was "Cuz" and handler Tommy Rice Sr. Cuz ran in the first brace Saturday morning, bringing the Open Shooting Dog stake to a close. The 79th renewal of the Grand National Grouse Futurity brought grouse trialers from all over the country to the beautiful Gladwin field trial grounds in Michigan. Thirty-three dogs were entered to run starting November 5. The support that breeders have shown for this Futurity is truly humbling. Year after year, they take the time to nominate litters, pay fees, and educate puppy buyers on the importance of a futurity. That very importance can't be overstated, and that is bettering the breeds. I think all would agree that the setter and pointer lines that run in grouse trials have steadily improved throughout the years.

Good breeding practices and trials like the Grouse Futurity play a big role. It pays to buy a pup from a good breeder, and it doesn't matter if you are a field trialer or just a grouse hunter; the breeders that support this Futurity are the best place to start looking for your next pup.

It takes an army to run a trial like this properly, and the people of Michigan came out in force; there were so many who helped it would take half this report to list them all, so please forgive me for not naming everyone. Just let me say they went above and beyond to make this trial

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Grand National Grouse Futurity secretary, I was unable to attend this year. Brian Ralph stepped up and took on the secretary's duties for the two days. He is also secretary of the Grand National Grouse Championship, so he had his hands full for the entire week but added more to his plate without hesitation-a big thank you to Brian for doing this. No trial at Gladwin would be right if Bryan Wood weren't at the line announcing each brace. Woody made sure every breeder, dog, and handler got the acknowledgment they deserved. Veteran field trial participants and judges Bruce Minard and Craig Merlington were in the saddle to watch this batch of derbies. Both men gave every dog their attention, and their decisions were just how everyone had them. On behalf of the Grand National, thank you to Craig and Bruce for looking over this crop of derbies and doing so in a way that everyone enjoyed the experience.

Twenty-eight grouse were seen within 20 yards or less of the course during the two-day running. Unfortunately, they proved to be a challenge to get pointed. The judges had eight dogs in reserve they could have used and commented on how bright the future looks for all of them. Mac Sullivan, a setter male bred and owned by Leeann Parnell and handled by Michigan pro Tammy Chaffee, took home 4th place honors. Mac's sire is the legendary Ch. Ponderosa Mac, and no doubt, he is carrying on the legacy that he created. He ran in the second brace with Tammy handling and making sure he showed and checked all the right spots. He was always forward and off the bell at times, but Tammy could gather him when needed. He was unable to get a bird pointed and called back to the bird field to point one.

Third place went to Jewett's Creek Oakley, owned by Jeff Sullivan and bred by John McKellop III. She is out of John's winning female, Grouse Trails Warrior Cat. Oakley ran in the 12th brace and did so with purpose, always hunting and checking the right type of cover where grouse and woodcock live. At times, Oakley ran to the edge and off the bell but was never gone long. Birds were seen but didn't give her an opportunity to get one pointed. Her ground race and application earned her a trip to the bird field, where she had great manners and took home the yellow ribbon.

Second place was Scottland Ponderosa Belle, owned by Scott and Lori Johnston, bred by none other than Bryan Wood, and handled by New York pro Scott Forman. Woody is a longtime supporter of the Grouse Futurity, and you can always count on one he bred being in the mix. Belle is another Ponderosa Mac offspring and again adds to the legacy of a very special dog. Belle ran with speed and style, attacking the course with vigor. She stopped and started twice, trying to get a no-doubt spooky grouse pointed, and on the last stop, a grouse lifted with Scott firing, all in order. This performance earned her the red ribbon, and she will be another one to contend with on Scott's string of dogs.

First place was won by Mohawk Mill Miss You, bred by Gary Winall, owned by Bill McFadden, and handled by Rhode Island pro John Stolgitis. You may recognize both the McFadden and Winall names. Bill is a longtime supporter and enthusiast of grouse trials, with many winning dogs attached to his name. He recently got back into it and called John Stolgitis to help him get a dog and back on the winners' podium. Gary Winall is one of the most successful amateur all-age handlers of our time, but he also breeds and develops all his own dogs. Although the Mohawk Mill prefix is not usually attached to a grouse trial dog, Gary has excellent wild bird dogs, and they have no issue adapting to the cover grouse trials present. John Stolgitis has an impressive win record in grouse trials and this Futurity. The combination of a good owner, breeder, and a handler at the top of his game was no doubt the contributing factor in Miss You's big win. Through her sire, Mohawk Mill Big Stuff, and dam Mohawk Mill Dolly, she goes back to 19x Ch./19x R-U Ch. Chasehill Little Bud, who John famously owned, developed, and had unbelievable Miss You's with. success early development can be credited to Winall and his special touch with puppies and derbies. She was cut loose in the second brace, and at the 11-minute mark, her bell stopped,

and a grouse quickly lifted, Stolgitis firing and collaring his charge. The longer the brace went on, the better Miss You got. She ran with speed and style and seemed to sense the prestige of being on the big stage, which added to her strong finish.

This trial would not be what it is without the breeders who nominate litters, so again, thank you for your support of the Grouse Futurity. Nestlé Purina and our rep Greg Blair provided generous amounts of Purina Pro Plan to the winners. On behalf of all Grand National Grouse members, thank you, Greg and Purina, for your unwavering support. The trial drew 37 dogs, making for 20 braces, with three being bye-dog braces. Alan Atkins and Roger Key of Auburn, Alabama, took the task of judging the hopeful entries.

The Running

Brace No. 1: Miller's Heat Wave (PM/ Mike Tracy) and Proof Nation (PM/ Tommy Rice) took the line. Miller's Heat Wave had a find at 20, with a strong race, and had a back at 38. Proof Nation had his first find at 6 and his second at 38. Both dogs finished the brace.

Brace No. 2: Oahe Buck (PM/Tommy Rice) and Miller's Extreme Heat (PM/

Mike Tracy). Oahe Buck finished the brace with no birdwork and a strong race. Miller's Extreme Heat had an unproductive find at 18 and was picked up at 38.

Brace No. 3: Bittersweet War Cry (PM/ Mike Tracy) and Sedgefields Get Back John (PM/Squire Lee) took the line. Bittersweet War Cry had his first find at 8, his second find at 22, and his third and final find at 38, finishing the brace with a strong race. Sedgefields Get Back John had a back at 8 and finished the brace.

Brace No. 4: Miller's Stray Bullet (PM/ Clay Ferguson) and Faithful (PF/Tommy Rice). Neither dog finished the brace.

Brace No. 5: Raag's Rich and Rare (PM/ Mike Tracy) was up against Panther Creek Rosie (PF/Tommy Rice). Neither dog finished the brace.

Brace No. 6: South Point Hog Wild (PM/ Mike Tracy) and Erin's Tough Grit (PM/ Tommy Rice). Both handlers asked for the tracking devices at the 10-minute mark.

was picked up at 25.

Brace No. 19, the second bye-dog brace, had Elhew Independent (PM/Mike Tracy), who did not finish the brace.

The Texas Open Shooting Dog Championship has found a home in Conway, Arkansas. Dog fees are collected by the local sportsmen and used to enhance the grounds. Having quality field trials helps make that possible. We released 4,600 quail in mid-September, filled and serviced 100 fee sites, installed waterers during the drought, and mowed travel lanes through heavy cover. All this effort significantly improved the area from last year. Our future plans with AG&F approval are adding back food plots.

This is the first major trial of the season for the area. We averaged moving 10 coveys per day, not single coveys. Covey size was 15-30 birds each. Birds were distributed evenly through all courses, morning and afternoon. Every course provided handlers an opportunity to show their dog on game. That's the first time we could say that in a long time.

The Texas drew 48 entries, of which there were 42 pointers and six setters. Seven professional handlers and one amateur competed. Upfront's Southern Star, a pointer female handled by Shawn Kinkelaar and owned by Lance Schulz, ran in the ninth brace on the third course in the morning. She was turned loose with her bracemate at the Oak Tree, heading west towards the Nursery Pond. Her first find came at the 30-minute mark along the lake edge, a huge covey with manners in order. She left there with a renewed purpose, digging in the country looking for quail. Her next find came at 40, between the Nursery Pond Road and Darnell's crossing—another perfectly located covey with impeccable manners for the flush and shot. Roo laid down a performance that would not be topped and would be named champion, her 10th.

Wynona's Nickleback Sugar, а setter female handled by Allen Linder and owned by Bruce Sooter, captured runner-up honors. Sugar ran in the 17th brace, starting on top of the mountain heading east. Her first piece of work was a covey find on the side of the hill just west of Dead Horse Curve. She left there at a brisk pace, hunting and showing to the front. Between Dead Horse Curve and the next gravel road, Harold Woodard had a horse wreck. Fortunately, Harold will be fine, but I had to depart the gallery to take his horse in while Harold rode the dog wagon to the clubhouse. I rejoined the field trial at the 50-minute mark to watch

the finish. The setter was still hitting the ground hard, hunting every jump. At the 45-minute mark, Sugar had her second find. The judges felt Roo bested Sugar's ground effort.

The judges made certain that I mentioned Touch's Steely Dan, a pointer male handled by Virgil Moore and owned by John Van Horn, and Thunder Bolt's Storm, a pointer female handled by Shawn Kinkelaar. Both dogs had two finds each and strong ground efforts. The judges deliberated for some time on runner-up before picking out Sugar.

ate-season trials in New England ∠can be tricky. The weather can leave you at any minute, and you can end up knee-deep in snow. The one predictable hazard is daylight hours. Any time after the end of October, you can only count on nine hours of running time. That's only 18 braces if you only have a single course. Fortunately, we have two courses we can run simultaneously, so that can nearly double our runnable hours and braces. The other unpredictable hazard, especially here on our grounds, is the birds. Yes, we put out plenty of quail to assure an even trial, but also, this is a state pheasant stocking site; then, with Cape Cod's milder winters, woodcock too can usually be found. Woodcock, pheasant, and quail. Oh my! Young dogs, beware.

Despite all these possible drawbacks, nothing but blue skies and smiling dogs were found here that Sunday. The entries were a bit light. We had ordered 75 quail for the day and put them all out. There were quail everywhere on the courses. Since the entries were light, I kinda figured we'd have a relaxed running.

Thanks to all the judges. I had more volunteers than I could use, and everyone I asked agreed to judge on the spot. That takes such a load off any trial chairman. Thanks to Purina and U. S. Complete. The Purina coupons are a great bonus to us

The history of the Quail Championship Invitational is rich with exceptional dogs and people. With the inaugural running held in December of 1940 in Albany, Georgia, albeit a 22-year break and a change in venue, to the 60th running held in November of 2023 in Kevil, Kentucky, the performances never cease to amaze and excite those who love a good bird dog.

With a points system in place, the club invites the top 12 performers to Paducah, Kentucky, to compete on the West Kentucky Wildlife Area Management grounds. The format would be the same as the '41 and '42 events. The dogs would compete in one-hour heats on successive days in the qualifying series. Then the dogs called back on the third day would run for two hours in the final series. Currently, the Invitational is the only championship that requires a four-hour performance in a three-day period.

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The winner of the Quail Championship Invitational must demonstrate the requisite qualities of the all-age class at a high level. The Invitational winner must:

* Hunt boldly and independently throughout—should not require excessive direction from the handler,

* Demonstrate qualities of the finished dog by consistent coursing to logical objectives, responsiveness to the handler, and maintaining a forward pattern, * Exhibit strength, courage, and an unquenchable desire to find game regardless of cover conditions—not simply choosing the easy path but hunting through habitat likely to hold game,

* Exhibit style, speed, and stamina in action,

* Handle game correctly—locate and point quickly and accurately using body, not ground scent, back without caution, be steady,

* Demonstrate extreme character and finish around game—style, intensity, location, and polish—must not show softness or apprehension.

The Quail Championship Invitational seeks to identify the epitome of the open all-age class of dogs, an individual with strength, courage, intelligence, and character at the highest level. A flawless performance of pedestrian quality should not be favored over one that, although imperfect, thrills with the magnitude of the effort. Above all else, the Invitational seeks to identify the endurance performer. If the judges are, to any extent, uncertain of the ability of an individual to continue at an all-age level of performance, then that dog should not be recognized as the Invitational champion.

The horses were feeling the cool air all around and danced with anticipation for the event of the day. We began at the clubhouse at 7:30 with a reminder of the rules and the introductions of the judges and marshals. We had a moment of silence for the ones who had gone before us as the dogs yapped on the dog wagon. Mary Sue Schalk, the trial chairman, blessed us with a prayer, and then we were off to the starting line. The two dogs were Miller's Speed Dial, run by Randy Anderson, and Barshoe Forget Me Not, run by Allen Vincent. The judges decided they were ready when the handlers were. With a whistle, both dogs shot out of the front, running hard and straight on course. The handlers continued on the mowed path as both scouts mounted their horses and rounded to the right to try and get an advantage to see where the dogs traveled. At 20, Speed Dial was found on point to the left of the course. Speed Dial was buried deep into a brush pile with his tail standing high. Randy dove in to flush the birds. Anticipation grows as Randy tries to navigate through the tightly packed brush. He decides to find his way out and relocate Speed Dial. No birds were found, and Speed Dial was taken on to run a good race, and no more finds. While Speed Dial was on point, Forget Me Not had hit his edges immediately with his nose inches from the ground. Forget Me Not had a find simultaneously to Speed Dial, just before the first creek crossing on the left, and birds were found. Forget Me Not came into the Handicap Lake field and immediately hit the edge, nose to the ground, in search of birds to show off his skills. We hit 3 minutes to go just as we crossed the railroad tracks. Scouts and handlers went right and came back for a successful pick-up time at time.

After coffee and a few far-fetched stories

were told, we got back on to start the second brace. This time, we had Bonner's Bulletproof, run by Randy Anderson, and Haney's Storm Warning, run by Chris Cagle, going against one another. Both dogs began the race, running big. Bonner's Bulletproof was gone for 15, came back with a vengeance to find some birds. He ran hard to the front, hitting his edges. He was gone again and was later found hunting the rows of the power line field. He had a find at 56, and he stood as Randy got off, and the birds flew immediately. Storm Warning expressed his all-age abilities. He had been gone for a while, and then the gallery was able to see him back on the powerline field, making a big swing to stay on the course. The judges called time, the dogs were picked up, and the gallery meandered over to hear some more lies and stretch our legs. The sun was getting higher, and the sun was baking down harder, making the cold feel much more bearable.

The third brace before lunch began with Erin's Code of Honor, run by Luke Eisenhart, and Game Heir, run by Fred Corder. Both dogs rolled through the sunflower, making for a beautiful all-age cast. Game Heir had a find, and birds flew. As we all rode through the powerline field, the scout behind the gallery called point. Everyone was shocked; no one had seen him for a while, and we all had ridden by him on point. Luke came back and flushed, and birds flew. You could hear their wings flapping, making a rush of wind. Code of Honor had another find at 17 right off a finger of the woods in the field. He stood beautifully, carefully watching and waiting for the covey to boil out at any minute. He was right, and the covey sure did boil from what seemed right out of the ground. Code of Honor was taken on and had another find at time, and everything was in order. On the third and final day, he will be named champion.

As we got fresh horses and our bellies full, we rode to the line to start the second half of the day. With the sun out, the day was still comfortable. The fresh horses stood at the starting line to soak in the warmth of the sun. The fourth brace of the day consisted of Erin's Wild Atlantic Way, run by Luke Eisenhart, and Miller's Blindsider, run by Jamie Daniels. Atlantic Way had a find before the creek and had his nose pointed at the ground as if showing exactly where the birds were. Birds flew, and he stood. He was taken on but may have shown his all-age genes too well, and Luke ended up picking up the tracker. Blindsider had a big race. He stayed to the front and was seen occasionally on the edges of the next field. He had no birds that the gallery nor judges could see. We concluded the brace and settled in for a

break while the next handlers retrieved their dogs from the wagon.

With Touch's Fire Away, run by Randy Anderson, and Miller's Heat Advisory, run by Judd Carlton, on the line, the brace began with a whistle and the faint "beeps" of watches starting their stopwatches. Fire Away had been out hunting and was found on point. Randy went to flush and found a dead quail under Fire Away's nose. Fire Away had another find at time of 40 right into the power line field with his head perpendicular to his body. Randy had a hard time finding the birds, so he relocated Fire Away. He pointed again, but no birds were found to flush. Heat Advisory made big casts in every field. He had a huge race that may have cost him to have been gone too long.

As the sun was getting closer to the tree line, the last brace of the day began with Nighthawk's Rebel, run by Luke Eisenhart, and Erin's High Note, run by Judd Carlton. Rebel had a fast find in the powerline field by a lone tree. Birds were flushed; they flew up and made the trees look as though they were full of leaves again. At the sunflower field, Rebel took a hard left and hit the edge running. High Note ran a big all-age race and hunted the perimeter of every field in hopes of finding hidden birds. He was successful at 55. He stood like a sculpted statue as a quail traveled around his head. This was the end of day one. Everyone went home to begin their speculations on who would be named the champion.

Sunday, November 26, 2023, started with a downpour, and the temperature dropped from the day before. As everyone says, it wouldn't be the Invitational without some kind of weather. Everyone geared up in their warmest and driest rain gear to see the six best dogs perform on day two. With the rain coming down and the harsh wind threatening to make us colder, we started day two with another blessing from Mary Sue over us and Erin's High Note, run by Judd Carlton. High Note had a find at the handicap lake field, which was successful with birds. High Note had a great all-age race and showed just why he was qualified to be there.

Anderson, and Miller's Blindsider, run by Jamie Daniels, started our second brace of the second day. Blindsider had a find with birds that flew straight over his head. After his find, he showed his all-age qualities too well and Jamie was forced to take the tracker. Fire Away had a successful back to Blindsider's find. Fire Away later had a find in the high line field. He stood great as the birds were flushed. He had a good race, ran his edges, and responded when it mattered the most.

Touch's Fire Away, run by Randy

Miller's Heat advisory, run by Judd Carlton, ran too big and had to be found via tracker in the third brace before lunch. Nighthawk's Rebel, run by Luke Eisenhart, had a great all-age race but had no luck finding birds.

The rain went away over lunch, and that cool breeze came to stay. The sun never made an appearance, making that cool breeze more vicious. Bonner's Bulletproof, run by Randy Anderson, and Erin's Code of Honor, run by Luke Eisenhart, stood shivering at the starting line. Some say it was the nerves and excitement causing them to shake, while others claim it to be the brutal weather that was bestowed upon us. Code of Honor had a find right after we crossed the road, and the birds were home. He exemplified his all-age qualities with his race. Bulletproof had a successful back to Code of Honor's find. Bulletproof had many big, wide casts, coming back just at the right times.

Up next for the fifth brace of the day was Barshoe Forget Me Not, run by Allen Vincent, and Game Heir, run by Fred Corder. Forget Me Not hit his edges hard and kept running. He had a find at the time of 41, and birds flew as Allen flushed them up. Game Heir had a find at 24 with his eyes fixed on the ground where a dead quail was found. Game Heir ran big, and Corder decided to pick him up early.

The last brace of the day consisted of Haney's Storm Warning, run by Chris Cagle, braced with Miller's Speed Dial, run by Randy Anderson. At the time of 13, Speed Dial had a find. The course goes straight, and Speed Dial was on the left frozen with a flagpole for a tail and facing exactly where the birds were. The birds were flushed, and he stood frozen, watching them fill the sky. As we entered the pond field, Speed Dial was on point, and birds flew. Storm Warning had a successful back to this find, and he stood tall with style. Speed Dial had another find right after the pond field, and he stood as if paralyzed as the birds flew. We finished the day just about frozen. The dogs were loaded, and the gallery went to the barns as the judges discussed their decision for the

last and final day.

Everyone gathered at the clubhouse for Mary Sue to receive the official paper from the judges reading who the callback dogs would be. Once everyone was there, she read Barshoe Forget Me Not, run by Allen Vincent, and Code of Honor, run by Luke Eisenhart, for the first brace. For the second brace, it was Erin's High Note, run by Judd Carlton, and Bonner's Bulletproof, run by Randy Anderson. The standby dogs were Nighthawk's Rebel, run by Luke Eisenhart, and Speed Dial, run by Randy Anderson. We all went home that night to try and get some sleep before the final day.

The final day had come. The gallery's breath left hanging in the sky at the starting line as the crowd buzzed with anticipation. Who would be the best of the best? Who would be the champion? At the line was Barshoe Forget Me Not and Code of Honor. They were off at the chirp of a whistle. Both dogs blew out the front end, Forget Me Not showing her all-age abilities too well and cost him. Vincent picked up his tracker and went to find his dog. Code of Honor kept on rolling to the front. He had a find at 33; birds flew, and he stood as they toppled over him.

At 1:42, Code of Honor had another find just before the powerplant fields. Quail decided to make an appearance, and Code of Honor welcomed them as he stood with his feet planted. Time was called, and Code of Honor was on point. His tail still standing tall and strong after two hours of a pure all-age race, he was rewarded with a covey of quail flocking over him. He had a great all-age race and the edges in search of quail very well. He stuck to the front and only checking in when necessary. A gutty performance over the course of three days, this is who the 2023 Quail Champion Invitational judges would name champion.

The second brace was run by Erin's High Note and Bonner's Bulletproof. Bulletproof had a nice find at 9 and was backed successfully by High Note; there were birds flushed. Bulletproof took a cut and was unseen for a while; he came back two fields after we had last seen him. He had a find at 1:01, and the birds were far ahead on an edge. At 1:07, the two dogs had a divided find. Birds were found. Bulletproof had a nice race and seemed to be hunting every time he was visible. This is the runner-up champion of the Quail Champion Invitational of 2023.

Chairman Schalk graciously concluded the Invitational for 2023 with appropriate thanks to many and then announced our new champion, Erin's Code of Honor, owned by Allen Linder and handled by Luke Eisenhart, scouted by Judd Carlton. Named runner-up champion was Bonner's Bulletproof, owned by Chris Cornman and handled by Randy Anderson, scouted by Eddie Berendzen.

Another great test on tough grounds produced a memorable field trial. As always, many memories were made, stories told, and connections made.

A field trial is a great game that cannot be permanently won or lost, only played. It is a test...

KENTUCKY QUAIL CLASSIC Haney's Storm Warning Wins Classic By Mary Sue Schalk & Joe Hopkins | Kevil, Kentucky | November 28, 2023

The 2023 Kennucky Kenne All-Age and Derby stakes were The 2023 Kentucky Quail Classic held on November 28 and concluded mid-afternoon on December 1. As with tradition, the trial ran immediately following Quail Championship the Invitational. thus retaining some Invitational competitors along with other top dogs from those handlers choosing to stay for the event. Thirty-five dogs were drawn for the Kentucky Quail Classic, one English setter to the 34 pointers. The Derby stake also had a solid draw of 16 pointers.

Joe Hopkins of London, Kentucky, and Allen Dunbar of Oconto, Wisconsin, judged both the All-Age and Derby stakes over the course of four days. Both men are accomplished in their own right in the field trial world and are promoters of the sport. Hopkins, a staple in the National Bird Hunters Association, has recently started a podcast and, through this venue, is promoting the sport in a big way! His enthusiasm, wit, and great communication skills make for pure entertainment. In his free time, he is a strong competitor both in walking and horseback stakes with

his small but mighty string of English setters. A positive addition to any field trial event, Hopkins gave full attention to all participants, and his efforts were much appreciated. Dr. Dunbar, who prefers to be called Allen, is well known for his performance as a veterinarian in the sporting dog world. His contributions to injury repair and rehabilitation are immeasurable, especially to those personally affected. He, like Hopkins, is also a strong competitor, primarily in horseback shooting dog stakes. His Grouse Feather moniker is familiar to most who follow the sport, and his English setters are a force to be reckoned with in competition. A diligent analyst, Dunbar rode forward and gave all competitors his full attention from beginning to end.

Throughout the week, each day's running started promptly at 7:30 a.m. Alan Benson handled the dog wagon responsibilities, as well as ensuring lunch was provided for participants. Mike Crouse rode as front marshal when he was not competing, and Mary Sue Schalk also helped marshal. The West Kentucky Field Trial Club appreciates the time of volunteers to help the week run smoothly.

The Winners

Haney's Storm Warning required little to no handling for a majority of his bid for owner/handler Chris Cagle Sr. An audit of all applicable, appropriate, and desirable lines, edges, and objectives was found almost always with Storm Warning being right where he needed, thundering handsomely far and away to the front out of sight only to be seen again at distances slicing through acreage like a razor blade. A brave forward cast on the morning course out of sight resulted in the handler's hat in the air several minutes later just over the rise to find Storm Warning standing statuesque in his customary fashion, high on both ends. Birds were put to wing without a muscle's twitch from the dog named first at the conclusion of the trial. As the brace advanced, the desire for game visually supercharged the dog and only made him stronger, finishing the hour several hundred vards down the inside line of the large power lines going away at pickup. Storm Warning also backed King Post at 45 in his trademark stance.

Barshoe Forget Me Not kept all in the gallery and judicial saddles far from fading through the rigors of three days riding when she scorched the earth under her feet with a scintillating ground game, a jovial disposition, and high cracking tail. Field after field, Forget Me Not was making all the right moves while handling elegantly for her handler, Allen Vincent, with the gas pedal clearly to the floor. If the handler asked, Forget Me Not responded not only with the response but also with unforgettable class through her advance. An unproductive at 42 was all but masked by her masterclass ground race and was rectified with a find at 54, proving herself a bird finder in addition to a sight to see on the ground, earning her second-place honors.

Rounding out the placements, Dunn's True Reign had the ground race of a true all-age competitor and showed it both early and late in his hour. Handling confidently, handler Allen Vincent managed an even and forward advance after the dog would disappear only to affirmatively see True Reign taking the next obstacle as if a script was written for him. A mannerly and quick action find was recorded at 20 with all in order, True Reign would back his bracemate shortly thereafter at 32. He finished his hour just as he began, strong to the front, earning him the third-place spot on the podium.

The Running

In the first brace, Korry Rinehart handled Ascension, paired with Randy Anderson and Slick Water Frac. Ascension ran diligently but did not achieve the all-age race established by later braces. He finished his hour. Frac never found harmony with his handler and was picked up at 38.

Como Thunder, handled by David Russell, ran with handler Anderson and Touch's Cocaine Blues. Thunder ran strong, with some brief absences. He had the first find of the trial, locating a known covey at 54. All in order, he finished his hour strong. Touch's Cocaine Blues to find and keep to the front, however, he did back Como Thunder at 54 and finished his hour.

Sandridge Big Iron made cause for both judges to sit up in the saddle, making big swings and distant casts in the third hour. Handled by Allen Vincent, Big Iron had a find at 25 in good order and finished his hour. His bracemate, Bonner's Hot Rize, was not pleasing his handler, Korry Rinehart, who picked him up at 38.

Bridget Ledington was in the handler's saddle for the fourth brace, running her dog Painted Owyhee Toad. The connection was strong between Toad and Ledington; however, his ground coverage was not that of an all-age dog this time. David Hendricks, also an owner/handler, ran his dog Pleasant Run Sally with Ledington. Sally is a fancy female who made a beautiful bid and had an early find at 8. She applied herself dutifully and filled the grounds but, unfortunately, was lost at pickup.

Allen Vincent turned loose Texas Wild Rex in the fifth brace but requested the tracker at 28. His bracemate, Lester's Front Porch, was handled by Gary Lester. Front Porch ran strong the first half of his hour. He did have an unproductive but continued and finished his hour.

To complete the first day of running, Anderson ran I'm Gallant with David Russell and Haney's Hurricane Seeker. I'm Gallant ran intently, making good casts and hunting in sensible locations. Although he had an unproductive at 30, he did locate birds at 47 and was able to handle them with class as the birds flushed across his muzzle. He finished his hour. Hurricane Seeker took large bites of the country from the start; his handler worked diligently to keep him in check, but with long absences, Russell did ask for the tracker at pick up.

For the second day of running, Gary Lester started the day with the seventh brace and Miller's King Post. The canine athlete put together a very good ground race, showing linearly and disappearing, only to be seen again advancing on another field edge. At 30, King Post backed his bracemate Haney's Storm Warning and tried to make game on an edge under the power lines. No birds could be lifted, although the handler did produce feathers at the dog's stand. He finished his hour.

Randy Anderson returned in the eighth brace with No Strings Attached and, unfortunately, was not pleased with the dog picking him up at 30. Mike Crouse was braced with Anderson running Crouse's Heart of Dixon. "Hearty" ran with the strength of a bull. With intermittent absences, he did require some assistance to regain connectivity with his handler. At the end of the hour, the handler's hat was in the air riding to the front on a known covey location where birds were confirmed in front of the dog's stand and a shot fired with all in order.

Chris Cagle Sr. returned to handle Haney's Silver Dollar in the ninth brace. Silver Dollar all but emulated his string-mate, blowing down edges and lines like straight-line winds with a high cracking tail and enthusiasm. Silver Dollar indicated birds on a stand on the edge of a bramble where an extensive flushing effort ensued, eventually resulting in confirmation of a stubborn duo of quail. His bracemate, Dunn's True Reign, backed with all class. Silver Dollar went on, maintaining a solid ground effort; another extensive and long flushing effort would be required at pickup, with Silver Dollar being found by the bracemate's handler on yet another edge of a very large and intimidating slash pile. Nevertheless, the handler climbed, stomped, scaled, and pressed through the thick island of cover but with no birds out to fly to close out the hour

After lunch, Gary Lester turned loose Lester's Shockwave to kick off the afternoon and the ninth brace. He reeled out early in his run but troubled his handler with frequent returns and early exits on casts made. Regardless, the bird-finding prowess of the dog shone through regardless of the ground efforts, with two intact and mannerly finds at 35 and 53 minutes. He finished his hour. His bracemate, Coldwater Odyssey, struck early at 9 but after an unproductive flushing attempt, the dog was asked to relocate by handler Weldon Bennett. Birds were inadvertently evicted on the relocation, ending Coldwater Odyssey's hour early.

Stylishly and with the grace of a ballet dancer, Crouse's Tennessee Game Kate bound around the course with far-reaching casts with a spirited ground application evident with a high cracking tail as she bladed through the various bean field edges and wood lines. Several times, she emerged from cover breaks only to eat up the numerous field edges as if her run was a choreographed dance. Her lone find came shortly before pickup at 55 with birds precisely located. She finished her hour going away and enjoyed by all. Owned and handled by Mike Crouse, Game Kate was carried in the placements by the judges until the final day, but with such a performance rendered, the dog was named honorable mention.

Bonner's Bulletproof, handled by Randy Anderson, kept his string of performances rolling into the classic, piecing together a respectable showing on the ground responding to his handler's requests, marking moves in and away to the front at allowable places on course requiring little to some handling. Initially found to be backing his bracemate shortly before pickup at 55, Bulletproof was collared due to a breach of manners.

To finish day two, running the 12th brace, Weldon Bennett turned loose his second dog, Coldwater War Cry. After not making the turn across the culvert at 20, Bennett asked for the tracker to retrieve him. Braced with War Cry, Lester's Stemwinder had glimpses of excellence showing at times and requiring encouragement at times. Randy Anderson handled Stem Winder and located the dog standing at 15. He handled his birds mannerly and finished his hour.

For the final day of the Kentucky Quail Classic, Allen Vincent ran Firefly's Invictus with Gary Lester and Lester's Storm Surge. The 13th brace of the trial ran the first hour of the six hours of running. Firefly was harnessed after a lengthy absence off the breakaway; Storm Surge finished his hour to the front.

Allen Vincent handled Mayfield Storm Charger in the 14th brace. He was charged fully for his time residing in large expanses of real estate with an absence of significance in the middle of his run. Birds would be located by Mayfield

Storm Charger late with two finds at 50 and 55. He finished his hour strong. His bracemate, Touch's Fire Away, made cause for attention when striking birds early at 8 after rimming a bean field edge merging onto a perpendicular wood line where scent abruptly stopped the dog in his tracks, cranking his head high into the air. Birds were raised, and Fire Away continued with moments of grandeur and moments of wanting more. His handler, Randy Anderson, knowing what placements would require, picked up the dog at 45 minutes.

In the 15th brace, the only English setter in the Classic, Wynona's Nickleback Sugar, located a bevy not found by any previous competitors at the base of a cluster of small trees on a secondary field edge found by her scout early in the hour. A beautiful stance by the female produced an expertly located covey. Sugar would not realize an effort customary of her résumé nor demanding of honors for this trial and was put into the harness at 35. Randy Anderson handled Miller's Speed Dial, which was strong from the moment of being loosed, and the tracker requested at 16.

Black and white pointer male Crouse's Quiet Man ran strongly as customary of his performances in the 16th brace. Owned and handled by Mike Crouse, "Duke" experienced several long absences but showed himself in places, proving himself to be an all-age competitor. A find at 53 with all in order would show the dog's efforts to find birds during his headstrong run as he would finish the hour in hand to his handler's delight after their efforts. Scott Beeler handled Beeler's White Knight with Crouse and Quiet Man. White Knight stood at the one-minute mark in a sparse edge of a bean field, but no birds could be sourced there nor in the adjacent wood line behind said crop buffer. Adamant about another discovery of quarry, Beeler's White Knight would go on point again at 9 in another bean field, indicating birds in the woody cover on the edge. A concerted flushing effort followed by a relocation

would prove otherwise; Barshoe and White Knight were harnessed.

The final brace of the stake Barshoe Forget Me Not's performance was recounted with the winners, as she was handled to second place by Allen Vincent.

He had a strong all-age raceband and was consistently found to the front. Full Ride, owned by Kevin Dixon, earned second place with a strong performance for handler Randy Anderson. Third place was Bandit's Hill Avenger handled by Ike Todd. Avenger's owner, Ann Forrester, was on hand for his performance. A solid field, with enjoyable performances. The field of young dogs was a nice ending to a week of enjoyable bird dog work.

Amateur Shooting Dog

Eleven dogs were drawn, and we had scratches due to Craig Hiatt having some pain in his back and Steven Feuss having issues when dogs were exposed to another dog at home with an illness. The winner of this stake was "Shooter," a Brittany male handled by Ken DeLong. Shooter probably had the best 30 minutes in this trial, as he had four well-placed finds. After each find, when turned loose the judges would not see Shooter for a short time and find him in the next field on point. I would also mention that on each flush, the wet birds would only flutter out about 3 feet and sit down, and on each flush, Shooter would stand solid for the shot. I would also mention that Shooter won the NBHA Invitational at Grovespring the following weekend.

Second place in this stake went to "Joker," a German Shorthaired male, for John Landolina. Joker had three finds in his brace.

The sunsets were amazing, and the early morning light shining on the horses and dogs at breakaway was Eagles soared over the breathtaking. gallery every day, as did ducks. This is a big country venue that every dog handler should experience. According to manager Buckner, improvements to the facilities are in the works. The building of additional stalls is underway now, and there are plans for the construction of a dining lodge, pavilion, and hookups. Every field trialer present mentioned being thankful to Alabama for providing these grounds, as private tracts of land for trials are fast disappearing.

Sponsors are also essential to the success of our sport. Thanks to Purina for sponsoring the U. S. Championship for many years and giving dog feed to the winners. Greg Blair has been very gracious in his support. Once again, the AFTCA 20th Century Fund granted Cahaba Bend Field Trial Club funds for the betterment of trials on these grounds. The U. S. Club, along with several others who host trials here, all benefit as well. We greatly appreciate the support provided by the 20th Century Fund over the past nine

years.

The Running

Brace No. 1: Rester's Cajun Spirit (Carlton) was lost off the breakaway, and Touch's Midnight Rider (McLean) was picked up early with no birdwork.

Brace No. 2: Haney's Silver Dollar (Cagle) and Rester's Johnny Ringo (Eisenhart) were both out of pocket a lot. Cagle's scout called point way in the distance across the road. The judge and handler made it, and all was in order. They joined up with the gallery, but both dogs disappeared. Both handlers asked for their tracking device.

Brace No. 3: Dragonfly (Hughes) and Touch's Shadow Rider (McLean) started the second morning. Rider pointed with Dragonfly backing, birds were flushed, and the gun shot, but Rider moved too much and at 3 minutes was picked up. At 8 minutes, Dragonfly had a find at Warden Hill, then at 23, a distant cry of point was heard along the red barn line for find No. 2. At 28 minutes, Hughes lifted his hat near the head of Turkey Lake; Dragonfly had beautiful style with all in order. He also had a find at 38, then took the line. and when the gallery entered Black Bottom Pasture, he was at the end of the field and styled up for find No. 5. He left Taylor Field, and the handler rode past, but the scout and judge spotted the dog in the brush on the edge of the lake just before pick up for find No. 6. He disappeared out the front and each time was found pointed.

Brace No. 4: Southern Nation (Henry) and Haney's Storm Warning (Cagle) had the second brace of the morning. They were both making big casts parallel to the highway and when Cagle topped the hill at Turkey Lake, he saw his dog pointed on the fence line at the other side of the field. Upon getting there, Southern Nation was backing. All was in order for Storm Warning, but Southern Nation had a breach of manners and ended his bid. Storm Warning then had an unproductive at 40 minutes, another find at 47 minutes just after crossing the ditch into the dove field, and a third find at 52, followed by a strong

finish.

Brace No. 5: C S Code Blue (Hurdle) and Erin's Wild Atlantic Way (Eisenhart) had the third course. Code Blue was making big casts and made a cast around the big lake and showed up front, but then he was never seen again after going into Taylor Field, so at 40, Hurdle asked for the receiver. Atlantic Way had a find in the Wild Woods at 35. He disappeared out the front and was missing in New Ground, but he joined back with his handler and Eisenhart called point at the big tree with all in order. He took all of Gum Springs, and as the gallery crossed the culvert into the havfield. Eisenhart called point for his setter on the woods point and flushed for a pretty find to finish the morning.

Brace No. 6: Erin's Code of Honor (Eisenhart) and Woodville's Yukon Cornelius (McLean) didn't have it in the cards on this day. Code of Honor disappeared, not to return, and Cornelius had an unproductive and didn't connect with his handler, so the brace ended early.

Brace No. 7: Beeler's White Knight (Beeler) and Como Rain (Russell) started the brace with lots of run. Both had finds at 25 minutes in two different spots, and then they joined up, and at 32, they were together, and point was called, but they both lost their manners, and the brace ended.

Brace No. 8: Country On (McLean) and Erin's Perfect Storm (Eisenhart) started with the weather sunny, warm, and still. Neither dog seemed to be having a good day, so both were picked up before time.

Brace No. 9: Haney's All In (McLean) had his running reported earlier, and Haney's Hurricane Seeker (Russell) made a good showing, too. Besides the divided find, he stayed strong throughout the hour. Point was called at the end of the hour, but the birds left before the judges got there.

Brace No. 10: C S Dirty Harry (Hurdle) and Miller's Heat Advisory, runner-up (Carlton), showed their speed and were pointed out from time to time. As the gallery entered Black Bottom Pasture at 30 minutes, both dogs were on the far fence line pointed at least 100 feet apart. The judges went to their respective dogs, and both handlers flushed birds and fired their guns. Upon entering Taylor Field, Carlton had to go after his dog as he had taken the turn to the third course. At 40 minutes, Dirty Harry had a find at the Lake. Carlton and Heat Advisory caught up around Black Cow Pond. The scout called point for Heat Advisory on the cedar line. A dead bird was produced, but no others were found. Both dogs finished across the gravel road with Heat Advisory still making strong

casts to the front.

Brace No. 11: Hunt's Rollin' The Dice (McLean) and Southern Thunder (Shenker) turned loose going east. Point was called for Thunder at 10 minutes with all in order. McLean's scout called point, but no birds were flushed. Thunder made a huge sweep all the way around Turkey Lake out of sight. McLean's scout called point for Thunder at 29 on the red barn fence, so he made a big swing. All was in order. McLean picked up Dice. Then, at 32 minutes, when the gallery went through the gap into the hayfield, Shenker called point. He couldn't flush and let the dog relocate. He pointed again, and Shenker flushed in front of the dog's nose with birds coming up from a tight circle. At 35 minutes, Thunder pointed again for find No. 4. He made a wide cast to the front and was next seen coming down the line going into Little Prairie Pasture. He was making game, stopping, then moving, and then he took out the covey to end the brace.

Brace No. 12: C S Rester's Speculation (Hurdle) and Touch's Breakaway Fred (McLean) started at 9:46 and disappeared with no scout able to come up with them, so the two handlers asked for their tracking receivers to round up their dogs.

Brace No. 13: Late Hit (Shenker) and Knight Moon (Eisenhart) were on standby at their trailers, so the dog wagon brought them to the line since we still had time and course for the morning. They turned loose in the Wild Woods at 10:25. Late Hit went 10 feet and slammed to a stop. Shenker flushed birds in front of him with all in order. Hit took the ditch edge in the big bottom, but after that, his energy faded.

Both handlers picked up early.

Brace No. 14: Touch's Malcolm Story (McLean) and Erin's High Note (Carlton) had an exciting start with a divided find at 5 minutes on the red barn line. Then, at 11 minutes, Malcolm Story had birds at the Warden's Hill. He had us thinking he might give a performance like last year, but then decided he wanted to go his own way. After 30 minutes, McLean put the rope on him. High Note, at 18, was standing at a birdy area, but Carlton could not flush birds, so he took him on. After taking Taylor Field, High Note lost his drive, and Carlton harnessed him.

Brace No. 15: C S Smoke Roll (Hurdle) and Lester's Storm Chaser (Henry) were loosed, and Roll took a wide tour over on a far hill on the other side of the lake with no way to get back, so he ended his bid. Storm Chaser made some nice casts and at 42 had point called for him with birds, but the dog was hot, and Henry picked him up.

Brace No. 16: Como Thunder (Russell) and Touch's Gallatin Fire (McLean) started at 2:07 for the last brace of the trial. Both dogs made a big cast. With the wind blowing, Gallatin Fire turned east, and we went west, so McLean got his tracking device. Thunder fought the sun and wind until Russell decided to end the brace.

NBHA NATIONAL AMATEUR SHOOTING DOG INVITATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP K Del's Magnum Hotshot Named Champion By Tim Penn | Grovespring, Missouri | December 3, 2023

he NBHA National Amateur Invitational Championship was held on December 1 at the Sportsman's Field Trial grounds near Grovespring, Missouri. The grounds were in excellent condition this year, with milo strips that bordered the edges throughout the course. This championship is a two-part series, with the first series running on Friday, December 1. The final series, "The Callbacks," was run on Sunday morning, December 3. As part of this event, a handlers' dinner is served at the end of the first series to announce the callback dogs that will make their final bid to win the championship. Other activities, such as a raffle with various donated items, are given out. To conclude the activities was a presentation of a portrait of last year's winner, Craig's Runin Roxie, for owner and handler Craig Hiatt.

This year's event was hosted by the North Missouri Field Trial Association with the help of the Missouri Bird Hunters. Helping out were Tim Penn, Joe Zimmer, Randy Zimmer, Jack Glover, and Kevin Western. This is a hard-working bunch of guys who are willing to help out wherever it is needed. This year's judging duties were capably handled by Tony King of Thompson, Missouri, and Adam DeLude of Campbellsport, Wisconsin. These gentlemen gave their undivided attention to their job at hand, and we were lucky to have them evaluate our dogs.

Initial Series

The first brace of the championship had Faith's Maximum Justice with handler Kenny Delong braced with Chippewa's Dog of War with Geoff Johnson as handler.

This day started out fast and furious as Chippewa's Dog of War was gone to the front and was pushing the limits. Faith's Maximum Justice was found pointed and then was relocated prior to the road crossing; he suffered an unproductive here at 20. At 25, Chippewa's Dog of War had his only bird contact of the hour; he was again to the front. Faith's Maximum Justice had finds at 53 and 58 and finished his hour.

The second brace had K C's Guitar Man handled by Ken Sauer, braced with Raintree Blue Moon handled by Kathy Lewis. K C's Guitar Man had finds at 12 and 32; he was picked up by this handler at 56. Raintree Blue Moon's first find came at 29, and he backed K C's Guitar Man at 32. At 48, Blue Moon had his final piece of birdwork with all in order. He finished the hour for handler Kathy Lewis.

The third brace had K Del's Eagle Magnum Hotshot with Kenny DeLong as handler. His bracemate was Foxy Lady Sadie, with Mike Fox handling. Eagle Magnum Hotshot had finds at 8, 15, 18, and 25. He suffered an unproductive at 55 but finished the hour. Foxy Lady Sadie had a divided find at 15 and then, after being turned loose, was lost the remainder of the brace, ending her bid.

The fourth brace was Sol Fire Bend, handled by William Langley, and Cates

Rocket Girl, handled by David Cates. Sol Fire Bend was lost from the start; Cates Rocket Girl had a find and was picked up at 55 due to infraction.

The fifth brace was Double D's Red Lancelot, handled by Dan Draffen, braced with Fast Money, handled by Bud Moore. Double D's Red Lancelot was picked up shortly after his first find at 15. Fast Money finished the hour with two finds for her handler, Bud Moore.

The sixth brace had Bakers Shining Star Duke, handled by Mike Baker, braced with Sulphur Bend Firestorm, handled by William Langley. Duke had finds at 15, 35, and 57 and finished the hour. Sulphur Bend Firestorm had an unproductive at 30 and again at 45 and was picked up by handler.

The Final Series — "The Callbacks"

Faith's Maximum Justice was braced with Bakers Shining Star Duke in the first brace. The second brace was Raintree Blue Moon with K Del's Eagle Magnum Hotshot. Standby dogs were Fast Money and Chippewa's Dog of War.

After the completion of the final series, the judges named K Del's Eagle Magnum Hotshot, a Brittany male owned by Kenric DeLong, champion of the NBHA Amateur Invitational Championship. Hotshot finished the hour with five finds and carded one unproductive. He was to the front and competed with intensity throughout, showing what a champion should do. His four-find performance in the first hour and a five-find performance in his final hour demonstrate the true measure of a champion. The trial was held on December 7 and finished on December 10 in Berea, Kentucky. The trial started Thursday with the Puppy stake. Judges James Kleve and Robert Kester observed many outstanding youngsters showing themselves as future winners in this game. Leading the pack was a very nice and fancy young female pointer, Prince's Fallen Angel, owned by John Prince and handled by Justin Crook. Second place was another female who has been to the podium a lot this season, Boatright's Audubon Outcast, owned and handled by Terry Boatright. Rounding out third was PB Texas Tornado.

Next on the list were the amateur derbies, where Terry Boatright successfully swept all three placements. In first place was a very strong forward running setter male, Boatrights Iron Eagle. Second place was Outcast Siren Song, and in third was Boatright's Audubon Outcast, judged by me and James Kleve. All three of these derbies came to make a mark for themselves with strong races. Friday

morning saw the start of the Classic, judged by two outstanding veteran judges, Barry Stumbo and Dr. Kristine Hammons, who rode and watched thoroughly for three days. We are very appreciative of their time and diligence in the saddle. First place went to Two Seamer, a pointer male owned by Colby Tackett and handled by Justin Crook. Two Seamer rimmed the edges and was always found to the front, having a find at 35 and another one at 45: when time was called, scout Terry Boatright rode hard to the front to get him put in the harness. Second in the Classic went to Tenacee Cooper, owned and handled by Greg Isenberg. He laid down a very nice forward race and was able to get pointed up right before time was called. Rounding out the placements in the Classic was Tenacee Franklin, another very nice dog owned and handled by Greg Isenberg, who also had a couple of finds and a forward race, just not as strong on the ground as the other two dogs.

Last but not least was the Kentucky Derby Classic. First place went to a dog that has a very bright future and showed it on Sunday, Boatrights Iron Eagle, owned and scouted by Terry Boatright and handled by Kentucky pro James Kleve. "Chappy" had a strong forward race rimming all the edges with an eye-catching performance. Second place was Outcast Siren Song, a very nice female handled by James Kleve and owned by John Clough. Third place was a very nice up-and-coming puppy, PB Texas Tornado, owned by Brian Stockrahm. Big thanks to all involved in this trial; these Kentucky people's camaraderie sure proves to be something special.

The Region 6 Amateur All-Age Championship Championship commenced on December 8–10, 2023, with 26 talented competitors. The Buck Tuck Field Trial Club hosted the trial in Huntingdon. Tennessee. The club officers would like to thank David Williams and his family for the use of the grounds and facilities during the championship. We would also like to thank Sportsman's Pride for the advertising sponsorship and donation of \$975 in gift cards to be awarded to the winners. As with any field trial, it takes a team of dedicated individuals to make the event run like a well-oiled machine, and Huntingdon is no exception.

Club officers Jonathan Burch and Elton Bray served as judges, each bringing a wealth of competing and judging experience to the position. David Williams, Michelle Williams Clark, Gary McKibben, Joe Hughes, and Scott Little served as marshals and scouts when not competing. John Burrow, Phillip Barnett, and Lebob Stanfill took on the responsibilities of dog wagon drivers. Rounding out the jobs at the trial were Tessa Hughes, Michele Clark, and Lisa Little, making sure that hot meals were prepared throughout each day. Each of these individuals' contributions makes for a great trial.

The following information concerning the running of the competitors is from the notes left to the author by the judges, as the author was not able to ride each brace. The pre-release and feeding program of quail that David Williams has created at the Huntingdon grounds has proven to be productive, with an overall count of 35 finds during the 13 braces of competition. Not one brace went without birdwork.

Taking top honors as champion in the trial were awarded to Como Thunder and his handler, David Russell.

Como Thunder ran in the 11th brace of

the trial, which was pushed to the first hour brace on Sunday morning due to a severe storm on Saturday. During his brace, he had one find, two divided finds with bracemate Storm's End, an unproductive, and a back. Como Thunder's birdwork, handling, and up-front run impressed the judges to bestow the championship to him. Como Thunder is co-owned by Billy Blackwell, Doug Arthur, and David and Rachel Russell. The 4-year-old pointer male is white, liver, and ticked in coloration. Como Thunder's sire is Skyfall, and dame is Catch Me Dot.

Receiving the title of runner-up champion was Dialed In and her owner/ handler Jim Pendergest. At 10 years old, the white and orange pointer female hasn't missed a beat or let her years of competition slow her down. Dialed In ran in the 12th brace of the trial on the second course Sunday morning. She showed her bird-finding expertise with four impressive finds and a well-handled brace. Dialed In continues to show class and style, adding this title to her many championships.

The champion received an M & W bridle and rein set from Region 6, plus \$575 in Sportsman's Pride gift cards. The runner-up received an M & W breast collar from Region 6, plus \$400 in Sportsman's Pride gift cards. 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U. S. Complete National Open Invitational Championship Entries

The National Open Invitational was held in December 2023, with 12 dogs attending. This year's running was held at the Poston Farm in Pamplico, South Carolina. Last year's champion, Glassilaun War Paint, had been retired by his owner, Jamie Nee; therefore, he did not accept the invitation. Others invited but unable to attend were Double Deuce Sage due to whelp in January and Hirollins Gone And Doneit, recovering from tendon surgery. The standard for invitation is based on national points achieved from open placements during the year. When additional dogs are needed, the national secretary goes down the list until a replacement dog accepts. Often, these replacements are not notified until late; consequently, distance, conditioning, and personal schedules interfere with accepting the honor.

Those who accepted (listed here by braces for day one) were:

No. 1: Moonlite's Crown Jewel (PF), owned and handled by Frank Joyal from Vermont and North Carolina, and Warrior's Mean Louie (PM), owned and handled by Dennis Kivikko from Virginia.

No. 2: Grouse Hill Bullet Proof (ESM), owned by John Capocci and handled by Scott Forman from New York, and Mohawk Mill War Hawk (PM), owned by J. D. Waters and handled by Tony Bingham from North Carolina.

No. 3: Blue Ribbon's Harper Bella (PF), owned by Marty Fester and handled by Robert Ecker from Pennsylvania and North Carolina, and Suemac's Sashay (PF), owned by Roger, Susie, and Daulton McPherson, and handled by Mark Hughes from Pennsylvania.

No. 4: Backcountry Bruiser (PM),

owned and handled by Chris Catanzarite from Pennsylvania, and Smoke Rise Jake (PM), owned by P. F. Rose and handled by Tony Bingham from North Carolina.

No. 5: Ramapo Mountain Doc (PM), owned by Robert Shaban and handled by Robert Ecker from Pennsylvania and North Carolina, and Ms. Lady W (PF), owned and handled by Earl Drew from North Carolina.

No. 6: Double Deuce Zeke (PM), owned by Doug McMillan and handled by Mark Hughes from Pennsylvania, and Backcountry Missy (PF), owned and handled by Chris Catanzarite.

It is interesting to note that for this Invitational Open Championship, six open-trained and handled dogs attended, and six amateur-owned and handled dogs were invited. In today's economy, more amateur-owned and handled dogs compete weekly; therefore, there are larger than usual amateur handler qualified dogs. The dog is the key here, not the handler!

This year's location was on the Poston Farm in Pamplico, South Carolina. As handlers turned off Route 51 onto East Shirley Road, they were greeted by a large Purina banner announcing their arrival. As you turn right into the grounds, a dirt driveway takes you straight to the clubhouse and a large, mowed grass area with ample parking and room to stake out dogs and horses. Several folks travel with living quarters, and they, too, had ample room with access to water. The clubhouse served as a gathering place, outside and inside chairs. It also provided an easy serving area for lunches and Thursday evening's Purina Handlers' dinner. Lunch on Thursday was hot meatball grinders with homemade baked goods by Suzie Cammisa. On Friday, the buffet was warm "leftovers" from Thursday.

The course breaks away about halfway down the driveway toward Shirley Road. The dogs receive the whistle and head west across two open fields where the crop has been harvested and the ground smooth. On each side of these fields, there are feed crops along tree lines. At about 15 minutes, the course turns south into a long field fenced on the right westerly edge, as well as having a feed crop. On the left, there is additional bird cover and feed crop, as well as thick woods and water ditches. Ten minutes later, the course bends south easterly, crossing another harvested field and into a more natural area with plenty of quail habitat. At approximately 30 minutes, the course then passes the clubhouse and crosses the entry driveway. The territory here has more natural cover, a substantial wooded area, followed by open fields with feed plots and grass cover. As this course is basically a figure 8, we do cross one pathway before finishing on the far-left side of the opening fields. There were plenty of birds there, both from the pre-release coveys several months ago and the daily quail added by the club. The bird planter was Cliff Monroe. Thanks to Cliff, as well as to Warren Parrott, for supplying a vehicle with which he could maneuver the course.

Judges were landowner Rodney Poston and Joe Camissa from Butler, Pennsylvania. Rodney not only judged but was the perfect marshal. As Rodney raises quail for his "mini plantation," birds released were purchased from him.

Purina sent hats, banners, and food for entries. The winners received letters to have 12 and six large 37.5 lb. bags of Pro Plan Sport delivered to their homes. Smaller bags were provided to all dogs

that were entered. Garmin also supports U. S. Complete championships and will be sending product to the winners and the runner-up. The chairman for this championship was Tony Bingham, assisted by Cliff Monroe, National Secretary Jameson Crandall, and reporter Margaret Drew. The national secretary is responsible for all the points and keeping and sending invitations to attend. He also does the first drawing two days before the event. As the U. S. Complete Invitational is an average of two days, with a third day the option of the judges, day two was drawn on Thursday afternoon prior to dinner. Dog of the Day was awarded to Smoke Rise Jake. Three dogs were not eligible for the day two drawing due to errors in the first series. All participants were presented with a framed certificate of participation. U. S. Complete National President Chris Catanzarite was kept apprised of the progress throughout the fall. He was also involved with planning and had two dogs entered.

The Winners

Four-year-old pointer male Smoke Rise Jake was named champion, with female pointer Suemac's Sashay named runner-up. These two dogs link back to Chasehill Little Bud. Sashay is the direct daughter of Bud, and Jake is a second generation through Stoney Run's Buddy, who was from Chasehill Little Bud (x Racie Kate). Both litters were from a January whelping; Jake is 6, and Sashay will be 10 in 2024. Jake had multiple pieces of birdwork on both days, with a strong ground race and good rapport with handler. Sashay scored finds both days with a consistent race.

Day One Running

Called to the line by 8:15, the event commenced with Moonlite's Crown Jewel and bracemate Warrior's Mean Louie. It was a little chilly by South Carolina standards at 38 degrees and a slight breeze. The breeze continued for most of the morning, making good conditions for the dogs and handlers, although a jacket was needed for judging or gallery riding. Moonlite's Crown Jewel had a good race; she was very light on her feet and had a consistent ground race. At 48, we all thought we finally had a bird located when we found Jewel standing proudly on a knoll backing her bracemate, who was buried deep in the cover among bamboo saplings. Despite a thorough search and relocation attempt, no birds were flown. Louie's race was at a constant hunting range and always in hunt mode.

Brace No. 2 called the only setter, Grouse Hill Bullet Proof, to the line. Bullet Proof is a sharp-looking black and white setter with a forward race as he searched all possible objectives with no success. His bracemate Mohawk Mill War Hawk was with Tony Bingham. At 24, the course swings back toward the clubhouse through some good-looking quail habitat. The judge noted to Bingham that his dog had stopped to the front on the right. As handler went to flush, a deer jumped up and ran off-Mohawk Mill War Hawk stood obediently until handler approached and took him on. The dog's mind was distracted, and he was unable to focus on his hunting task following that experience. In 6 minutes, he snapped into a promising poise; however, no birds were flushed. He repeated this routine for another 4 minutes and was then leashed by handler. This resulted in his being unable to be drawn for day two.

Brace No. 3 found Robert Ecker with Blue Ribbon's Harper Bella and bracemate Suemac's Sashay with Mark Hughes. This pair were eagerly off the start line, showing a promise for quail to be located. Blue Ribbon's Harper Bella ran a snappy-gaited race, which grew stronger as her hour progressed. At 25, she was casting back toward handler after a determined cast when she scored a nice quail find. As her hour continued, she became independent, requiring Ecker to demand more of her. Suemac's Sashay gets recognition for having the first find of the stake. At 20 minutes, she was hunting right to left along a grassy edge when we watched her slow her gait and then turn into the cover. Her tail was soon seen as she staunched up to await handler. Quail were flushed, and with all in order, she was collared to the corner and whistled away. With this first find under her collar, she was energized and marched strongly forward. A few of her casts during the remaining 45 minutes were wide, and a few times, I thought she had been ridden by. This had been a good brace.

Lunch followed, with brace No. 4 on the line at 12:55. Backcountry Bruiser was braced with Smoke Rise Jake. The breakaway was quick and forward, with these two powerful pointers out to see who could locate the first quail in this hour. Their patterns showed a good hunting sense as to where to attempt location. At 16, the pair were standing, Jake scoring the find and Bruiser, a back. Good style and manners for both dogs. Bruiser required some firm commands by handler to keep him under control. He did score an unproductive and a nice find at 57. The judge noted he was a powerhouse on the ground. Smoke Rise Jake had a second find at 25 before crossing the entry driveway and was obediently healed across

the roadway to be whistled away as his bracemate caught the front. He had one additional find. He pointed with a high head and tail each time while staunchly awaiting flush.

Brace No. 5 was tapped to hunt at 2:16 with Ramapo Mountain Doc and bracemate Ms. Lady W. Ramapo Mountain Doc was fast on his feet off the breakaway, although settled into a sweeping hunting pattern. Along the fence by Route 51, he had quail flushed at 15. Your reporter did not see this part of the race as I was scouting my own dog; however, the judge reported that his finds were well-spaced and that he was fast on his feet. Ms. Lady W was forward with her bracemate in a tandem race until the second field. She cast to the left and out of sight, returning at 14 to continue down the left planted seed plot and disappear briefly. She was next seen well to the front, edging the crop field and into the cover. She ran an animated wide race, always forward, with a nonproductive at 54.

The final brace for day one was on the line at 3:46; Mark Hughes had Double Deuce Zake as bracemate for Backcountry Missy. This final afternoon brace was a challenging hour. Zeke had finds at 20 and 25. He and handler Hughes get the recognition for the first covey of the stake. The course crosses a wide bare crop field at 20; Zeke was forward and seen entering the standing feedstock. He pointed and then took a second step and firmed up. He awaited flush and shot. The remainder of his hour went downhill, as he developed a stubborn side of not responding to handler or scout. At pick-up time, he was found standing along the roadside fence near the 15-minute mark. As an electronic device was used, he was not eligible for day two.

Backcountry Missy was making her way southeasterly about 16 minutes into the hour. A bird was seen, and she was in the area, although she did stop. The judge deemed it a stop to flush and allowed her to continue. At 20, Missy had point called by scout on the wooded edge side of the harvested field. Missy had a bad day with additional nonproductives, scoring at 40 and 50. She was not invited to run on day two.

Day Two Running

Friday morning found heavy frost on the ground, temps 29, causing the start time to be pushed back to 8:40. Chris Catanzarite brought Backcountry Bruiser to the line as bracemate with Ms. Lady W with Earl Drew. The two were forward at the sound of the whistle and release of the collar as if shot from a cannon. We watched them pass the two breaks in the fields and head toward the field along the fenced road

along Highway 51. Bruiser was hunting appropriately to the front as we made the southerly turn; however, not stopping to indicate game. He continued a powerful march forward. When he entered the open area beyond the fenced neighbor, he skirted to the right through the standing feed plot. When a scout was dispatched, point was called. I did not see what happened; however, the report given to me was "he was picked up." Ms. Lady W was well to the front, crossed the ditch by the wooden scout bridge, and then headed south. When we could see her, she was in a determined searching gait; however, nothing stopped her until a large covey lifted as she cast toward the clubhouse after a long absence, and she chose not to stop. This short brace was a surprise to all.

Brace No. 2 was Ecker with Ramapo Mountain Doc and Bingham with Smoke Rise Jake. These two briefly displayed an unfavorable start, each doing "dog stuff" after a long night in their crates. Jake was first to begin a real hunting cast, traveling well to the left, where he was stopped by quail along a steep bank along a water channel. Scout called point at 5, where Jake stood shivering, proud and sure. Handler Bingham made his way down the embankment and thrashed around with the judge watching closely. Finally, a quail was seen running under branches. Shot was heard, and Jake awaited the handler to

return and take him on. After the handler led Jake toward the course, he was released to continue. He obediently moved forward and out of sight, entering the road field well ahead of his handler. From the front, we could hear Ecker and judge indicating that Jake was upfront. Judge Cammisa told Bingham to make his way through the middle cut so as to catch the front. Upon arrival at the far end of the field, Ecker and judge stated that they had not seen what had happened but thought Doc was backing. After looking the situation over, Bingham decided not to attempt flush, as he felt the two dogs were sight-pointing each other. Both dogs were taken forward and returned to hunt. This was a "nonevent." At 25, Jake pointed, although no birds were flown, and Doc, returning from a long cast, was watered as he approached the vicinity. Soon, both dogs were hunting to the front. At 34, Jake pointed, and Doc backed. There was a long flushing attempt. At 45, Jake had a nice covey find. Nearing 55, a hawk was seen lifting from the side, although no bird was seen, and Jake was spotted well to the front.

Brace No. 3 contained Grouse Hill Bullet Proof with Forman and Blue Ribbon's Harper Bella with Ecker. This pair had an eight-minute hesitant start, each checking in closely and not casting forward in a search for game. Once whistled on and encouraged by handlers, the hunting got started. At 28, Bullet Proof stood solid, facing a patch of seed crop, although with an old-fashioned style. To everyone's disappointment, a nonproductive was scored. At 50, both dogs were hunting where we could all watch; Bullet Proof showing his determined hunting mode, although ranging a little further as the hour progressed. Blue Ribbon's Harper Bella was making several long independent casts and had to catch handler on a few occasions on this second day. At 24, Ecker called point for her, and after a flushing attempt produced no quail, he declared a pile of feathers and collared Harper on.

Brace No. 4 followed the best "leftovers" lunch one could ask for. Suemac's Sashay, with Mark Hughes, hunted independently most of the hour, checking in enough to keep everyone watching. She scored a three-bird covey find at 56 as she neared the end of her thorough coverage of the course. Warrior's Mean Louie, with Dennis Kivikko, hunted the course with good application and nice style; however, a stop to flush ended his hour early.

The final brace had to run as a bye-dog; however, Moonlite's Crown Jewel did not seem to mind. Handler and owner Frank Joyal set out for a nice hour's hunt. Jewel checked the sides of the course as she should and continued a forward pattern. When the course changed terrain. she would check for handler. Nearing the clubhouse, she stopped with impressive style and remained staunch after two coveys flushed—one to her right side some 20 feet away with 12 birds ridden up by your reporter and the second flushed by handler on the far side of a downed tree in front of her. This time, 20 birds thundering skyward. One of the nicest pieces of birdwork in the stake. Handler did not finish his hour.

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AMERICAN RED SETTER BIRD DOG CLUB 2023 Fall Trial By Al Fazenbaker | Rose Hill, North Carolina | December 15, 2023

The American Red Setter Bird Dog Club was formed in the summer of 2023 by a group of walking field trial enthusiasts who were interested in promoting walking trials, not only with red setters but with all breeds. The Board of Directors of the ARSBDC elected to run an inaugural trial in 2023, with a long-term goal of hosting an amateur championship on wild birds at some point in the near future. Thanks to the generosity of Joe and Brenda Edwards, we were able to host our first-ever field trial on the Six Runs Farms near Clinton, North Carolina.

The pinev woods and open croplands of coastal North Carolina are prime bird dog country, and we were so fortunate to have these fine grounds for our first trial. Home to the iconic Come Back Setters, Hall of Famer Joe and Brenda have hosted trials for many years, and this year drew a good number of dogs to the running. The grounds at Six Runs are ideally suited for running bird dogs, with a mix of pine woods, croplands, and long strips of lovegrass, ideal for holding birds tight. The Great Coharie Creek runs the boundaries of Six Runs, creating a natural boundary to keep errant dogs from leaving the grounds. This year, the weather started warm and dry, but then torrential rains resulted in the postponement of the running on the third day; over 5 inches of rain fell in one day at Six Runs. In nearby Wilmington, North Carolina, some areas received over 6 inches! Because of the extensive rain, a majority of Six Runs Farm was underwater, and even after a day of postponement, the waters of the Great Coharie Creek continued to rise. The next day, thanks to the generosity of Dr. Roger Boser, we moved the trial to Dr. Boser's property, where we were able to finish the last stake of the trial as the waters came out of the banks and crept across the field trial grounds. As the saying goes, you can't mess with Mother Nature!

Our judging staff was well experienced and brought with them many years of working with bird dogs. Jeremy Estep (Troy, Pennsylvania), Andy Weik (Freeville, New York), Joe Edwards (Rose Hill, North Carolina), Allen Fazenbaker (Kingsville, Ohio), and Sean Melvin (Garland, North Carolina) all gave of their time to watch dogs during this trial.

No trial can be conducted successfully without help from willing volunteers and sponsors. The most important function of

planting birds was very well accomplished by Karen Vaughn and Milt Schafer, who ensured a plentiful supply of birds in the fields and in the places where birds would be found. Deborah Fazenbaker, Brenda Edwards, and Linda Coppedge all worked overtime to keep everyone attending wellfed. Tom and Linda Coppedge donated an absolutely delicious meal of BBQ pulled pork with all the trimmings. Andy Weik cooked up a great meal of venison chili, and Deborah Fazenbaker baked a wonderful pork sausage lasagna. The ladies baked enough desserts and cookies to feed an army; no one was hungry during this trial!

I would be remiss, not to mention some folks who were essential to the success of this trial. Joe and Brenda Edwards offered not only the grounds but also their side-by-side for bird planting and the use of their horses for judging. Dr. Roger Boser offered the use of his grounds so that we would be able to finish the trial after the flooding, and he also offered the use of his horses for judging as well. Sean Melvin also offered the use of his horses and took time out of his workweek to assist with judging after the change of venue due to the flooding. Allen and Deborah Fazenbaker opened their home in Ingold, North Carolina, to host participants for the draw and evening meals. Dr. Boser likewise graciously opened his home near Garland, North Carolina, to feed the trialers on the last day of the trial. These folks were exceptional and very giving of their time and resources, and this is a testament to what William F. Brown called the "Gentleman's Sport." It was certainly evident this week.

A special thanks goes out to Purina, a stalwart in the support of our sport. Purina offers a high-quality product backed by

The Running

The trial opened Friday with the Open Puppy. Taking the blue was Andy Weik with "Birdy," an unregistered German Shorthaired pointer, who showed a wide race but handled nicely.

The Open Walking Derby was taken by Ruff Country Simply Ginger, a forward-going red setter who kept to the front and had several nice derby broke finds for her handler, Andy Weik. Close on her heels was CC Lenni Lenape, a nice moving red setter male who showed broke manners on his birds. Lenni was handled by Al Fazenbaker. Stump Hill Farms Toby, an English setter male, rounded out the placements for his handler, Daniel Bell.

The Open Walking Shooting Dog commenced immediately after the Derby on Friday with a respectable entry of 11 dogs. Winning the stake was Conneaut Creek Scenic River, a red setter male

handled by Al Fazenbaker. River showed a forward and purposeful race, with four nicely handled finds. Taking the red was Foxy Lady Sadie for handler Mike Fox. Sean Melvin handled Black River Sue to a third-place finish.

Saturday brought warmer weather, with weather forecasts predicting intense rain the next day. The Open Horseback Derby started the day with a small entry, won decisively by Shotput, a red setter female handled by Dr. Boser.

The Open Horseback Shooting Dog followed immediately after the Derby. Taking the blue was Come Back Trump, Joe Edward's veteran red setter, who showed a wide and forward race and was always found standing for the judges. Black River Ruby, a setter female, was close behind for handler Sean Melvin, with a wide race and excellent birdwork. Gratitude took the yellow for handler Dr. Boser, with impeccable manners and a slightly shorter race.

With the threat of rain on the horizon, the Amateur Walking Shooting Dog commenced immediately after lunch. Mike Fox's Foxy Lady Sadie garnered the blue with a wide and forward race and multiple bird finds. Conneaut Creek Scenic River was in the number two slot with a productive and forward race for his handler, Al Fazenbaker.

Sunday morning brought torrential rain, with some areas receiving more than 5 inches in 12 hours. With high winds, driving rain, and local rivers coming out of their banks, it was decided to postpone the Amateur Horseback Shooting Dog to

After the announcements, everyone retired to Dr. Boser's place for a meal of venison chili and all the fixings, courtesy of Andy Weik and Deborah Fazenbaker.

Also, this year, we have received support from SportDOG, as they are providing some collars for prizes and collars for the top dogs on the circuit at the end of the season. Many thanks to our judges and our dog wagon driver, Vincent Major. A big thank you to the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area team. We are very fortunate in Western Kentucky to be able to utilize public grounds for horseback field trials,

NORTH CAROLINA OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP Hard Truth Named Champion; Chelsea's Mae West, Runner-Up By Margaret C. Drew | Hoffman, North Carolina | December 18, 2023

The North Carolina Championship has had a floating date since early 2000. For several years, it ran in partnership with the United States Quail Futurity. Sixty years ago, a group of hunters worked with the NC wildlife commissioners to establish the U. S. Quail Futurity. It was shortly thereafter that the Open Shooting Dog Classic became the North Carolina Championship.

In early 1968, the NC Wildlife Commission proposed а 10-year development plan for 950 of these acres. A substantial portion of the field trial area was already in blocks of sericea lespedeza. About 87 acres of these blocks were within the proposed 31-mile planted strips. In 2023, this is nearer 32 miles. At the end of the initially proposed 10-year time frame, this 31-mile planted strip would contain 782 acres of sericea lespedeza and 84 acres of rye and millet for a total of 950 planted acres. The work on what we now know as the J. Robert Gordon Field Trial Grounds began in 1949; however, the first field trial was not held until 1954. By 1970, the NC Wildlife Commission expressed that the area had developed a favorable environment, and they wanted to attract more outsiders. As the decline of quail progressed everywhere, a plan to release coveys of quail was adopted in 1981. A tractor and spreader were purchased for feeding, and planned crops have continued. There is a five-year plan that provides for burning on courses. In early 2000, an additional course loop was constructed behind the barn, bringing the total number of courses to six. These six courses are about 6 miles long and used only once daily. Each course has a start sign, which reads "start of heat 1," etc. In 2023, the state added road signs on dirt roads and safety markers along the courses. These small square markers denote where you are on each course by mileage. EMS would be able to assist if necessary.

Today, these six courses are maintained by the state and planted by the same. The NC Association purchases and releases 5,000 quail annually. The association purchases millett and owns a tractor and spreader with which the six courses are fed on a regular basis. Water is put out, although the grounds do have some manmade water holes, brooks, and lakes. During this championship, the bird count was good: 13 on day one, six on day two, five on day three, five on day four, four

on day five, and on the final day four, but remember the final day was derbies and half a day.

The grounds at Hoffman are among the best in the country. When the wildlife commissioners established the Robert Gordon Field Trial Grounds, their objective was to have the best grounds and attract the best dogs to the area. With an entry of 54 shooting dogs, followed by a 28-dog derby, success can be hailed in all areas. The income brought to the area in revenue from fuel, lodging, and restaurants is noteworthy. When folks come to Hoffman, they tell about how exciting it is to ride the braces and even more to release and guide a dog over the courses. When birds are flown over your dog at Hoffman, it feels like a celebration; after all, it is usually a covey of quail, not just singles. These coveys were from 4 to 20 birds. The sight and sound of the covey lifting and to see the dog standing straight and firm, his tail poker straight and his head pointing skyward, is a thrill for all. (If you have never been to Hoffman to see this, please join us). Every weekend there is a trial; the wagon is free and available for anyone to ride. It leaves the clubhouse at 8 a.m. and, following lunch, leaves again in the neighborhood of 1:30. Each trip is roughly 4 hours to cover the three courses.

To enter a championship at Hoffman is a chance to earn a prestigious honor. In the North Carolina Championship this year, there were at least 36 champions seeking their next championship.

As I have heard, field trialing is not just a sport but a culture on its own. The characters you meet are real, and their stories are real with some exaggeration as stories get retold. Bird dogs are bred to run and point whatever game bird is in the environment you release your dog in.

In July of 2023, the annual N. C. Field Association held its annual meeting at the Hoffman Field Trial clubhouse. It is at that time each July that all clubs meet to elect officers, recognize the top dog winners, and draw dates for the coming field trial season, which runs from October to the end of March. The president of the association is the normal chair of the North Carolina Championship; however, for the 2023 season, President Johnny Atkinson asked Calvin Curnutte to fill the chairmanship role. Calvin did an excellent job revising the trophies given to the winners and judges and adding a 30-minute Derby stake. Calvin also asked the judges to recognize two additional dogs. These two additional dogs received a 10% check. Calvin and his father prepared and served lunch daily. On Tuesday evening, there was the Purina Handlers' Dinner.

There had been a silver bowl with silver cups recognizing each year's winner; however, when the clubhouse went through a renovation several years ago, it turned up among some other missing items. The new symbol for the North Carolina Championship is an eye-appealing black metal silhouette of a man on a horse, hat indicating point over a standing dog. The wooden base came from an aged barn board from the Hoffman Barn. (Yes, the board was obtained with permission from the wildlife and replaced with a new board). There is a brass nameplate indicating the year and champion or runner-up champion. The judge's gift has a second horse with a mounted judge viewing the mounted handler and dog.

There is a state-provided and maintained wagon for dogs and people at the Hoffman grounds. There are 10 kennels on the bottom of the wagon, with hay and safety-locking dog boxes. Above the dogs, there are benches on each side. There are cushions available for those who wish to use them. There is water for handlers to refill water jugs or wet a dog down when it is hot. The wagon is pulled by a truck owned by a "wagon driver." This year, the driver is Greg Robinson, who knows the roads and loves the dogs. Greg checks and cleans the dog boxes as needed. He also has snacks, fruit, water, and coffee for everyone to share at various break times.

The sponsor for the North Carolina Championship has been and still is Purina. Purina Sport meal is given to the winners, as well as this being a points trial toward the annual Purina Dog of the Year awards. DC Birddogs provided judges' books.

The Winners

The orange and white pointer male, Hard Truth, with Ray, was down at 8:47 due to early pick-ups in brace No. 13. We watched him power up the hillside and cross the road at the old bunkers area at 21. He was always far forward and moved with eye appeal and strength for the full 60 minutes. The judge's report was a divided find at halfway. Both dogs tight and positive for wing and shot. Hard Truth had an admirable ground race from beginning to end, never showing hesitation. Along Derby Road, his scout traveled along the highway; however, point was then called to the front and on the right of the course where he belonged. This well-located covey at 47 sealed it for a placement of some kind. That kind being: CHAMPION. He was intense on point. Jamie Daniels had the litter with Erin's Redrum x Pearl Again. He placed in four futurities, with a first placement in the New England Futurity. He is owned by Bob Canada, who missed a weekend of his life with bird dogs-Hard Truth winning this Championship and his derby, Miller's Upgraded Patent, winning the companion Derby. Patent is co-owned with handler Doug Ray's father, Harold.

Shawn Kinkelaar guided pointer female Chelsea's Mae West for her reaching tour of the course as she ranged forward. She required a little scouting and was seen making appropriate casts as we made our way toward the road crossing below the barn. Mae West had a nice find at 3 before continuing a front-running animated race. At 39, she stood proud and sure for handler to flush a covey. In the far back part of course 6, Mae West appeared to be missing; however, she returned with 4 minutes to spare. Her range was pleasing as she busily investigated likely bird cover. She finished going away strong with plenty of energy still in the tank. Mae West is owned by Ron Prewitt and Brad Sadler. She began her early birddog development and exposure to birds under the supervision of Brad Sadler and Jamie Daniels. Her sire, Chelsea's Thunder Bolt, had been bred to Chelsea's Southern Chic. Mae West has accumulated three championships, three runners-up, and a Quail Futurity win here on the Hoffman Grounds.

A new introduction to the championship this year was two honorable mentions for a 10% bon oa. These went to Upfront's Southern Star, a pointer female with Shawn Kinkelaar from brace No. 10, and Hatteras Rip Tide, a setter male with Doug Ray. You can read about these two in the dialogue below.

The Running

By 8:04 a.m. on December 18, Trial Chairman Calvin Curnutte had introduced the judges, given a few details concerning the day's event, and turned the trial over to the judges, Chris Catanzarite and Chad Wheeler. Course 4 opened the route for the next six days. The afternoon braces were run on courses 1-3. Each course was used only one time a day.

Brace No. 1 called Matt Basilone, with pointer male Hirollins Bad Boy as bracemate for Smoke Rise Jake, a pointer male with Tony Bingham. The pair got right down to the business of hunting, rounded the corner, and were out of sight in quick time. When scout Hester did not return with the dog, Basilone rounded Hirollins Bad Boy up himself. By 20, with dog at heal, he was returning to the course when the dog stopped and stood statue still for handler to dismount for flush and shot. He made some good casts, although not seen much. His paw prints indicated he often chose the easy path. At 40, scout called point with all in order. Smoke Rise Jake was not seen from the breakaway until 30 when he was returned by another handler on a rope. The handler reported he found him running down the road. Jake's handler, Tony Bingham, had taken the GPS unit at 25

Brace No. 2 had CS Four Season's

Gunner, a pointer male with Doug Ray, and Heisman, a pointer male with Mike Hester. CS Four Season's Gunner started slowly, checking with handler several times; however, he increased his hunting range with enthusiasm as the hour went on. He scored a find at 40 and a nonproductive at 46. He may have been able to relocate if his bracemate had not returned and raced on by the area while Gunner was checking out the sights and smells. His style standing on point was erect and solid. Heisman had a nonproductive at 43 just before climbing the hill to cross below the clubhouse. Heisman started his hour with plenty of energy but shortened his range and power as the hour continued.

Brace No. 3 had Emert's Grouse Ringer T, a setter male with Tony Bingham, and Absolute Tornado, a pointer male with Doug Ray. Ringer is an attractive black and white setter who runs with a classy gait, although he needed a little adjustment to his forward pattern today. Tornado covered the course with a strong and fancy motion. Nearing 43, while riding to his dog, who was pointing to the front, handler Ray rode up a covey. Nearing the downed brush near Tornado, a second covey lifted. Shot was taken with all in order.

Brace No. 4 followed lunch, this time on course 1 across from the clubhouse. Calvin Curnutte walked setter male Aristotle to the line, accompanied by Tony Bingham with pointer male Smoke Rise Bull. Aristotle put down a fancy gait as he stretched side to side; however, he and bracemate were often in tandem. Smoke Rise Bull was on the ground for about 44 minutes, often with bracemate. Handlers attempted to distract and get their charges to hunt independently. Bull scored two finds; however, he went to a casual attitude. He did not make the hour under consideration.

Brace No. 5 had Matt Basilone with pointer female Smoke'N'Mirrors as bracemate for Two Spot Tommy, a pointer male with Doug Ray. Smoke'N'Mirrors had a very long opening cast, returning at 16 minutes. His range was medium following 20 minutes, and his race was somewhat inconsistent with woods hunting and path running. On one of his off-the-path tours, he scored an attractive poise for a nice covey to be flown at 35. Two Spot Tommy passed McGee's Castle and hunted well forward. At 14, he had point called as he moved forward into tall grass. He stood nicely on point; however, after handler made a thorough search and no quail were flown, Tommy was tapped to relocate. He took a few steps, and a 12-bird covey lifted. He was roaded back to the clubhouse

Brace No. 6 was whistled on to complete

the afternoon at 3:46. T's American Outlaw, a setter male with Tony Bingham, and Mike Hester with pointer male Quickmarksman's Dan. Outlaw lived up to his name, choosing to hunt wherever he wished and not willing to listen to handler or turn with scout. By 37, handler Bingham took the GPS. Quickmarksman's Dan was in and out as he covered the course, starting with a close hunting range. As his hour extended, he reached more to the front, scoring a find at 54.

Brace No. 7 was on the ground at 7:58 a.m. with setter male Due Respect with Shawn Kinkelaar, as bracemate with Hatteras Sand Storm, a setter male under the whistle of Doug Ray. Respect rocketed to the front and disappeared. A GPS was required. Sand Storm had a swinging, strong race with a covey find at 13 minutes. Unfortunately, he had nonproductives at 35 and 45; therefore, an early pick-up was required.

Brace No. 8 called Smoke Rise Hanna, a pointer female with Tony Bingham. She began her challenge as the temperature rose to a good dog-hunting level under bright skies. After a lengthy spell of not being seen, handler requested the GPS. She was up before the bunker area. Bracemate Greypointe Nubarron, a pointer male with Calvin Curnutte, was into the hunt mode as soon as he was released. He had good range and hunted well. He scored a covey find at 22, where he excitedly watched their flight. He continued to hunt forward and more carefully following his find. He had a nonproductive at 48. When he attempted to assist with flushing, he was leashed.

Brace No. 9 was on the standard course 6, which normally breaks away behind the barn into overgrown fields and then opens into piney woods with lots of warm season grasses and love grass. With early pick-ups in preceding braces, the brace started about 25 minutes early. Kinkelaar had pointer female Chelsea's Mae West as bracemate with Marques Armed Bandit, a pointer male with Lefty Henry. Both dogs ranged forward, required a little scouting, and were seen making appropriate casts as we made our way toward the road crossing below the barn. When point was called for Bandit and handler approached, Bandit began to self-relocate and was leased. Chelsea's Mae West's performance is covered under the winners as the runner-up champion.

Brace No. 10 had Quickmarksman's Excalibur, a pointer male with Mike Hester, and Upfront's Southern Star, a pointer female with Kinkelaar. The pair hunted to our front with many lateral casts as well. In the long mile field, both dogs were appropriately covering the territory.

At 25, Excalibur had an unproductive, despite a noteworthy attempt to relocate. He did not complete his hour. Southern Star made mature casts and showed herself to be classy and very sharp on point. She had a find at 44 with all in order. Her second point came when she was found after time. As time was called, she had been seen at the top of the hill before the course 2 signposts; however, when time was called, she was missing. Handler and judges rode forward; however, when not seen, scout and handler went back to her last seen location. When point was called, judge went to the location, down over a little knoll where time had been called. She stood erect and solid, refused to move when tapped on, and remained locked up as a covey was flushed by handler.

Brace No. 11 was off at 2:29 with Woodlands Ridge Jim, a setter male with Calvin Curnutte, and setter male Lincoln County Jack with Tony Bingham. In the still chilly air, Jack was bound to warm up, and he did with a positive launch forward. He failed to return, and a GPS was taken. Jack was found quickly, standing on a nice double covey. Jim has a very white and slightly framed body with good motion while covering the ground. He ranged well for the first 30 minutes; however, when birds were not found, he narrowed his search and was picked up at 45 minutes.

Brace No. 12 would complete day two with Doug Ray commanding the white setter male Hatteras Rip Tide as bracemate for Matt Basilone with the black-headed setter male, The Gray Ghost. Ghost's owner was present to watch. The judge commented, "These were the best pair of stylish dogs with the best ground race so far." Unfortunately, Ghost had a nonproductive at 48. As Rip Tide was touring well to the front, he had point called; however, neither judge had seen the birds lift.

Brace No. 13 once again called upon Kinkelaar and Bingham. This time, Kinkelaar had pointer female Hale's Smooth Touch, and Bingham had setter male Hirollins All American. The early morning frost did not distract these two, with Touch checking everything that flew with slight discrimination as to whether it was game bird or not. She ran with a good gait and had good contact with handler; however, she did not remain down the hour. All American ran with a classy stretching gait with weak communication with handler. He tried to get Bingham to come his way; however, when that did not work, he was up at 40.

Brace No. 14 was down early with the sound of whistles at 8:47. Kinkelaar had pointer female Silver W Jill Z as bracemate

with orange and white pointer male Hard Truth, with Ray. Jill is a slightly built female; however, she glides gracefully through the cover. She crossed the road by the bunkers at 26 behind her bracemate, who had flown up the hill and beyond the bunkers at 21. Her route was forward toward the far horizons, showing just enough to be pointed out by handlers or judge for the full hour. The judge's report was a divided find at halfway. Both dogs tight and positive for wing and shot. Hard Truth is covered with the winners.

Brace No. 15 had Matt Basilone with pointer male Red Alert Lane paired with Kinkelaar. Pointer female Thunderbolt's Boon was eager to please handler on a sunny morning with less wind than yesterday. The temperature had risen to 37 by this 10:15 breakaway. As Alert marched toward the clubhouse, he turned left into the thick love grass as a covey began to lift. The dog stopped, but the damage had been done. As handler led his horse toward the dog for pick up, two more quail lifted. Thunderbolt's Boon made some nice casts with a very animated gait; however, she often took the path less traveled. She was not down the hour.

Brace No. 16 was down on course 1 at 1:01. Bingham with pointer male Lincoln County Buddyboy and pointer male J N Bolt Action with Kinkelaar. This pair were whistled away to hunt at 1:01. Both dogs tore down the hillside opposite the clubhouse. Although temps were up to 37, Bolt Action appeared not to like the cooler air. He marched far to the front and was seen once more before a GPS device was required at 35 minutes. Lincoln Country Buddyboy was happily across the small stream and up the hill. He pointed tall and solid at 25 along Baggett Lake; however, no birds were flown even after a good relocation attempt. As he rounded the top of the knoll into the long field above Baggett Lake, we expected to see him hunt down the edge with many objectives here. Although he had begun his hour with excited casts and an active tail, he shortened his range once in this long field. At 37, he was returned to the wagon when no birds were located.

Brace No. 17 paired Basilone with pointer male Southern Shadows Rick as bracemate for Hirollins B K Bushwacker, a pointer male with Bingham. Southern Shadows Rick completed his hour with a consistent medium-range race and a desire to hunt as he attacked all the right spots. At 28, he had reached the wooded area before the sign indicating the start of course 2. It was here that he scored a well-indicated and mannerly find. He stretched out and forward, crossing toward the field and approaching the "chicken/ turkey coop" area. At 54, Hirollins B K was still a bit inconsistent with range and frequent lateral casts. When he turned up missing for over 20 minutes, Bingham requested a GPS.

By brace No. 18, the gallery and helpful participants had narrowed to two handlers, two judges, one scout, and a reporter with a dog wagon driver. Wagon driver Greg Robinson willingly turned a dog loose for Kinkelaar's pointer female, Thunder Bolt's Storm. Basilone had a pointer female, Limbsmoke Urban Lullaby, and a scout. Both of these pointers were orange and white. Storm was seen once in 25 minutes: therefore, Kinkelaar took the GPS unit; however, while awaiting satellite connection, Storm returned. Limbsmoke bounded forward, passing bracemate off the line. He also was on a single track of a straight-line tour of the grounds, which led to requiring a GPS.

On a cold and frosty morning, brace No. 19 was called to the line at 8:15. Pointer male Mohawk Mill War Hawk with Bingham and setter male Erin's Thunder Backus with Kinkelaar. Mohawk Mill War Hawk had tightly laced his running gear this brisk morning; therefore, he was out of sight before the bend in the course, about two football fields from the breakaway. Nearing 20 minutes, handler called for the GPS after no one got another glimpse of him. Bracemate Erin's Thunder Backus was equally eager to be out of the box and on the ground. He zipped through the cover in a straightforward cast, where we found him stopped in the millet near the water hole at 13. A large, 20-plus covey thundered skyward while Backus obediently awaited shot and to be collared on by handler. His race was definitely forward, although usually in the path, without searching any feed areas. He did not complete his hour as he continued to race well to the front and out of sight.

Brace No. 20 found Ray with pointer male I'm Spartacus as bracemate for setter male Fort River's Lucky Charm with Basilone. These two covered the course pleasingly, which offered the gallery an opportunity to watch two nice hunting dogs with obvious birds on their minds. Spartacus scored a nonproductive at 39 shortly after the turn from Derby Road at Jacob's corner. Lucky Charm ran with great head-to-toe style, active and spirited, although, like his bracemate, he closely checked in frequently. Both maintained an animated medium-ranged race.

Brace No. 21 found pointer male Lester's Another Shockwave with Kinkelaar and bracemate pointer male Ravenwood Throwing Smoke with Basilone. The hour's excitement heightened when point was called at 13. Both dogs were stacked with high heads and erect tails as handlers flushed several quail. Throwing Smoke backed Another Shockwave at 16, where favorable birdwork was witnessed once again. Shockwave continued his strong march to the front and made a lateral ring of the bowl area in the back of course 6; however, he never made it to the front with handler. Both scout and handler made another search of the area, judge listening alertly for the call of point. Shockwave was finally located, coming to the front with handler, although he was in the wagon soon. Throwing Smoke had moved on; however, he was on a self-guided tour by this time; consequently, his handler took a GPS.

Brace No. 22 found pointer male Hirollins B K Bulletproof with Bingham as bracemate for pointer female Thunder's Bolt Agin with Kinkelaar. By 15, both dogs were down the slope and through the water. First one and then the other, stepping out in a determined march up the steep hill. At 26, we reached the mile-long field above Baggett Lake. Bulletproof made some good casts, although his race was inconsistent in range and hunting application, leading to an early pick-up. Bolt Agin ran a medium race, zipping through the feed millett rows in the long field. His name symbolizes his character: totally a little wild. He did not finish his hour.

Brace No. 23 had pointer male Smooth Talkin with Ray as bracemate with pointer male Upfront's McQuade with Kinkelaar. The afternoon sun was surprisingly warm, as evidenced when Upfront's McQuade returned after completing several good casts showing signs of heat. He was watered and picked up shortly thereafter. Smooth Talkin was seen hunting down a row of millett. He stood appropriately at 20. No birds were flown. He cast to the right and moved on; however, by 25, his eye-appealing style was not rewarded with quail being flown. Therefore, handler picked him up.

Brace No. 24 would complete the fourth day of this championship with a start time of 3:19. Filling the slot were Tug O'War, a pointer male with Kinkelaar, and Morgan's Yellow Ledbetter, a pointer male with Phil Stevenson. Hunting with a purpose and with independent casts, both dogs were forward with determination. The course here has several remaining plum bushes, although the state has cleared away many, making this area huntable. Point was called at 16 for a nice divided find. Tug O'War made some deep casts in the woods, requiring some scouting assistance. Scout called point at 30. Despite Kinkelaar

making a wide search of the area among the green saplings, he tapped the dog for a relocation. As the dog attempted a spirited relocation attempt, first one and then two quail popped up. Tug O'War's hour was over. While the gallery awaited Tug O'War to have quail flushed, we heard a shot ring out from the front part of the gallery. Ledbetter had scored a nice find at 30 minutes. For the next 20 minutes, Ledbetter hunted methodically to the front and with the handler. By 55, he had gone to the fight top of a slight knoll where a tall skeleton of an old pine tree leaned slightly left near a plum thicket. The dog made several casts in this area, although never pointed.

On Friday morning, brace No. 25 opened the final three braces of the North Carolina Championship before the beginning of the companion Derby. Bingham brought Twiggy, a pointer female, to the line as bracemate for Absolute Dominator, a pointer male with Ray. While traveling down the open cut and heading toward the water hole on the left, one dog was seen covering the ground well. There was no sight of a second dog. Twiggy was straight out the front and required some GPS assistance to be gathered up. Absolute Dominator had a well-pointed covey near the water hole at 28, with nearly a dozen lifting quail a welcomed sight. Dominator stood proudly with good manners. From the road gallery, we watched Dominator cross the dirt roads several times, nearing the bunkers; handler healed him to the top. He was whistled away to continue his strong ground race, although he still had some difficulty in handling. As time was called, he was well to the front, requiring handler and scout to ride to the front to gather him up.

Brace No. 26 called Kinkelaar to the line with pointer male Big Man On Campus as bracemate for pointer male A Buccaneer with Ray. Big Man was light in coloring and Buccaneer dark, so keeping track was easier this hour. The two skirted to the lower wooded edge and bounced merrily forward in tandem. At the corner turning away from Derby Road or Jacobs corner, Buccaneer had scout called, where he was well buried in the tall season grass. While Ray was attempting flush, Big Man's scout approached and found him standing some two football fields to the side of Buccaneer. Both handlers attempted to flush; however, with no birds put to air, the two dogs were tapped on. Big Man hunted independently wide and hard, although he did not locate any quail. Buccaneer made several good casts, returning frequently. He hunted the lower hillside of thin pines just beyond Denton Road, which looked to produce birds but did not. The hour came to an end behind the barn toward course 6.

The final brace was No. 27, with Kinkelaar bringing pointer male Hunt's Full Moon Rising to the line as bracemate with Bingham and pointer female Lady X. Moon Rising had point called by scout at 8 off to the left of the course. Quail were flown; however, Moon Rising's over-excitement caused him to be leashed. Lady X was busily investigating likely bird covers at medium range with consistent checking with handler. After a brief conversation with the judges, handler called Twiggy to heal and put her in the wagon as she was not surpassing what the judges were carrying.

At this time, everyone returned to the clubhouse, where lunch was waiting. Announcements were made, and by 1:30, the Derby stake was underway with a new pair of judges.



Companion Derby

The North Carolina Championship was completed at 11:30. The senior Calvin Curnutte had lunch waiting as the group returned to the clubhouse for announcements and lunch. At 1:15, the new Derby companion stake was ready under new judges Dennis Snyder, Thomasville, North Carolina, and Ed Jesson, Monroe, North Carolina. The judges were saddled and ready to see some 30 youngsters.

The judges of a derby stake have a more difficult job than folks acknowledge. A derby judge has to look for signs that the derby is progressing to become a national shooting dog champion to run at Ames or Sedgefields. That means he has to show style and animation on the ground, and he has to hunt in places where birds might be. He has to show range and desire to be hunting with his handler. He has to show bird interest, and if birds are located, he must at least flash point.

The judges at this venue kept great notes to share with your reporter. Thanks

for your great observations. In addition to those named as winners, the judges pointed out the great potential they saw in several other derbies. These other derbies were Backcountry Champagnesupernova with Chris Catanzarite, Calvin Curnutte with Rev Brown's Browns Contender, Doug Ray with Jett Ferebee's Hatteras Storm Watch, and Erin's Ikon with Shawn Kinkelaar. They felt that these four would soon be knocking on a championship door.

First place went to a pointer female, Miller's Upgraded Patent, handled by Doug Ray. She started out as a small pup with Jack and Fran Miller. The Millers whelped her litter with Miller's Upgraded Version x Miller's Special Edition. From there, she went to live with Harold Ray, where she began her bird dog life. Later, she became co-owned with Harold and Bob Canada. Doug Ray obviously has a key role here in training and handling at trials. The judges credited her with a gait that locks your eyes as she is in a constant forward pattern. At times, including her last 6 minutes, she would be far to the front. Some fearing she was lost. With a minute to go, she was found standing in the tall cover just before the brook crossing. She even had mature manners when several quail were flown. The judges told me that she had the nicest race of all 30 derbies: ground race, style moving, and positive bird location with mature manners when birds were flushed.

Second place went to a dog from the third brace on Friday afternoon. Rocky River Halo, pointer male, owned by Carl Lefler and Phil Stevenson. Phil was handling today, as Carl was ill and unable to attend. This orange and white young male is from a cross between Southpoint's Speedy G x Lone Tree Last Snow. He has

been with Carl and Phil since he was a small pup. Carl is usually at the Hoffman trials; he was missed this week. Rocky River Halo ranged with determined speed in a snappy motion, with casts turning to the front the whole way. He made a few extended casts, which resulted in a limb find at 10 minutes. Halo stood high and tight to await handler as scout called point. He remained mannerly for wing and shot.

Third place went to Laura Pergolizzi, known as "LP." This derby is owned by Nicole Lombardi and Doug Swingley. LP is one of Shawn Kinkelaar's promising derbies. Francis Buche bred LP with a cross between Chelsea's Thunder Bolt x Buche's Elhew Rebel. Although no birds were pointed by LP, her race took her to all the spots where birds should have been. Her race was consistent and always to the front with powerful strides. (It was announced on December 24, 2023, that her sire, Chelsea's Thunder Bolt, had passed away. Among Thunder Bolt's accomplishments were 23 open championships and four national Purina Dog of the Year awards.)



FIELD DOG STUD BOOK

Field Dog Stud Book (FDSB) is the oldest purebred dog registry in the United States providing dog owners with authentic documentation, registration, certified pedigrees and DNA services. From 1874 to 2021, the FDSB registry was managed by original publisher – the American Field Publishing Company.

On September 1, 2021, UKC announced the official acquisition of Field Dog Stud Book & the American Field Publishing Company.


The historic blending of these registries has been a strategic process. On January 1, 2024, the two registries officially step into the future as one stud book with Dual Privileges offered both retroactively and moving forward. The details below reflect the added options and eligibility now provided.

As of January 1, 2024 there are select breeds eligible to receive pedigrees under the FDSB mark. Some of those breeds are: Brittany, English Pointer, English Setter & Llewellin, Epagneul Breton, German Shorthaired Pointer, Irish Setter, and more. For a complete list, please visit ukcdogs.com/register-my-dog. Any breed not listed above may apply for registration with UKC directly and will receive the appropriate UKC registration package in return. Any dog granted FDSB registration is automatically considered Dual Priveleged in UKC and has the full privileges appropriate for its breed.
