The weather is warming up, and field trials are in full swing. I had the pleasure of riding on the first day of the Atlantic Coast Open Shooting Dog Championship. A day that started a little crisp eventually warmed up and stayed as clear of a day as one could want. It is always a pleasure to ride in events as I speak to all who contribute to this great sport. One theme never lost on me when speaking with individuals at field trials is the history and tradition behind every one of them. Each trial and grounds have its unique flare. It's always in the small details that I find the most astonishing.

An example of the small details I recently learned came from a discussion about the new course markers on the Sandhills Field Trial Grounds at Hoffman. These new markers make it easier for handlers and gallery to know where they are on the course and allow you to convey that to someone else if they are to meet you while away from the clubhouse. In this discussion, I learned about the nomenclature that existed long before identifying each course or aspects of the course, markers such as "McGee's Castle" and "Candy Cane Tree." On my last ride through Hoffman at a trial, I heard some of those terms and was a bit lost on what they referred to. I never once saw a red and white tree, and I certainly never saw a castle. But through this conversation, I learned about the interesting and sometimes comical reasons for the different names

on the course. Even with a million guesses, I would never have guessed the candy cane tree was a holly tree with candy canes placed on it years ago for a trial during the holiday season so you could ride by and grab a candy cane mid-brace.

These stories, hospitality, and dog work make field trials great and have helped them stand the test of time. I had the pleasure of experiencing all three when I rode down in Hoffman. Being a North Carolina native living not far from the trial grounds in Hoffman, I also enjoy meeting people around the lunch table and learning that we are practically neighbors. I owe many people for their hospitality, for lending me horses, and for fantastic conversation, so I sincerely thank all those individuals!

With the mention of great conversation, I recently sat down with Bernie Matthys and Dave Fletcher in the UKC podcast studio and talked about their experience as reporters. They also offered some of their advice on making a great report. They also shared some fun stories of their past experiences in the sport. Be sure to check it out! UKC COMMENDS LAW ENFORCEMENT

UKC wishes to commend Florida and Alabama law enforcement for their swift action and expert handling of a situation occurring at the Rocky Creek Field Trial Club's February event when it was reported that a suspect fired multiple shots at the trial. The suspect was not an event participant.

According to the Jackson County Sherriff's Office (JCSO) via Facebook, "Within minutes, deputies and Florida Highway Patrol Troopers were on [the] scene...A perimeter was quickly established, and the K-9 Tracking Unit was activated...the K-9 Tracking Unit was able to locate various items of evidence and, eventually, the weapon." The suspect was also apprehended, per reports online.

Based on information available via news outlets, JCSO has a number of K-9 officers on their team in separate units, from a few Belgian Shepherds named K-9 "Edge" and K-9 "Rocky," specializing in narcotics detection, to a handful of Beagles, one referred to as K-9 "Linda" in past articles, trained to track lost or fleeing individuals.

Working dogs, whether they are hunting dogs or K-9 officers in the line of duty, are the result of excellent breeding and training. Our awe and appreciation go out to the human and dog officers across the country. Our thoughts are with the injured and all impacted by the incident.

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NATIONAL AMATEUR GROUSE CHAMPIONSHIP

North Slopes Allie Named Champion; Cody's Sadie Belle, Runner-Up

The Moose River Grouse Dog Club held the 2022 National Amateur Grouse Championship on October 14-16 on Douglas County forestry land in far northwestern Wisconsin. Initially developed in 2008, these grounds have continually been reworked and improved to provide ample opportunity for dogs to find birds and show well on the ground. Grouse numbers throughout the upper Midwest have seen a significant decline in the past several years, and these grounds have not been immune to these declines. However, because these grounds are situated in prime habitat, there was an ample supply of birds.

We want to thank Purina for supporting cover dog trials. Their donation of dog food to the winners is very much appreciated. Thank you to the owners of Moose Junction Lounge, who provided a delicious spread for lunches on Friday and Saturday. We want to thank Neil Anderson, Tim Callahan, Sig Degitz, Bill Frahm, Ed Graddy, Greg Johnson, and Tim Kaufman for their hard work in clearing courses, marshaling braces, and assisting with trial details.

The Championship

We secured two very qualified judges with considerable experience handling dogs and judging in high-level competitions. Judges were Bill Frahm of Minong, Wis., and Jordan Pharris of Brainerd, Minn. They were attentive, on their toes at all times, and had a keen eye for the necessary attributes in a champion and runner-up. The first brace of the championship broke away bright and early on Friday morning with a fresh blanket of snow, making for tough going until the sun peaked in the late afternoon.

We drew 23 dogs for this event, with handlers coming from Pennsylvania, Michigan, Minnesota, and Wisconsin. Setter female, North Slopes Allie, owned and handled by Ed Graddy, was named champion. Allie ran in brace No. 8 on our Bear Bait course, starting with a very pleasing ground effort. Allie is a bit on the smaller side, runs with incredible foot speed and style, and is very exciting to watch. She was always in bell contact yet reached deep into the cover and was only seen the few times she crossed to the front through the first 20 minutes. She got on the board at 25 with a precise grouse find with excellent style and manners. She hunted hard the rest of the hour, challenging Ed with wide casts reaching the edge of bell range and beyond. Ed did a great job steering this little rocket around the course, trusting that she was to the front and would show. Those who saw her brace knew she had bested those who had already run and would be hard to beat.

Cody's Sadie Belle, a setter female owned and handled by Ryan Bjerke, was named runner-up. Sadie and Ryan are a real team in the woods. He has hunted her extensively over the last nine years, and it shows. Sadie ran in brace No. 5 of the first day as a bye-dog just as the snow was melting. Knowing that they had the course to themselves, Ryan maintained a nice gentleman's pace, which the judges appreciated. Sadie ran a forward and moderate race and was always in the pocket. At 20, Sadie's bell went silent to the front and left, in a small pocket of balsams known to hold grouse; four escaped from the balsams in front of the stylish setter who showed exceptional style and manners on this nice piece of work. She had a nice hunting effort for the rest of the hour. Showing her age a bit, Sadie did not quite have the pace or range of the champion.

Ruger was mostly forward and strong on the ground. He is quite a bird finder, pointing three woodcock and one grouse. Second place went to Hackberry's Amos Moses, owned and handled by newcomer Ben Brettingen. Moses ran a medium, forward and steady race. Earning third was Pokegama Winnie, owned and handled by Pat Golat. She impressed the judges with a strong forward race that, with a bit of polish, would have earned a higher placement.

UKC CELEBRATES ITS 125th ANNIVERSARY



UKC was founded on February 10, 1898, by then 23-year-old Chauncey Z. Bennett, shouldering its way onto the scene with tenacity, expert record-keeping processes, a focus on the all-around dog, and a savvy evaluation of what to offer based on what was missing. UKC's initial landing was not gentle. Bennett pushed for relevancy and fought to keep it. He took great pride in that anyone would take the time to write him and sternly question who he thought he was to create a dog registry in a small Michigan town (and

many did). Kalamazoo is not New York (or Chicago!), after all. In 1927, he wrote in BLOODLINES, "UKC is just three little letters, yet nine-tenths of the arguing...today is over [us]."

Fanciers and competitors alike took note. UKC was here and here to stay. Those three little letters are more than mere marks; they are an idea, a mission, and a passion that expanded rapidly through the twentieth century.

We'd have to imagine Bennett would be proud of where UKC

sits 125 years later as a world-leading dog sport organization, not to mention be wowed by the historic 2021 acquisition of American Field Publishing Co./Field Dog Stud Book, your beloved Field Trial universe, whose development pre-dates Bennett's birth by one year.

Field Dog Stud Book records go back to 1874. The original publisher, American Field Publishing Co., had stewarded and safeguarded the sport and studbook for nearly a century and a half before joining the UKC family. Though in this sense, the UKC studbook might be the "younger brother" to FDSB, the accuracy and longevity of sporting dog pedigrees is a core value shared by all members of the family.

So, while we (UKC) continue to dive deep into the American Field world of field trialing to offer you the best and supplement sport growth, know that we do it from an unshakable foundation and with a 125-year-old history in place.

There's a feeling that comes from watching a well-bred pup lock on point for the first time, unexplainable to many. These are the moments in life that hook the heart and soul and propel the lifestyle forward.

Thank you for being part of it.

The Region 1 Amateur Shooting Dog Championship commenced Saturday, October 15, in East Windsor, Conn., at the Dr. John E. Flaherty Field Trial Area with judges John Olfson and Aiden Malone mounted and ready for action. We were fogged in and got off to a late start.

Under the joint effort of the Dr. John E. Flaherty Field Trial Clubs Association, its devoted President Dick Frawley, the State of Connecticut Department of Energy & Environmental Protection, and Eastern District Wildlife Biologist Ann Kilpatrick, the grounds were in as good of condition as could be expected. We are thankful and appreciate this continued joint effort.

Miller's Unbridled Forever, a 15-time champion and five-time runner-up, was named champion.

He laid out a powerful forward race, taking edges, very classy on point with six finds. The divided find at the top of the Dearborn section of the course was particularly impressive. Both handlers flushed a large covey when his bracemate came undone; this experienced dog handled the situation perfectly. He was seen going away at time, and it took some doing for handler Brian Sanchez and scout Alex Smith to round him up. He was shown with ample time to spare.

Calico's Over The Top was named runner-up champion. Three months from turning 3, this young dog was always forward, taking edges, classy on point, and overpowered his bracemate. In my view, this dog has a very bright future. Veteran handler Alex Smith has

much to look forward to with this young dog. Bracemate Little Miss Bella, owned and handled by Tim Cavanaugh, laid out an impressive effort. She is a past runner-up champion of this event and a multiple champion in her own right, her most impressive being her National Amateur Grouse Championship win.

Westfall's Wheels Up Wins Kansas Prairie Open All-Age

The Gyp Hills Field Trial Club held the Kansas Prairie All-Age stake on the beautiful rolling red hills of the Z Bar Ranch near Medicine Lodge, Kan., beginning October 17, 2022. This was another good renewal on the 43,000-acre Z Bar contested on wild Bobwhites, pheasants, and prairie chickens. The three one-hour courses utilized travel along the hillsides and riparian areas of four different named watersheds: the Salt Fork of the Arkansas River, East and West Dry Creeks, and Cottage Creek. Each course is laid out to provide relatively equal opportunities on wild game and chances to show on big swings. This ranch is managed for wildlife and some 2,000 bison that roam among a dozen pastures. This year the Z Bar, along with most of Kansas and the high plains, was dry, and very little water was found in any of the normally flowing streams. Club and ranch helper Thane Yunker put out 100-gallon water tubs on each course, and we were blessed with unseasonably cool temperatures for the trial. Fortunately, the competitors were up to the challenge and could still find and point birds in the low humidity.

Since the club started this Purina Points and National Qualifier eight years ago, Andy Daugherty's dogs have made a habit of winning on these grounds. Andy won last year with Brad Calkins's pointer male, Westfall's River Ice, after a dug-up find along a cliffside and a deep race with showy casts. This year Andy turned loose Westfall's Wheels Up, who made quick work of course No. 2 with a solid race through the first half and through the wetland. He was found to the right, above Cottage Creek, by scout Matt Cochran. After a bit of a dicey crossing, Judge Donnie Jeffrey watched as Daugherty put a running pheasant in the air for Wheels after a nice job of handling this rooster. His finish was strong after catching the front. Joe Worsham released his Super Sport dog in the third hour, and Dave had his running shoes on early. Not seen since the three-minute mark. Joe rode ahead while scout Matt Cochran was riding high and looking. Before the tracker was considered, Super Sport came in from deep at the front to reconnect with Joe. Watered at the next gate, he quickly pointed into a plum thicket with all in order as the Bobwhites boiled out. Taken on, he was hunting the country and dug up a pheasant in a thicket in one of the many small cuts on the Z Bar, a nice find. Joe kept him in check, and the dog finished ahead to take the second-place spot. Allen Vincent handled

Sadie Firefly to a nice, though birdless, race to annex third place. Sadie kept getting stronger as the hour progressed. Bird work was at a premium, but the handlers knew their race needed to meet the standards. Texas Wild Agin had a covey of birds early in the wetland, but Vincent put the rope on him after the half due to his race shortening. Big And Wild for Matt Cochran had an unproductive early in the brace, but birds were ridden up as the gallery moved on after the dog had been taken on. Westfall's Power Trip was running a solid dog race but was sidelined by a porcupine late, probably the strongest race of this renewal.

Judges Ralph Short and Donnie Jeffrey rode attentively and knew what they were looking for. Both are wild bird hunters and enjoyed successful field trialing over the years. Donnie had a couple of all-age dogs with Randy Downs and the well-known Bill's Doublecross Slim, with which he and Bill Trabue won many shooting dog championships. Ralph and I trialed together, and he was instrumental in scouting for me when we won the AFTCA National Walking Shooting Dog Championship with Greypointe Espada in the mid-2000s.

Open Stakes

The D. Hoyle Eaton Memorial Open All-Age began on Tuesday, November 1, with a starting field of 25. This trial is run in memory of Mr. Hoyle Eaton, whose vision and dedication to these grounds and the Hell Creek Field Trial Club may never be forgotten. Taking first for the second year in a row was Lester's Storm Surge, a pointer male owned by Tommy and Bonnie Hamilton of Springfield, Ky., and handled by Gary Lester. Storm Surge was credited with three stylish finds and a big all-age race to secure the top spot. Placing second was Nosam's Sweet Water, a pointer male owned by Jeff Busby of Milsap, Tex., and handled by Larry Huffman. Sweet Water ran a strong race with one find and a back to claim his placement. Third place was Como Thunder, a pointer male owned by David and Rachel Russell of Como, Miss., and handled by Steve Hurdle. Thunder had two finds and a good race to claim third.

The Open Derby drew 24. Placing first was Miller's King Poast, owned by Jannie Chapman and handled by Gary Lester. King Poast ran to the extremes to claim the top spot. 

Lester's Storm Surge Wins Sunflower Open All-Age Classic

We want to extend a special thank you to the Mississippi Department of Wildlife and Fisheries for allowing us to run on their impeccable grounds, Hell Creek Wildlife Management Area in Blue Mountain, Miss.; Doug Arthur for driving the dog wagon/ranger; Karen Blackwell for assisting with lunches; and to our judges, Bill Mason and Perry Lacy, for traveling many miles to spend three days in the saddle looking at some of the best dogs in the country. We had 19 entries and 19 starters for the all-age and 21 entries with 20 starters for the derby. Overall, the Sunflower Classic Open All-Age and Derby stakes were both great, with 21 bird contacts total, good but hot weather for North Mississippi, and great company. Thank you to all of the handlers and owners that supported our trial.

The trial began on November 7 at a comfortable 57 degrees with a mix of sun and clouds. National Champion (2021) Coldwater Thunder, handled by Steve Hurdle, and Superstition's Final Touch, handled by Brody Byrd, were turned loose at 8 a.m. sharp. At 14, the handlers rode up on both dogs pointed on the east line of the field immediately before the first road crossing. Both handlers flushed, and the dogs were awarded a divided find. Hurdle called point for Coldwater Thunder at 49 in the southeast corner of the big field before the pines that lead to the second road crossing; however, Superstition's Final Touch failed to back and was ordered up. Hurdle took Thunder on without flushing. Thunder continued with a productive find at 57 on the east line after the road crossing and finished strong to the front just this side of the church.

Bonner's Hot Rize, handled by Gary Lester, and Beeler's Texas Jig, handled by Scott Beeler, turned loose at 9:27 at the old house. We rode up the first ditch crossing to see Texas Jig pointed at the end of the big field. Hot Rize made a nice cast on the south side of the field and backed appropriately. Beeler released his dog but could not come up with any birds, so he took the unproductive, and both dogs continued until shortly after the second road crossing behind the old house when Beeler picked Beeler's Texas Jig up at his discretion. Hot Rize finished the hour deep at the end of the long bottom.

The third brace of the morning turned loose at 10:59 with Knight's Little John, handled by Gary Lester, and Como Thunder, handled by Steve Hurdle, taking the field in front of the clubhouse. Como Thunder had a productive limb find at the end of the big field at the

gap before we turn left to go through the pines, followed by a find at 55 at the gap at the end of the horseshoe field before we head back east to cross Hell Creek. Lester picked Little John up at 55. Como Thunder finished the brace strong just across Hell Creek.

Whippoorwill Vette, handled by Larry Huffman, and Superstition's Jake, handled by Brody Byrd, took the first brace after lunch with temps in the low 70s and sunny skies. Jake scored a nice find in the pines after the first road crossing at 18; however, he failed to back at the end of the pines before they drop off into the bottom at 21 and was ordered up. Vette landed a perfect find at 21 and continued strong to the front in the bottom along Hell Creek until he was stopped at 41 by another great find on the south side of the field immediately after the first ditch crossing. The competition cranked up as Vette scored two more impeccable finds at 48 and 56, finishing strong just this side of the church. He was later awarded second place for his performance.

Lester's Storm Surge, handled by Gary Lester, and Smoke Roll, handled by Steve Hurdle, had the fifth brace of the day. We rode up the first ditch crossing to see Storm Surge rounding the southeast corner shortly before a find stopped him in the bottom. Smoke Roll was picked up for a failure to back, and Storm Surge went on to finish the brace strong at the end of the long bottom.

The last brace of the day included performances by Como Rain, handled by Steve Hurdle, and Lester's Storm Chaser, handled by Gary Lester. Both dogs rounded the left edge in the second field and stormed through the pines before crossing Hell Creek, with Como Rain continuing as a gliding white speck along the left edge of the second field. He was stopped for finds at 47 and 53. Lester picked up at 53, and Como Rain completed the hour strong.

Coldwater Spectre, handled by Weldon Bennett, and Lester's Boss Man, handled by Gary Lester, had the first brace of the warm, 60 degree morning of November 8. The dogs crossed the road headed into the pines, and we rode up on them, pointing at 21 towards the end of the pines. They were awarded a divided find and finished the hour by the silos. Lester's Shockwave, handled by Gary Lester, and Miller's White Reign, handled by Brody Byrd, had the second brace of the morning. We rode up the first ditch crossing to see the dogs at the end of the field, where they both stopped for a productive divided find. They went on to have another divided find at the island's end of

A beautiful, sunny fall morning greeted the first brace with a new addition to Gary Lester's string, Haney's Storm Warning, and bracemate Whippoorwill Vette and Larry Huffman. Storm Warning had two stylish finds and a stop to flush but had not gotten used to Lester being in charge yet. They will be an exciting team to watch when they get on the same page. Vette had a breach of manners and was picked up. Lester and Lester's Storm Chaser paired up with Dr. Fred Corder and Game Heir for the second hour. Storm Chaser had a find, back, and two unproductives. Game Heir had two finds, two backs, and finished the hour. Korry Rinehart guided C S Code Blue to two finds, and Weldon Bennett with Coldwater Spectre suffered an unproductive as temperatures approached the mid-70s during the third hour.

After a delicious lasagna lunch topped off with the best apple cake, prepared and served by Joy Lester, all were at the line for brace No. 4. Short sleeves and water bottles were popular items for

the 75+ degree afternoon. Lester finished Lester's Boss Man with two finds, and Corder with Game Wardon scored two early finds but seemed to have been left behind as Corder collected his tracking unit with 36 minutes left in the brace. Bonner's Hot Rize scored a find, but Lester asked for the tracker when Hot Rize decided to go his way. Burke Hendrix's dog, Hendrix's Touch Up, was picked up after a breach of conduct. The final hour of the day turned out to be the most exciting pairing of the trial. Reigning National Champion Lester's Shockwave and Nosam's Sweet Water, handled by Larry Huffman, put on a show for all. Both dogs moved through the large grounds rimming the edges with ease and taking direction from both handlers with minimal effort. True all-age out-front races at Hell Creek are sure fun to watch. Shockwave finished with three finds and Sweet Water with two as the late afternoon heat started to subside.

Lester was up again in brace No. 7 with Lester's Storm Surge and veteran handler Billy Blackwell with Como Rain. Storm Surge blew out the front with a huge ground race and finished with one find and two backs. Rain had a good find, an unproductive, but didn't mind his manners on the Storm Surge find and was picked up. The final pairing of the all-age was Knight's Little John (Lester) and Coldwater Odyssey (Bennett). Both handlers knew they were not getting the job done, and both picked up just before 30.

The all-age winners were announced after another wonderful lunch from Mrs. Joy. All enjoyed barbeque sandwiches, Kentucky burgoo, and peach cobbler with ice cream. Lester's Shockwave, owned by Tommy and Bonnie Hamilton, was the winner of the Open All-Age. Second place went to Nosam's Sweet Water, owned by Jeff Busby. Third place went to Lester's Storm Surge, also owned by the Hamiltons.

The Ricky Chism Memorial Derby started with two nice edge-hugging, big-running pointer males. Bill had a find and an unproductive and finished the hour. Haney's All In (Todd) and Mayfield Storm Charger (Lester) were loose for the last hour of Friday. All In scored twice, and Charger three times, backing

All In once.

The short sleeves of Thursday and Friday were covered with many layers Saturday morning as temperatures plummeted to the mid-30s, cloudy with a biting north wind. Scott Beeler and Beeler's White Knight were ready and waiting, as were Todd and Southern Shadow Bob, for the 7:30 a.m. "turn 'em loose." White Knight pleased the judges with a big race. Bob backed Knight twice and went birdless. Ike Todd ran solo in the final three hours as his opponent for braces No. 6 and 7 scratched, due to handler illness, and he was a bye-dog in the final. NATIONAL AMATEUR PHEASANT CHAMPIONSHIP

Pendy's Good Grace Wins 91st Renewal; Erin's Southern Comfort Named Runner-Up By Jim Pendergest | Berea, Kentucky | November 11, 2022

The 91st renewal of the National Amateur Pheasant Championship concluded on Sunday, November 13, with judges Scott Kermicle and Chris Sellers naming Pendy's Good Grace champion. Grace is owned and handled by Matt Pendergest of Georgetown, Ky., and successfully defended her title from 2020 and 2021, making her third consecutive title in this stake. Erin's Southern Comfort, owned by Sean and Sean Patrick Derrig and handled by Sean Patrick, was named runner-up.

The National Amateur Pheasant Championship is the second oldest of the 16 National Amateur Championships, following only the National Amateur Quail Championship. A comprehensive review of the history of the National Amateur Pheasant Championship was included in the report of the 2020 running. As a brief review, the inaugural running was held in 1933 in Oneida, N. Y., then

moved to Buffalo, N. Y., until 1946, when it moved to Cranbury, N. J., until 1952. It was held at Indiantown Gap, Pa., for one year and Woodland, Calif., for one year, and then to Baldwinsville, N. Y., until 1963, when it moved to Killdeer Plains Wildlife Area near Harpster, Ohio. From 2010 through 2020, it was held in Dresden. Due to the decline in entries at the Dresden location, the decision was made to move the trial two years ago. Originally plans were to run the championship at Pyramid State Park in Pinckneyville, Ill., from November 18-21. Although dates were initially granted for the trial on those grounds and those dates, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources later rescinded due to deer hunting season. After juggling club dates at the Central Kentucky Wildlife Management Area, it was made available to host the trial in 2021 and may have found its new home.

Judges for this renewal were Scott Kermicle of Dawson Springs, Ky., and Chris Sellers of Selmer, Tenn. Both Scott and Chris are experienced judges. Scott recently retired from managing a hunting preserve in northern Kentucky, and Chris trains and handles his dogs at various venues in the south. They gave each dog their full attention, and the results were well received. The AFTCA and participating members appreciate their service to the sport.

Special thanks also go out to Pam Tucker for arranging the lunches and snacks for the dog wagon, including delicious sausage sandwiches on French toast. Thanks to Buster Tucker and Tim Hammons for releasing pheasants and assisting with marshaling. Thanks to Kristine Hammons and Matt Pendergest, who also helped to marshal as needed. Special appreciation also goes to Piper Huffman for handling the ad for the trial, the drawing, and many other details.

As always, these trials are only possible with the support of Purina and Greg Blair. Purina dog food was awarded to both the winner and runner-up and was received with great appreciation.

The Winners

Pendy's Good Grace was braced with Crouse's Equalizer in Saturday's last brace. Released from the old house breakaway, both dogs were shown at the far end of the first bottom on impressive opening casts. The pair crossed the creek on the far left toward Bearwallow woods. Grace returned shortly afterward, but Equalizer continued in that direction and would be seen no more. Scout called point for Grace at 6 with a nice covey resulting for the mannerly female.

Grace was swinging nicely to the front and responding to Pendergest. A second quail find resulted in the feed strip along the Agee house. Released from this at 20, she went 300 yards and slammed on to point. A pheasant was produced for the stand, giving Pendergest some relief that she had the necessary pheasant find to contend for the title. Grace was released from this and took the left side of the tree line that intersects the Agee bottom. Going up the opposite side of the tree line, she was pointing again. Her fourth was again a covey of quail. Grace was pointed out, rimming the Drive Inn field, and disappeared to the right front. At 32, the call of point came from the scout near the Clubhouse woods. The fifth find was a nice covey of quail, and was picturesque. Across the blacktop and back to the North side, she continued with her strong forward pattern, rimming one field after another. A short absence from 48 to 55 occurred, but she showed the front to finish strong in the Dewey bottoms.

Erin's Southern Comfort was braced with Crouse's Quiet Man and started from the Mailbox breakaway. Man and Comfort were right off the breakaway, with Comfort coming to Derrig at 6 near the Drive Inn field. Man would not be seen again. Comfort scored at 9 on a rooster pheasant near the Clubhouse woods. The style was a straight-up tail and high head with excellent manners. Comfort was in tune with Derrig, coming back to check in periodically after his bigger swings. Comfort was out of pocket at the Old House and returned from behind as we reached Bearwallow woods. Derrig showed him on a big swing around the feed strip just past Bearwallow woods and then was gone for a spell before coming to Derrig at the Agee house. He had to be ridden for as he swung to the left toward the Drive Inn field as the course turned to the right at the Goose Pond woods. Comfort was absent for a spell after this but returned from the front at 53. Derrig called point shortly after pickup time, with Comfort scoring on a covey of quail to secure the runner-up title.

The Running

Casey Creek Crystal Ice (Tucker) with Dialed In (Pendergest). Breaking away from the clubhouse on Saturday morning in a cold rain, Crystal was available through the Dewey bottoms, while Dialed

In was not seen until 8, just before crossing the concrete culvert. At 10, the scouts called point, and Crystal was pointing with Dialed In backing. All was in order with a running pheasant. At 12, a pheasant was in the air, and Dialed In was harnessed. Crystal scored on quail at 18, and after conferring with judges, Tucker leashed Crystal to end the brace.

Morgan's Yellow Ledbetter (Morgan) with Storm's End (Pendergest). Both dogs were gone to the left off the breakaway, with Ledbetter returning from the rear at 8. An encounter with a pheasant at 9 resulted in Morgan being handed the tracker. End showed to the front at 15 and proceeded to make some nice casts through the bottoms past the Old House location and Bearwallow woods. End was credited with a good quail find at 32 on the pine tree line before the Agee house. Two minutes later, she added a nice find on a running pheasant. Rougher weather had set in, with rain turning to ice at times as temperatures were in the low 30s with significant wind. The scout was calling point at 41, and a long ride back to the dog ensued, with quail being produced for a third find. End cast to the left front as the course swung to the right around the Goose Pond woods and would be seen no more under judgment.

Little More Shine (Hammons) with Blue Eyed Dream (Turner). Shine scored nicely on quail at 8 and was seen sparingly afterward, with the tracker requested at 38. Dream was fresh off her runner-up placement in the Kentucky Open Shooting Dog Championship and performed well for Turner throughout the hour but without the benefit of bird work.

Awakened (Pendergest) with Erin's Grey Justice (Derrig). Both dogs showed well early on and searched the likely spots with no results. Justice crossed the road at the round woods and was ridden for but not returned and the tracker was requested at 40. Awakened was staying in contact and negotiating the first course's back turn. After crossing the blacktop road, she made a big swing toward the Agee house and handler road to the front and called point. A covey of quail was produced here. She finished near the south trap range but without a pheasant contact.

Erin's Country Rebel (Derrig) with Crouse's White Dragon (Schalk). Breaking from the mailbox, both dogs were shown to the front at the Drive Inn field, and point was called by Derrig for Rebel at 9 with a large covey of quail produced. Manners were excellent for the handsome pointer. Dragon was missing at this juncture but returned to Schalk at the Old House location. Both dogs were shown behind Bearwallow woods, but that would be the last seen of Dragon. Rebel continued with a strong forward pattern, and a second stand at 58 resulted in an unproductive.

Pendy's Good Grace (Pendergest) with Crouse's Equalizer (Crouse) was detailed earlier.

Sunday morning was cold with a slight drizzle, but an improvement over the cold rain of Saturday morning.

Crouse's Tennessee Game Kate (Crouse) with Erin's Rebel Attraction (Sheehan). Attraction was showing nicely early and went out the right corner past the concrete culvert at 12. He returned to the front at 23 in the big bottom. Point was called from a distance near the sow pond. A relocation was required on running quail, and a jump at flush and shot ended Attraction's bid. Kate was biddable for Crouse and hunting the likely spots but could not make game contact today. She finished strongly and headed toward the Drive Inn field.

Crouse's Quiet Man (Crouse) with Erin's Southern Comfort (Derrig) was detailed earlier.

The bye-dog, Imagine (Pendergest), was released from the Old House breakaway and was shown crossing the far front tree line. When the party got to the crossing, he stood with a high head and tail. A pheasant was produced here with all in order. Released to the left, he was shown on a good swing and reappeared in front at 9. At 14, the handler's hat was in the air, and another pheasant was produced along the pine tree line before the Agee house. A stand at

23 had only feathers from a quail kill. Another stand at 25 resulted in an unproductive. Imagine was last seen at 38 and returned from the front shortly after the tracker was handed off to end the hour and conclude the stake.

The 2022 AFTCA National Amateur Walking Shooting Dog Championship was run November 11-13 at Keith Wright's Redwood Farm, near Covington, Ind.

The Redwood Farm is the perfect place to show a walking shooting dog with rolling hills, edges, feed strips, and plenty of cover that allows dogs to make moves while staying completely in tune with the handler. Most importantly, there were plenty of birds again as every brace had bird contact, with many having multiple covey finds. The field was filled with tough competition full of numerous champions and many that will have their day soon enough. The Wrights did it again, knocking their hospitality out of the park, being the best hosts of any field trial I've ever attended, and from the feedback received, I don't think I was alone in that belief. Thank you to every handler who traveled to make this a great

championship.

Our champion, Craig's Runin Roxie, came from the final brace on the first day, brace No. 8. After her bracemate was picked up for failing to back at 15, she had the course to herself. Her application was consistently forward at a nice walking shooting dog range requiring very little handling. During her hour, she had six pieces of bird work at 14, 28, 38, 42, 43, and 56, which she handled as a champion should.

Our runner-up champion, Dave's Sho Me Motu, came out of brace No. 11. Tu's application was again consistently forward and well suited for a walking shooting dog. Tu finished the hour with five finds at 5, 14, 24, 36 (great lengthy relocation), 48, and a rabbit at 58

We want to thank the judges, Mike Jackson of Battle Ground, Ind., and William Smith of Moscow, Tenn., who took time out of their busy schedules to watch this great field of dogs while giving their utmost attention to each dog over the weekend.

We also want to thank our sponsors for their continued support; Purina and Garmin provided dog food and collars for our champion and runner-up champion.

Our judges were Marcus Ramseur from New Jersey and Lance Felty from Ohio. Both gentlemen have spent time in the saddle judging and handling pointing dogs. Marcus is an English pointer owner/handler, and Lance is a German shorthaired pointer owner/handler; both judges actively campaign their dogs.

Our champion, Hi N's Allison Miranda ("Allie"), owned and handled by Kirk Loftin, has had a successful trip here on the East Coast, leaving a great impression on the judges coming out of the last brace. Allie filled the huge lines on the Wye Island grounds and stayed in the pocket. She checked in several times after short absences running the lines, swinging in the deep pockets, ducking in, and using the wind while the handler pointed her out. She scored

several finds throughout the hour, all with style and manners. One find was a pheasant in which the judges noted her intensity was impeccable. Her performance earned her the championship title.

The runner-up champion, Uodibar's Robbi Jo ("Robbi"), came from the third brace on the first day. Robbi is owned and scouted by Sherri Tangsrud and handled by Kirk Loftin. Robbi started the hour with a strong forward cast using the wind in her favor. She ran a solid all-age race around the island in search of game. She was found to the front, standing on all of her finds. She stood her birds with great style and manners and was able to pin down a moving pheasant. Judges noted that she was a pleasure to watch on the ground. She handled kindly and finished to the front. Robbi is a classy, stylish bird dog that complemented the champion nicely.

It was a great day to be in the saddle for our Open Shooting Dog judges, Daren Boyer from Grantham, Pa., and Roger Dvorak from Elkton, Md. We had an exciting full day and a morning of watching the shooting dogs compete the following day. Out of the 14 contenders, most dogs ran the entire hour, and only a few dogs this year outran the course or were in breach of manners. Due to the added cover this year, we increased our quail planting areas, thus providing extra opportunities for the dogs to encounter game.

Hi N's Curtain Call ("Charlie"), owned and handled by Hank Lewis and scouted by Dina Lewis, coming out of brace No. 1B, was named champion. Charlie broke away very strongly and immediately went on point in the back corner of the breakaway field. He had good style and manners throughout this small covey find. Charlie stuck to the edges and showed well in the big fields. Charlie and his bracemate went around the course, having multiple finds and backs until his bracemate was picked up at 40 for breach of manners. Charlie responded well to the handler and required little scouting. He finished with plenty of fuel left in his tank. A first-rate shooting dog performance earned Charlie the championship win.

Runner-up champion awarded to Stoney Hill's Pinnacle Dee ("Dee"), owned and handled by Kirk Loftin and scouted by Sherri Tangsrud, ran in brace No. 2B. Dee had a solid forward big shooting dog race and responded well to the handler. She had several spaced-out finds, and all was in order with good style. Dee finished as strong as she started and completed the hour with ease, a well-deserved placement for Kirk Loftin and Dee.

The last stake of the Region 3 Championship was the Derby

Classic on Tuesday afternoon, November 15. Judges Daren Boyer and Roger Dvorak enjoyed watching these young prospects run around the island in search of game. The course we ran was an out-and-back, starting at the Breakaway field on the right-hand side of the island out and back.

First place was awarded to Hi N's Laying It Down Sally ("Sally"), owned and handled by Barry Bollinger. Sally was a pleasure to watch on the ground; she had a strong, fast run and hunted the course hard. She stayed forward most of the time and had a wide range. Her ground speed awarded her first place.

Second place went to brace High Standings Finger On The Trigger ("Trigg"), owned and handled by Anthony Rusciano. Trigg was consistent with the first-place dog. He broke away strong and fast to the front. He quickly settled in and responded to the handler. Trigg held the edges and finished the brace as hard as he started with plenty of go left in him.

Third place was awarded to BDK Ragin' Roo ("Roo"), owned by Cameron Bell and Darcy Calder and handled by Barry Bollinger. This young dog made nice casts and ran a consistent race. Roo stayed to the front but was a little erratic at times, finishing strong and forward.

Congratulations to all the derby owners and handlers on your up-and-coming dogs. These juvenile dogs are on track to have an outstanding field trial career, and we look forward to reading about their future accomplishments.

The Running

Brace No. 1—Bo (Claire Street) and Sassy (Katie Bell Varner). Bo was on point at 5, but birds were elusive, bracemate Sassy backed. Then Sassy went on point at 6, and Bo backed; birds were flushed. Katie raised her hat a second time at pick-up, and birds were again put into flight.

Brace No. 2—Sammy (Sterling Woodruff, Junior Division) and TW Trouble (Addison McDuffie). Sammy, Sterling, and his pony, Shiny, were quite a team. Sammy had three finds along the gravel road. Sterling was outfitted handsomely upon his trustworthy steed, which handled as well as his bird dog! Addison and Trouble weren't as well rewarded for their efforts. Trouble ran big and hunted the piney woods impressively but didn't have any bird work.

Brace No. 3-Jill (Sterling Woodruff, Junior Division) and TW

Passion (Addison McDuffie). Sterling and Addison were braced together again with Jill and Passion. Jill handled well for her young handler, but no birds were found. Passion had one beautiful covey find at 16, but the heat was visibly taking its toll on this contender. Both dogs finished well!

Brace No. 4—Ann (Hayes Green) and Sam (Katie Bell Varner). Ann went hunting deep to the left, and we went right, so her scout went to retrieve her at pickup, but no birds. Hayes had the best handler's voice out there! Sam hunted hard for Katie and was always to the front. He went on point at 6, but there was only a pile of feathers, and Katie took her on. No other bird work.

Brace No. 5—Josie (Reese Green) and Jag (Kira Jenkins). Exciting brace, both dogs hunted well with strong gun dog ground races. Reese and Josie had two good finds; the first was at 8 with birds in flight before the handler could flush, and the second was a divided find at 13. Kira and Jag had two finds; the first was the divided find at 13, and the second was at pickup with a memorable relocation.

Brace No. 6—Jack (Hayes Green, Junior Division) and Lucky (Claire Street). Hayes returned for another round, this time with Jack, who had his first find at 5. His second came at 14, where there were no birds but a bunch of feathers, and then a divided find at 19. Claire and Lucky had the divided find at 19.

Brace No 7—Sally (Daley Dalton) and Jenny (Shelby Street, Junior Division. The birds were elusive for Sally and Daley, with the first point finding feathers at 8 and the second finding no birds or feathers at 12. Jenny and Shelby had a single find at 10.

Brace No. 8—Bo (Reese Green) and Belle (Shelby Street, Junior Division). Bo hunted close to Reese for the full 20 minutes but did not have any bird work. Belle and Shelby's performance was strong and stylish, with Belle hunting forward and deeper than the course path. All three covey finds at 6, 10, and 19 were flushed easily by Shelby, impressing the judges.

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TEXAS OPEN SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Upfront's McQuade Named Champion; Valiant Heir, Runner-Up

ommencing Tuesday, November 15, immediately following a gun deer season at Camp Robinson SUA, we started the fall season calendar of trials with the Texas Open Shooting Dog Championship. Recently we have had a shift in management, policy, and direction by the regional supervisor biologist, Stephen Fowler, and his assistant, Brad Carner, on Camp Robinson's field trial grounds. Camp Robinson has been one of the classic field trial grounds from its conception, pitting dog, horse, and handler against wild birds with open savannah grass fields that held weedy edges and Bobwhite quail. The new policy proposed by Fowler and Carner included summer burns in August. Some of this was in response to their past inefficient management of the sweet gums that took over when they went to a three-year burn rotation. The AGF also started a no bush hog policy. Without a spring burn and some bush hogging, the grounds would be too thick for trialing. The final result is a patchwork of heavier than desired cover, some just right and some too thin.

We moved six to eight wild coveys of birds per day due to the volunteer efforts by a dedicated group of field trialers that released at their expense 5,000 quail. This dedicated group also has been responsible for feeding the birds as well. As a general note, by December, these are wild birds. They act like wild birds, meaning they feed when the weather is optimum for them to survive. When it is cold and frosty in the mornings, they won't leave the roost until mid-morning. When the weather is bad, they lay up under cover. For a dog to find quail, it must hunt for them. They are not along a mowed path. A dog also must be lucky enough to draw a time that the birds are moving naturally, feeding. Several dogs accomplished this feat in these trials. All of them were real bird dogs you would be proud to put in your kennels and take hunting.

Before we get into the running, I need to thank our sponsor, Purina, for their generous support and the wonderful products they make to support our animals. Thank you, Greg Blair, for your efforts. Thanks to Roger Martin, who drove the dog wagon, always at the right place and time. Thanks to my wife, Sandy Van Horn, who ensured snacks were on the wagon and that lunch was hot and ready at the break. Ronnie Miller was in the saddle for every brace as marshal, as was Rita Ornsby. These are the people that made the event happen. Thank you so much for your efforts!

Our judges, Tony King from north central Missouri and Dennis

Sneed from Effingham, Ill., both have considerable experience in the field trial world. Tony King currently has a strong competitor with Andy Daugherty. Dennis Sneed shared multiple accounts of his all-age experience during dinner one night. Both men have strong all-age backgrounds, and their judgments reflected that. They were searching for a dog with solid ground effort first with bird work.

This year we tried something different: Day Money. Thank you, Dennis Sneed, for your helpful advice on this topic. The top dog of the day received \$250 (the champion and runner-up did not receive Day Money). The winners were announced at the end of the trial. I am not sure we accomplished much with Day Money and would recommend anyone contemplating trying it to do more research than we did.

Our champion, Upfront's McQuade, handled by Shawn Kinkelaar, ran in the second brace in the afternoon on the second day. McQuade was braced with Hale's High Flyer, handled by Eddie Taylor. The dogs were released on top of the mountain. Both dogs hit the ground, digging. High Flyer did not make the turn at Dead Horse Curve at 15, and Taylor asked for the tracker. McQuade swung wide at Seawright's Cut and had to be gathered. Kinkelaar had him under control by the Oak Tree parking lot. Late in the stake with strong ground effort but no birds, Kinkelaar sent his charge up the right side of the big field heading toward the Nursery Pond. McQuade was running down Nursery Pond Road past an old bi-colored patch with a feeder. The reporter called the flight of the birds, and Tony King confirmed them. We rode to the hillside and found McQuade buried in a thicket, still pointing with style. Kinkelaar fired his gun. The judges wanted to see McQuade finish. Kinkelaar released his dog and hunted him to the Fox Pen, where he was picked up.

Our runner-up champion ran in the first brace of the second morning, braced with last year's Purina Top Shooting Dog of the Year, Wind Ridge Sugar Plum. Our start was delayed by heavy frost, which is unusual for Arkansas this time of year. Part of the new management plan by the AG&F was summer burns. The first 30 minutes of the morning course had been burned by the AG&F in August. The drought kept the cover from coming back. It turned out to be a wonderful place to show a running dog, but it did not have enough cover to hold birds on the burnt ground. Both dogs took in the country with big strides. At the mountain crossing, Valiant Heir swung wide to the right and had to be gathered as we crossed.

Sugar and Taylor had already crossed the mountain and made the shooting range turn when Heir came down the paved road past the dog wagon. Heir styled up into a handsome point at approximately 15 feet from where ten riders and a doe had passed minutes before. Shawn looked over his shoulder at Dennis Sneed as if to ask what he expected. Dennis said, "If it were my dog, I'd flush." Shawn got off his horse and flushed a large covey of quail. Heir recaptured the front, finishing strong. Sugar was lost at 50 but was found on point.

Star had her first find at 20. Kinkelaar had just dispatched scout Robby Robinson to look for Star. Robby went 30 feet, and a huge covey erupted, flushed by the horse; Star was standing motionless where the birds lifted. Additional birds lifted when Shawn retrieved his charge. Star's second find came at 75, by the nursery pond; everything was in order for flush and shot. Start finished to the front, still digging, exhibiting the qualities the stake was formed to show. Indeed a solid Endurance performance.

Silver W Jill Z, managed by Shawn Kinkelaar, ran in the last brace of day two with Whiteway Anarchy (Taylor). Anarchy was gone at 30, leaving Jill Z with the same course she won the championship a couple of years back, the third course in the afternoon. Jill Z scored early with a find at 20. Everything about this dog says Endurance, always hunting, driving, and to the front. Unfortunately, I did not get to watch it as I was with the other judge. Jill Z went on to score

another find and finish strong. People that watched both efforts felt it was a toss-up on which was better. The judges that watched every jump named Star.

The Char-Lee trial was held at the Cecil B. Webb field trial grounds on November 26-27, 2022. As is usual with this group of field trialers, all the entries appeared the night of the drawing, Friday, November 25, and a large entry it was, unusual in the fact that there was an equal number of dogs entered in each event: 14 shooting dogs, 14 derbies, 14 all-age dogs.

It was said that the eye of Hurricane Ian passed directly over our field trial grounds near Punta Gorda. The damage was extensive. We owe one of our own a debt of gratitude for hauling his company's heavy equipment from hours away to be the first to start the cleanup process of the horrible mess that Ian left behind. QUAIL CHAMPIONSHIP INVITATIONAL

History Of This Time-Honored Stake; Haney's Storm Warning Wins 59th Renewal

66It was a blustery morning on the first day of May 1866. Gathered at Cannock Chase, a beautiful country estate, near Stafford, England, were a number of Keen sportsmen; men who loved field shooting, pastimes in the open, and bird dogs. They met here on this early day in May for the purpose of competing their Pointers and Setters in actual competition in order to ascertain their real qualities as compared with one another.

This was not the first field trial that was ever seen in England, because the year before, a tentative event of this nature had taken place in connection with the Islington show at Southill. No reliable account of those first trials was ever published, however. Nevertheless, that initial venture created considerable discussion among bird dog owners, but the enterprise at Stafford the following year, although in actual fact the second field trial for bird dogs for which the public has knowledge, in reality may be taken as the starting point from where the great sport has grown and expanded.

As might be supposed, this being an experiment, the trials were more or less a crude affair, but the right spirit was behind them. Those men who ventured forth on this uncharted sea were resolved upon instituting a clean game in the realm of bird dog sports. At that period there were no public stud books, and dog shows had been instituted only a few years before. Therefore, the sportsman looking for a stud dog had no means to guide him than to follow the winners in each bench competition or take the owner's word for it in regard to the dog's field qualifications. Just as naturally, every owner saw his dog in the best light, considering that he had no means of comparing them with others in an organized contest." (National Field Trials, W. F. Brown pg. 13)

Field trials began to grow in popularity from these humble beginnings, and eight years later would cross the Atlantic Ocean to America. The first recognized field trial in America was held in 1874, just east of Memphis, Tenn., along with the renewals in 1875 and 1876.

Anyone quickly recognizes the Avent name in any way associated with field trials. James M. Avent, the Fox of Hickory Valley, had grown up with his dogs since he was not required to work at any

job. He led a privileged life as a child of an affluent family. He spent his youth in the outdoors with his hounds and bird dogs. He was a breeder from an early age. He took his dog inside the classroom with him when he was only six years old with the edict from his father to his teacher, "the dog stays, or you go." His love of sporting dogs would never diminish, and it was a natural progression for him to enter the field trial arena.

The land around Hickory Valley, Tenn., and Grand Junction, only eight miles away, abounded with quail. Avent set out to promote the area to bring field trials to Grand Junction. It would take Avent until 1881 to see the first trial in Grand Junction. That was the year when P. H. Bryson of Memphis sought out Avent to engage his help in establishing field trials there. Avent laid out the courses, and his dream of field trials in Grand Junction became a reality. The trial was a huge success, and Avent's vision was one of the catalysts for the growth of early field trials in America.

Initially, all field trials were local trials. These trials were initially suitable, but the competition was only confined to local dogs. These trials existed for about 14 years until 1895, when Mr. W. W. Titus authored an article published in the American Field Magazine in which he proposed what would become the Field Trial Champion Association. Owners had begun questioning whether the existing competitions recognized the best of the competing dogs on a larger venue. Pointing dog trials were being contested at the time, but a championship trial still needed to be established, and therefore the best of the best could not be agreed upon. The Championship Association was formed, and the first meeting occurred in Newton, N. C., in November 1895. The new Association quickly formulated a plan to host the first championship stake, the National Championship. The inaugural running took place at West Point, Miss., on February 10, 1896. The goal of the National Championship was to "promote a championship through which superior bird dogs can be brought to the front; and that great quality-stamina-so necessary to a useful to a field dog, be encouraged."

The National heats were set at three hours, except for the 1902 event that featured three half-hour heats for the only time in the

history of the occasion. There was no mistaking that it would test the stamina of any dog who completed the grueling 180 minutes. A second series was common in the early years, but a callback was not mandatory to be crowned the new champion. There are no qualifying series in the National because the dog entered has to be qualified beforehand, as determined by the National Championship Association before the dog enters the competition. The National Championship satisfied the participants that this stake was the ultimate in determining a dog's best attributes for about 20 years. Before 1916, discussions began of a more demanding event to test a bird dog's stamina and overall qualities. The debates led to the birth of the Free-For-All Championship, which was initially contested in 1916. The format was to have a one-hour qualifying series and then a mandatory three-hour callback. The organizers of this arrangement agreed that this format would be a greater test of a dog's stamina, endurance, and desire. Any dog could be entered into the competition. All comers were welcome regardless of breed or field trial placements, as is the case today.

As time progressed, another trial to test a dog's stamina was introduced, and in 1935 the Continental Championship entered the endurance trial community. The format was for a one-hour qualifying series and then an hour and fifty-minute mandatory second series to determine the new champion. The National, the Continental, and the Free-For-All achieved the goals set to test the durability and physical challenge, the hunting desire, and the hunting in all weather conditions. As the sport continued to grow, talk began to question whether these three events determined the best of the best, as the requirements to enter were not overly restrictive.

The idea of a trial contested by invitation-only invitees began to take root. Those invited would be the dogs who were the most consistent winners on the circuit based on a point system developed by the host club. Members of the Southern Amateur Field Trial Club met in Albany, Ga., in the early years of the 1940s decade to hammer out the details. The trial would be contested over three successive days. A qualifying series of one-hour braces would be run the first two days. At the judges' discretion, three or more braces of a two-hour duration would be run on the third day to determine the winner. The field would be composed of the 16 dogs selected from the best performers on the circuit. Supposedly, the best, most consistent 16 dogs competing in field trials. The committee identified the trials designated as "points trials" to calculate the points earned by the placements in these trials. This new affair was christened the Quail Championship.

The inaugural running was held in Albany, Ga., on December 30, 1940. The winner received \$1000, and the runner-up garnered \$500. The judges were Emory Beetham of Cleveland, Ohio, and Henry Banks of Guerryton, Ala. The trial was run as advertised, and The Texas Ranger emerged as the 1941 Quail Champion. Jack Harper handled him for owner D. B. McDaniel of Houston, Tex. The runner-up was Tarheelia's Lucky Strike, handled by Earl Crangle for owner Gerald Livingston of Quitman, Ga.

The 1942 format was the same as the 1941 edition, except that all 16 dogs would compete all three days. Emory Beetham of Cleveland, Ohio, and Henry Banks of Guerryton, Ala., returned to judicate. Tarheelia's Lucky Strike had come close the previous year to gaining the top spot. He would not be denied again. He was declared the 1942 Quail Champion. Earl Crangle handled again for Gerald Livingston. Spunky Creek Nina, handled by O. S. Redman for owner L. A. Henning was named runner-up.

World tensions interrupted the running of the Quail Championship after the 1942 edition. It would be 22 years before the trial would be resurrected in a new location with an expanded name.

The establishment of the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area provided a venue suitable for championship-caliber field trials. The West Kentucky Field Trial Club had the vision to host an open stake known as the Kentucky Quail Classic, and in 1960

that vision became a reality. The club also had a secondary vision to rebirth the Quail Championship. In 1963, Purina established a Top Field Trial Dog award program which allowed a means to identify the top performers of the field trial season. Consistency is the driving factor that allows these points to be harvested. With a points system in place, the club invited the top 12 performers to Paducah, Ky., to compete on the WKWMA grounds. The format would be the same as the '41 and '42 events. The dogs would compete in one-hour heats on successive days in the qualifying series. Then the dogs called back on the third day would run for two hours in the championship series. The ancillary vision of the West Kentucky Club was realized when the Quail Championship was resurrected as the Quail Championship Invitational on December 9, 1964. Currently, the Invitational is the only championship that requires a four-hour performance in three days.

The winner of the Quail Championship Invitational must demonstrate the requisite qualities of the all-age class at a high level. The Invitational winner must:

- Hunt boldly and independently throughout (should not require excessive direction from the handler).
- Demonstrate qualities of the finished dog by consistent coursing to logical objectives, responsiveness to the handler, and maintaining a forward pattern.
- Exhibit strength, courage, and an unquenchable desire to find game regardless of cover conditions, not simply choosing the easy path but hunting through habitat likely to hold game.
- Exhibit style, speed, and stamina in action.
- Handle game correctly (locate and point quickly and accurately using body, not ground scent, back without caution, be steady).
- Demonstrate extreme character and finish around game (style, intensity, location, and polish) and must not show softness or apprehension.

The Quail Championship Invitational seeks to identify the epitome of the open all-age class of dogs, an individual with strength, courage, intelligence, and character at the highest level. A flawless performance of pedestrian quality should not be favored over one that, although imperfect, thrills with the magnitude of the effort. Above all else, the Invitational seeks to identify the endurance performer. If the judges are, to any extent, uncertain of the ability of an individual to continue at an all-age level of performance, then that dog should not be recognized as the Invitational champion. (The Invitational Champions, John Russell pg. xii)

The 2022 affair marked the 59th renewal of the Invitational. Mary Sue Schalk is the chairwoman of the Invitational. She is only the fourth of that distinction, succeeding Henry Weil, J. D. Boss, and John Russell.

The Quail Championship Invitational returned to the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area at Paducah, Ky., on November 26. The West Kentucky Field Trial Club again hosted the running. In addition to being the chairwoman of the Invitational, Mary Sue Schalk is also the club's president; Mike Crouse is vice-president. The father/daughter team keeps the wheels running to ensure the trial runs smoothly. The club roster identifies the remaining members as Alan Benson, Don Wiggins, Michael Kennedy, B. J. Wright, Don Wiggins, Greg Veatch, Vincent Major, Gary Lester, Sarah Clary, and Joe Hopkins.

The trial is a Purina Handler of the Year and a Top Dog Award points trial. It is also a National Championship qualifier. The drawing was held Friday, November 25, at 6 p.m. at the clubhouse, and the ten pointer males and two setter males were paired for the two qualifying days' runnings.

Purina has been a consistent sponsor of this prestigious event for many years. Greg Blair coordinates Purina's donation of Pro Plan—one bag to each dog, eight bags to the new champion, and four bags to the runner-up. This year, they again stepped up to the plate by underwriting the advertisement. Purina's generosity is one of the

SportDOG was the exclusive electronic dog trainer device sponsor this year. Our thanks go to Gretchen Goodson of SportDOG for making these trainers available. Both winning handlers were awarded their choice of the products donated.

Tim Kreher manages the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area. His workforce consists of only two other men, notably Wes Mason. Mason goes above and beyond during both events seeking feedback on efforts made throughout the year to manicure courses for horseback field trials. Their efforts to have the courses groomed and ready for the trial were exceptional. They were commended for their hard work.

As president, Mary Sue is responsible for the trial's success, but she gives credit to all that share in the duties. She makes every effort to ensure the success of the trial. She readily accepts the responsibility that comes with her position. She stated that her objective was to honor and respect everyone who comes to the trial, whether as a participant or someone who rides in the gallery. The Invitational is for people who love horseback field trials, and the Invitational is one of the greatest events in the history of field trials.

Mike Crouse served as the head marshal, keeping us on the correct path. His service was invaluable. Alan Benson and Dennis Sneed acted as the front marshals. They shadowed judges to ensure he was reunited with the judging panel if he was behind for any reason.

Mary Sue Schalk served as the rear marshal. She went with a handler to find a wayward dog to make sure the handler could find his way back to headquarters.

Vincent Major made his debut as the dog wagon driver last year, and since he did such a good job, he was asked to be the driver again this year, and he quickly agreed to do so. Vincent also contributed to the winners' circle hand-tooling collars for the champion and runner-up and spur straps for the scouts. His talents did not stop there, as he also made belts for the judges, reporter, and head marshal. Vincent was very popular, not only because he was punctual to have the dogs at the right place, but because he also had hot coffee and snacks. Everyone liked Vincent!

David Johnson returned from last year's assignment to officiate again. His service to the sport encompasses more than 50 years. He served most of that time as one of the elite scouts in the game. He went to work for John S. Gates in the early 1960s and spent his summers in the Gates summer training camp in Broomhill, Manitoba. When John S. retired, David worked for John Rex Gates and scouted some famous Gates' dogs. His next employment took him to Texas to work for Steven Harwood. When Mr. Harwood

Dr. Stan Wint returned from Gardner, Kan., to complete his term as an arbiter of this event. He has been involved with bird dogs and field trials for over 30 years. He began his career in walking dog stakes and won his first championship in 1992. He has adjudicated in AKC trials, horseback shooting dog, and all-age American Field trials. His experience, coupled with his desire to recognize the qualities of an Invitational champion, made him highly qualified to fill a judicial saddle.

Michael Kennedy of Opelika, Ala., rounded out the judicial panel. His introduction to bird dogs was when he began to hunt with his walking dogs. He has trained his dogs for over 20 years. His field trial involvement was interrupted to dedicate his time to his wife and three young children. He has since been very active in field trials and has participated in all areas of administration and responsibility. His judging assignments have taken him outside Alabama. He has judged several major championships and many weekend trials. His experience well qualifies him for this assignment.

The evening concluded with the drawing for the Quail Championship Invitational conducted by Mike Crouse. Conducted with order and precision, Mike was assisted by Clay Duncan, an attorney from the Nashville area. Clay, and his father, Chip, helped prepare for and conduct the drawing handling the minute details of typing the running order and completing judges' books; much welcome assistance for a tedious task!

The Winner

Twelve exceptional bird dogs, identified as indicated above, came to Paducah on November 25 to compete in this 2022 Championship. Among those invited was a precocious pointer male named Haney's Storm Warning. At the tender age of three, he was one of the youngest in the field, and last season as a juvenile, he had been heralded by many as a young Adonis in bird dogs. Piloted by his amateur owner Chris Cagle and scouted by Chris's son, Chris Jr., for three days over the four-hour event, he verified the foreshadowing that followed him as a juvenile and then some. His performance was brilliant and was one of the best seen on these grounds.

Joining Warning in the winners' circle was a young setter, Woodville's Yukon Cornelius, as runner-up. Cornelius was handled by Mark McLean and scouted by Judd Carlton. Cornelius improved each day and bested ten others to earn his spot. His effort was solid and praiseworthy. The judges had called back four and placed two on standby. The two placed were the only two of the four callback dogs who finished, and after the four hours on Monday, the judges stated we could go to the clubhouse for the announcements.

Deserving of mention is a young professional bird dog trainer now in Dancyville, Tenn., named Ike Todd. Ike developed both the champion and the runner-up, quite a distinction. Ike and his bride Marty live near Dancyville, and both are known for hard work, honesty, talent, and more. Great to see these two involved in horseback field trials and Ms. Marty in the classroom with youngsters when she is not outdoors.

The Running

Day One

Anderson had Bonner's Bulletproof braced with Lester's Storm Surge, handled by Lester, in the first brace. Proof rendered a hunting effort with three backs. Surge was strong on the ground and had two finds with a third stand where nothing was seen officially.

In the second brace, Lester returned with Lester's Shockwave and joined Eisenhart, who brought Erin's Perfect Storm. Little was seen of Shockwave. Storm impressed with three finds, one unproductive and a handling, forward, reaching race.

The third brace had Corder with Game Wardon facing Cagle and Haney's Storm Warning. Wardon rendered a hunting effort with one find. Warning scoured the countryside, forward, classy, responsive, carded two stylish quail finds and a mannerly piece of work on a brace of turkeys. He finished well forward as the hour closed, earnestly continuing his search.

After lunch, McLean released Touch's Malcolm Story with Lester, who released his third entry, Lester's Boss Man. Little was seen of Story, and McLean requested his tracker at 45 to remove Story from competition in this event. Boss was strong on the ground and carded one find.

Brace No. 5 saw Anderson with his second entry, last year's winner, Touch's Fire Away, running with the second Eisenhart entry, Erin's Wild Atlantic Way. Fire Away was classy, forward, and had two finds. Way was also competitive with a merry way of going, one find, and a back.

The final brace of the day featured McLean's second entry, Woodville's Yukon Cornelius, with Lester's fourth entry, Bonner's Hot Rize. Cornelius was forward, classy, and recorded one find. Rize did not find game and finished his hour.

Day Two

Sunday morning began with Fire Away for Anderson, and Lester with Hot Rize. They were forward and earnest for the opening hour.

The second brace was brief. Malcolm Story was out due to early tracker use on day one. Eisenhart started Atlantic Way and called for his tracker at 30.

The third brace brought Boss Man for Lester and McLean with Yukon Cornelius. Man rendered another strong ground effort, complimented with one find. Cornelius was stronger on the ground and carded two finds.

Next came Eisenhart with Perfect Storm and Lester with Storm Surge. Both were again strong on the ground, with Storm tallying two finds and Surge one.

Anderson scratched Bulletproof with limber tail, and Corder harnessed Wardon at 30.

Cagle brought Storm Warning, and Lester released Shockwave to conclude the day. On an unusual day for the Invitational, we awaited Warning, particularly for day two. He did not disappoint. Shockwave was seen little, and the tracker was requested. Warning showed his versatility and composure by delivering a thrilling hour of classy forward running to the limits of his course and registering five finds. His hour was among the finest ever witnessed at the Invitational!

The Championship Series

On Monday, little was seen of Storm Surge, and Lester ultimately requested the tracker. The Cagles and Storm Warning continued in the previous two days' vein with classy, responsive forward running and another solid bird score. Accolades to Judd Carlton, riding in the gallery awaiting the second brace, for calling point for Warning for his fourth find at 1:58. It was a fitting conclusion to four hours from

Warning and his team.

Eisenhart and Perfect Storm were paired with McLean and Cornelius for the second two-hour stint. Storm was not in sync, and at the hour mark, Eisenhart harnessed him. Cornelius and McLean carded several finds, and the setter proved equal to the two-hour test. After the second two hours, the judges briefly consulted and advised us to move to the clubhouse for announcements.

Chairman Schalk graciously concluded the Invitational for 2022 with appropriate thanks to many. Then she announced our new champion, Haney's Storm Warning, handled by Chris Cagle, Sr. and scouted by Chris Cagle, Jr. Our runner-up was Woodville's Yukon Cornelius, handled by Mark McLean and scouted by Judd Carlton. A field trial is a great game that cannot be permanently won or lost, only played. It is a test...

Touch's Fire Away Wins

The 2022 Kentucky Quail Classic All-Age and Derby stakes were held on November 29, concluding on December 2. The trial was chaired by Mr. Mike Crouse and organized by Mary Sue Schalk. Eddie and Nathan Berendzen of Higbee, Mo., judged.

The all-age winner was Touch's Fire Away, handled by Randy Anderson. He had a point on the side of the road near the sunflower field and stood steady after a long and big performance. He was relocated a few times, and birds finally flew. He had another find after being gone for a while close to the end of the brace, but unfortunately, the birds were not home once he was found. Second place was Bonner's Bulletproof, also run by Randy Anderson. Bonner's Bulletproof had a find in the old sunflower patch, and quail bustled out of the brush; he had a good all-age race. Third place was Allen Vincent's Wynona's Nickleback Sugar, who hunted the edges well and ran a big race. She had a find of a nice little covey of quail by the blacktop. She had another find just after the railroad tracks, and birds were found toward the end of her hour.

The Running

The first day of the trial began warmer than it had been and eventually turned into on-and-off rain showers. Every dog in each brace will be recognized along with their handler, all in honor of their hardiness for the sport. The first brace of the first day saw Barshoe Forget Me Not, handled by Allen Vincent, who made big, wide-forward casts, but unfortunately, the handler chose to grab the tracker when the dog took advantage of his forward casts. His bracemate, Touch's Cocaine Blues, handled by Randy Anderson, hunted his edges well. Beeler's White Knight (Scott Beeler) ran a big race and had long forward casts. The dog was found in the old apple orchard field. Valiant Sunrise, handled by Randy Anderson, was picked up early, just before the old iron gates but ran a large race, and we hardly saw the dog. Lester's Storm Chaser had a find, and birds were present. He had a big all-age race, hunted the edges, and focused on his job. Allen Vincent ran Justifier, who had a big

all-age race, had a find in the sunflower field, and birds flew. Both dogs blew out the front end of the power line field with all of the cuts to the left and right going back to camp. Both dogs handled well down that line and would hunt the edges of that field.

The first brace after lunch of the first day had the most rain showers. Starting, Wilson's Red Barn Slick, handled by Randy Anderson, stayed forward. Slick and Anderson were braced with the third-place team of Allen Vincent and Wynona's Nickleback Sugar. Gary Lester handled Knight Hill Little John in the fifth brace with Mike Crouse and Crouse's Quiet Man. Quiet Man hit the front hard off the breakaway, and the handler found him on point after being gone for approximately six minutes in the woods alley across from the wheat field. Birds were found in the brush pile just below the dog's nose. All was in order as the dog continued strong throughout the hour. Lester and Knight Hill Little John bonded well and finished his hour. Randy Anderson ran I'm Gallant with Allen Vincent and Sadie Firefly in the last brace of the first day. I'm Gallant was gone awhile, found on point, and the covey of quail exploded from the brush pile with Sadie Firefly backing with style. She had a nice forward race, showing at the appropriate times.

The second day began when Randy Anderson ran Lester's Stem Winder. The handler called point after the dog had been unseen for a while. Birds were flushed and finished with a solid performance over the hour. Stem Winder was braced with Wynona Rona and Allen Vincent. She had a big race and flowed down the edges hunting down the line with purpose. Mike Crouse ran Crouse's Tennessee Game Kate, who handled well and had a find in the apple orchard field after time and birds were home. Gary Lester handled Bonner's Hot Rize, who had a strong all-age cast shortly after the breakaway; he also finished his hour. Lester's Shockwave, also handled by Lester, had a find in the field before the sunflower field, birds flushed. Another find past the sunflower field, birds were holed up in a brush pile but did fly. Braced with Shockwave, Allen Vincent handled Texas Wild Rex, who had a find in the sunflower field and a

nice little covey of quail. Both dogs had nice forward races.

After lunch, Chris Cagle ran Haney's Storm Warning, and he had good casts toward the front. Allen Vincent handled Firefly's Invictus; he had an all-age performance of a race. Scott Beeler ran Beeler's Texas Jig, who showed well on edges and had a nice all-age run. Beeler was braced with Mary Sue Schalk and Crouse's White Dragon, who rolled on an edge and faded out the front. The last brace of day two ended with Randy Anderson's Touch's Fire Away braced with Bennett's Coldwater Odyssey, who hit his edges very nicely, had a good all-age performance, and went birdless.

To begin day three, Allen Vincent handled Miss Stylin Sue, a bye-dog due to the scratch of Game Wardon. Sue lived up to her name and ran with style. She had a find with birds. Gary Lester ran Lester's Boss Man, who was consistent throughout the hour, although he went without birds. Paired with Boss Man was Weldon Bennett and Coldwater Spectre. Spectre had a fine all-age race and was seen about three times. In the brace before lunch, Crouse's Equalizer, run by Mike Crouse, first stopped after crossing the gravel culvert in a milo field. After being asked to relocate, no birds were found in this likely spot, and Crouse opted to go on. Equalizer stopped again in the old sunflower patch, and birds were raised this time. Equalizer's bracemate was second-place dog Bonner's Bulletproof, handled by Randy Anderson.

After lunch, Allen Vincent's Lowrider Frank ran as a bye, rimmed his edges nicely, ran to the front, and disappeared at about 1:20. The handler opted to take his tracker and found Frank pointing behind us. This concluded the 2022 Kentucky Quail Classic All-Age stake.

Derby Stake

There were 26 derbies drawn, and 13 braces concluded. The

first-place dog was Beeler's White Knight, owned and handled by Scott Beeler. He had a strong all-age race and was consistently found to the front. Second place was Crouse's Illinois Maverick, owned and handled by Mike Crouse, who also ran a good all-age race, stayed gone hunting, and came back at the appropriate times to check in. Third place was Haney's Hurricane Seeker, owned and handled by David Russell. He ran a big race, hunting to the front consistently. From one field, we could see the dog in the next field overhunting the edges.

To begin the Derby, Randy Anderson ran Tek One Eyed Willy. He made a big cast-off breakaway, and the handler decided to grab the tracker at 20. Also in the first brace, Gary Lester handled Mayfield Storm Charger and had a good finish to the front.

In brace No. 2, Gary Lester ran Miller's King Poast, who disappeared to the front at the end, and was not back in time. King Poast was braced with White Out and Randy Anderson.

Ike Todd handled Haney's Joy with Derby stake winner Scott Beeler and Beeler's White Knight. Haney's Joy was biddable and responded to the handler in a mannerly fashion.

Randy Anderson ran Miller's Wide Out in brace No. 4 and stayed forward the entire brace, showing good handling skills. Mary Sue Schalk and Crouse's Woodrow F Call were paired with Anderson. At 25, Call decided to take the morning course and disappeared to return moments later and showed to the front. This exemplified a great relationship with the dog.

In brace No. 5, Ike Todd handled Game Cake, who ran well and to the front. They were paired with Allen Vincent, who handled Wynona Cookie, a natural at hunting the edges.

Friday morning, Haney's All In, run by Ike Todd, had a point in the power line field just before we turned right. Birds were found, and the dog stood as he shot. Randy Anderson's Valiant Fight had a successful back. Randy Anderson ran No Strings Attached; he seemed a natural hunter. Due to a scratch, No Strings Attached was braced with second-place dog Crouse's Illinois Maverick, owned and handled by Mike Crouse.

Allen Vincent's Wynona's Nickleback Hank stayed on the edge and hunted well in the next brace. The team was paired with Ike Todd and Haney's Silver Wings. He was a nice young prospect and rolled through the country.

In brace No. 12, Weldon Bennett ran Coldwater War Cry. War Cry stayed to the front; he knew his job by continuously hunting for quail to point. His bracemate, Ike Todd's Shagtime Sunny, made attractive casts to the front and completed with a forward finish.

This year's National Invitational Championship was held at the Sportsmen's Association grounds in Grovespring, Mo., with 12 outstanding dogs. Wisconsin was represented the strongest, with five dogs making the journey South. We had four make it to the callbacks Sunday, with two on standby. These dogs did an outstanding job qualifying for this trial, and I hope they are all happy with their decision to compete. This year's standby dogs would not be called back. Congrats to Dale Creek Tothe Max, a setter male owned and handled by John Dlobik, and Royal Rocks Lotta Hardcash, a pointer male owned and handled by Mike Roper, on making the callback.

Championship Running, Sunday Morning

Brace No. 1 would be released at 7:54 a.m. (I am always happy when we start early). Double D's Red Lancelot, a pointer male owned and handled by Danny Draffen, and Raintree's Blue Moon Irish, a setter male owned and handled by Cathy Lewis, would be paired to start us off. At the 16, Red was standing. After a good flushing attempt, Danny elected to take the unproductive and continued. After crossing into the Sycamore bottoms, Red was standing again. This time a covey was produced. After passing through the bottom, Blue Moon would pin a pair in a milo strip. Red would be backing. Both dogs were perfect on their bird work. At 8:39, along the dry creek by the gate, Red would be found standing. A pair of bobs would be put in the air by Danny. Blue Moon would be picked up for manners. With 10 minutes to go, Red would have his last find in a feed strip near the big south hill. Red would finish looking great and hunting hard.

Brace No. 2 would be released at 9:07 a.m. with Circle H's Tru Grit (GSPM/Adam Hamilton) and Craig's Runin Roxie (PF/Craig Hiatt). This was an exciting brace, with both dogs going back and forth in the judges' heads. At 9:22, both would be found standing. The judges ordered a divided find, and both handlers flushed and shot. At 9:31, Grit was standing west of Sycamore Bottoms on a feed strip. Adam produced a pair of birds. At 9:37, Roxie was pointing on the north side of Sycamore Bottoms with Grit backing. Before crossing the road, both dogs would point again, going up the big chute. Judges would again call a divided find. Roxie was standing again at 9:51 with birds produced. Both dogs were still hitting the edges and hunting hard across the bottom field. Judges and gallery were excited to see how this would play out. At 9:58, across from

Andy's house, Roxie was pointing again with Grit backing from a great distance. All was in order as Craig put the birds in the air. Both dogs finished the hour just as strong as they started and going away.

Congratulations to Mr. Craig Hiatt and Craig's Runin Roxie for winning this year's championship. Also, a huge congrats to Runner-up Champion Double D's Red Lancelot and his owner Mr. Danny Draffen. This year's Bob Catlett Memorial Classic was held at the Sportsmen's Association grounds in Grovespring, Mo. The weather was sunny and a crisp 25 degrees with plenty of frost in this bottomland. This class was run on Thursday with a break Friday to run the first series of the National Amateur Invitational Championship. We finished on Saturday with the same cold and windy weather.

This year's winner, Hey Mr. Tin Man, a pointer male owned and handled by Kenny Snow, was run in the tenth brace. Breakaway was at 10:17 for this nice pointer. His first bird contact would be ten minutes in. Two birds would be produced coming from a small feed strip across from Andy's house. Tin Man's bracemate would be picked up at this time. Kenny wouldn't have to go far before the team had another pair of birds located. Before crossing the road at 18, Tin Man would pin a single feeding under the oaks. Crossing the road and taking the edges into Sycamore bottoms, Tin Man would find another pair in one of the many millet strips. His last find was in the Little Vine Loop with another pair of bobs. Tin Man would finish the hour with power and style.

Second place was Unfinished Business ("Ace"), a male pointer owned by John Gaines and handled by Justin Crook. Ace ran in the fourth brace and had great weather as we warmed up to 33 degrees. The dogs were released at 10:47, coming back toward the clubhouse.

After leaving Sycamore bottoms and crossing the road, Ace would find a pair in a feed strip at 11:27. He would have a stop to flush on one of the many liberated coveys five minutes later. Ace finished the hour strong and with style to the front.

Third place was Two Seamer ("Jeff"), a male pointer owned and handled by Colby Tackett. Jeff was in the last brace of the classic. He did a great job pointing with intensity and class. Jeff would find his first bird at 29 before leaving Sycamore bottoms. Five minutes later, after crossing the road, he pinned a pair in the milo strip. With eight minutes to go, he stood tall on a single. Jeff's last find would be behind the cemetery with all in order.

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




