#### WISCONSIN COVER DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

A total of 52 dogs were drawn for this

year's championship, held at the renowned Chippewa Valley Grouse Dog grounds, recognized as one of the finest trial venues in the country. Spanning six courses and covering nearly 13 miles, the maintenance of these grounds demands sweat equity and effective teamwork.

County team are never taken for granted, and we appreciate their unparalleled cooperation—thank you!

This year's championship faced an unexpected hurdle in the form of a virus. After three-and-a-half days of braces, club officers received news of an ill dog, initially feared to have suffered an injury during the brace. It was later revealed that the dog had contracted the highly contagious Streptococcus equi subspecies zooepidemicus, with five additional dogs showing symptoms of the disease, causing hemorrhagic (bleeding) pneumonia. consultation with the championship judges, CVGDA officers made the decision to revert the championship to a shooting dog stake despite championship-level performances being showcased. Out of an abundance of caution, the remaining braces and the derby stake were canceled.

Fortunately, I am pleased to report that the infected dogs have fully recovered with no apparent long-term effects.

Gratitude is also extended to CVGDA member Dr. Amber Dequaine, whose professionalism, concern, and advice proved invaluable in navigating the

#### WESTARK FIELD TRIAL CLUB

Fleetwood and Lone Star Open Shooting Dog Classics

The Westark Field Trial Club held ■ its Fleetwood Open Shooting Dog trial that started October 9 on the J. Perry Mikles field trial grounds in Booneville, Arkansas. These courses consist of old cattle pastures that have grown into lush cover with old fence rows and hardwood bottoms on the edges that require a dog to hunt for the birds that call this place home. The cover is mowed in strips to help dogs and horses navigate through the briars and thick grass, but the quail liked to stay in the thick cover, which does not help the handlers' attempt to flush, especially with the wet spring this area had this year the cover was high. The temperatures were high in the mid-80s and low in the 50s, and bird contacts were more abundant than in the last couple of years. Jason Super and Everett Brannan rode in the judges' saddles and were attentive to all dogs and handlers, which was much appreciated by all handlers, owners, and gallery members. Big thanks to Ronnie Miller for hosting

this trial; he does a lot of work for the handlers and participates in enjoying this event. Lester's Another Shockwave took first place. He was handled by Shawn Kinkelaar and is owned by Tom Jackson, Jerry

Moisson, Lance Schulz, Bjorn Peterson, and Todd Mann. Shockwave ran in the 14th brace and carded his only find within the first five minutes off breakaway. He was tucked away in a thick fence row off to the left of course, where he had pinned a covey. From there, he had a big race where he would not be seen and show up from the front. At the 50-minute mark, Shockwave had a stop to flush on a covey that was in the middle of the mowed strip that he was running down. Shockwave would be gone at pick up, only minutes to be found in front of course, ending what would be the winning brace.

Hale's Smooth Touch produced a smooth ground race, one find, and an unproductive to get second place. She is owned by Dr. Jeff Hale and is handled by Shawn Kinkelaar. Touch ran in the 10th brace, put together an easy, smooth race, and handled nicely, showing that she could run the edges and apply with her handler. Touch carded her only find on a corner of a big swing that produced birds for the gun and showed style and class throughout the flushing attempt. Touch did have an unproductive several minutes after her find where birds had been seen before, but the thin cover may have had the covey slip away before handler's arrival. She finished her hour with moderate range but stayed up

Named to third place was Grand Prairie Thrill, owned by Mac Stidham and handled by Tommy Rice. Thrill ran in the first brace of trial, where she had a good forward race and was smooth in her handling. Thrill had an unproductive 10 minutes into the brace where scout called point and flight of birds before handler and judges could see the dog. A lengthy flushing attempt and relocation were tried to get a bird pointed and flushed but did not produce.

After making some casts, point was called for Thrill, and another lengthy flushing attempt did finally produce a covey that had run some distance to escape; all was in order. Thrill finished the hour, going strong to the front.

Following the shooting dog stake, the companion derby started with a field of 16 derbies. Taking first place was Dark Rebel, who was handled by Tommy Rice. Rebel had a moderate race but carded two very nice derby finds where he showed great manners around game. Second place was Laura Pergolizzi, owned by Nicole Lombardi and Doug Swingley and handled by Shawn Kinkelaar. "LP" had a nice race where she showed some good cast and had a nice find on a covey where she showed good manners around game. Third place was High Enchantress, handled by Scott Hadley and owned by Scott and Tierra Hadley. The female pointer had a good race, showing a lot of speed and independence. She was to the front but did not have any bird contacts.

The Lone Star Classic started immediately following the running of the Fleetwood Derby. Rick Thone and Mike Lemons are responsible for putting this trial on, and a good trial was held. Judges were Jim Martin and Greg Poole, and both men rode with attentive attitudes and

treated everyone with fairness. Forty-six shooting dogs were to be run with much cooler temperatures than the previous week. Once again, this trial was run right after the Fleetwood on the J. Perry Mikles grounds near Booneville, Arkansas. Topping the field of 46 was Panther Creek Rosie. "Rose" is owned by Frank Rutland and is handled by Tommy Rice. Rose ran in the third brace of the trial and produced a solid ground race with two finds. Rose's first find came at the 5-minute mark, where she pinned a covey of birds in thick trees. She was buried but kept her high style when birds flushed and shot fired. Rose consistently handled the front and made a good, showy cast. Point was called at the 55-minute mark for both dogs. Both dogs were together and seemed to be locked up on birds. A flushing attempt was made by both handlers, but nothing was produced. Rice and Rose attempted a relocation and were successful at locating the running covey heading to the hardwood bottom; very good work by Rose. Rose was seen charging to the front when time was called.

Second place was Lester's Another Shockwave, who ran in the ninth brace. Having won the first stake, Shockwave did another good job, where he had a good race that was under control and to the front, showing handleability and connection with Shawn Kinkelaar, his handler. Shockwave carded one find at the 50-minute mark in the middle of a big grassy flat. He finished the hour to the front, still hunting hard for game.

Another good showing for third place is Hale's Smooth Touch. Having just placed second in the Fleetwood, Touch put in a great effort in this trial. Touch ran in the sixth brace, and within five minutes, point was called, but the handler saw feathers and caught back up to the front, where the

pointer made some good casts, continuing through the course. Touch carded her one find halfway through her hour and was stylish throughout flush and shot. She went on to have a good finish and was "smooth" in her connection with the handler.

#### **REGION 17 AMATEUR ALL-AGE CHAMPIONSHIP**

Lawless Georgie Girl Named Champion; H P Cottonmouth, Runner-Up By Andy Neria | Dexter, Kansas | November 3, 2023

The 2022-23 renewal of the Region 17 All-Age Championship was scheduled to run in Onaga, Kansas, on March 2, 2023, and a lack of entries caused the cancellation of the trial. As we moved into the summer meetings, the prevailing concern was whether there would be enough entries to hold the 2023-24 renewal of the championship. It was decided this year's trial would be held at the Radcliff Ranch in Dexter, Kansas. The Wichita Bird Dog Club, in coordination with the Red Setter Club, would band together to bring the championship back and get it up and going this year.

The date was set for November 4, and as it drew near, there was anticipation as to how many dogs would be drawn. Ultimately, 27 dogs were entered and drawn. The stage was set for a new champion to be crowned.

As many of you already know, there is a ton that goes into putting on a trial, let alone a championship trial. Many thanks are owed, and I will try to mention them here. First and foremost are the landowners. In our case, it's the Radcliff Family of Dexter, Kansas, that so graciously allows us to use this fine ranch to chase these dogs around. The Radcliff Ranch is a large, sprawling piece of Flint Hill country that can really showcase a dog that wants to win. The Radcliff Family has long been a supporter of field trialing in Kansas, and we are indebted for their continued kindness and hospitality. As everyone knows, with no grounds, we have no trials.

Second, we had great judges. That's paramount to getting folks to come to your event. Dr. Stan Wint needs no introduction, as anyone that has turned

a dog loose knows Stan and his ability to crown a champion. Having been a judge at the National Championship, Stan knows his way around a bird dog. Justin Crook of Powerhouse Kennels is a very accomplished shooting dog pro. These two fine individuals were well received.

Last but not least, in any way, are all the volunteers it takes to make a trial run. There were many at the Region 17 this year that helped, and your help is always greatly appreciated.

Before we get to the running, there is a sad note regarding Griff's Big Ransom, a pointer male owned by long-time field trialer Mike Griffin in Oklahoma. Buddy passed away unexpectedly during this trial. Our condolences go out to Mike. All of us know the feeling of losing a good one.

Twenty-seven dogs from all over the

region were drawn. For various reasons, five dogs didn't make it to the line, leaving the judges with 22 dogs to decide from.

#### **The Running**

Brace No. 1 started at 8:06 in the morning and broke away from camp to the east, directly into the rising sun and up the steep hill under the powerlines. H P Shots Fired (PM/Rodney Shoemaker) and Bromance (PM/Jon Humphrey) were loosed, and both dogs got away clean to the front. Shots Fired never really got on track, and Rodney elected to pick him up early at about the 10-minute mark. Bromance was on the hunt early, and at 10, he was found pointed in the bottom. Birds were produced, and all was in order. After a short absence, he was found pointed again at the 17-minute mark. Birds were produced, and he was carried on. At the 25-minute mark,

he was pointed again north of the road crossing on course 1. Birds were produced, and we continued south of the road into the creek bottom, crossing into the big pasture. We crossed the road, normally at the end of the hour, with 8 minutes left. We continued on course 2, up the long draw, and finished the hour at the end of the draw on the road.

Brace No. 2 brought Bocomo Dutchman (PM/Jay Lewis) and Stylish Bell (PF/Tom Curtsinger) to the line. Both dogs broke away well to the front. Birds would prove to be at a premium in this brace. Dutchman would search the country far and wide for his hour. At 59, in the drawdown from the third hour breakaway, Dutchman was found pointed. It appeared that maybe his long hour would be rewarded. After a long relocation attempt, no birds could be produced, and that's how his hour ended. Bell also hunted the wide-open country in search of birds and would eventually be rewarded with a find at 41. All was in order, and she continued on towards the corrals. Bell finished the hour strong with the single find.

Brace No. 3 featured Worsham's Spitfire (PM/Joe Worsham) and Double Rebel Cowboy (PM/Lynn Oxendine). Both dogs were sent away from the corrals in good order, headed to the front. Cowboy was pointed at the 13-minute mark, but after a good flushing attempt, birds were not produced, and handler elected to move on. At 25, handler was noted off his horse, correcting the Cowboy dog for an apparent infraction. The dog was picked up shortly thereafter, ending his bid. The Spitfire dog would point birds at the 30-minute mark, but it proved to be too much, and the dog was taken up, also ending his bid.

Brace No. 4 was B G K's Luke (PM/ Jarrett Bell) and Rodney Shomaker with P Cottonmouth (PM/Rodney Shoemaker). This brace covered a lot of ground. Both dogs were well-forward as we made the end of the first hour with several minutes remaining. Cottonmouth searched the country well, looking for birds. Out of pocket at times, he showed up to the front when needed. Finally, at 55, he was rewarded with a find at the end of the draw on course 2 by the road. Birds were produced, and with five minutes left, he was loosed and continued well forward to the road crossing that takes us into the bottom on the way to the silo field. Time was called there, and the dog was collected. Luke also ran a nice brace, but birds eluded him in his bid.

Brace No. 5 was Rebelator Sam (PM/Lynn Oxendine) and H P Social Distancing (PM/Rodney Shoemaker). We broke away from the road crossing about halfway through the second hour. Social

Distancing was wide for much of his brace, and managed to distance himself from his handler. The tracker was asked for at 40. Sam went through the country in a pleasing manner for his handler. At 50, Sam was found by his scout pointed in the draw below the third hour breakaway. As handler rode to his dog, a nice, wild covey lifted from all around the dog. Sam stood with nice style and manners for his handler to dismount and shoot. It was quite a find on a nice covey. Sam was taken on after that and finished his hour to the front.

Brace No. 6 was Open Range Adeline (PF/Bob Barker). Bob was alone in this brace as a bye-dog. We broke from the corrals at the start of the third hour, and Adeline was away strong to the front. Too strong and wide at times. This trend continued for the handler, and at 35, he requested the tracker to get his dog back under control, ending his bid. This was the conclusion of Day One of the Championship.

Brace No. 7 brought Sawney (VIZM) for handler Laura Miller and Griff's Express (PM) for handler Mike Griffin. On a side note, it was nice to see Mike back on a horse after an extended layup. We broke away first thing in the morning from camp. Once again, heading east in the first hour, up the steep hill and under the powerlines. Both dogs were away big to the front, with Express being seen intermittently and Sawney not at all. Coming off the big hill, at about 12 minutes in, the Vizsla was returning to his handler with a bird in his mouth. Unfortunately, this wasn't a retrieving stake, so his bid was ended. John was still on the ground and moving strongly to the front. He suffered an NP about 300 yards north of the first road crossing on course 1 at 25. He was gathered at the crossing and pointed in the direction of the creek crossing south of the road. As the judges and gallery arrived at the creek crossing, the dog was spotted standing, and handler informed judges that birds had left already. No shots were fired, and the dog was taken on down the creek. John finished good to the front at the end of the first hour at the road crossing.

Brace No. 8 included H P Dirty Dancing (PF/Rodney Shomaker) and Lawless Georgie Girl (PF/Jim Lawless). Both dogs broke away to the front from the beginning of the second hour down the long draw to the north. Georgie Girl scored a nice find on a well-located wild covey in the draw at 17. The covey was scattered out and the dog had perfect manners for the flush and shot. Handler gathered his dog, and as he was mounting his horse, Georgie headed on, only making it approximately 30 yards before running into the second half of the

covey she had just pointed. She snapped to a tight stop-to-flush with perfect manners. Handler dismounted, shot, and this time took his dog further down the draw to turn her loose. She was away to the front with all in order. At the 27-minute mark, we had both dogs at the road crossing that leads us to the big bottom going north towards the silo field. Upon entering the silo field, Georgie was spotted on point in the tree line that goes north from the gate. A very spry Jim Lawless dismounted and chased his birds up with Georgie standing perfectly with great style and manners. Dirty Dancing was still on the ground, trying her best at this point, but birds eluded her, and she finished the hour with a good race but no bird work. Georgie was turned loose from her second find and continued to search the country far and wide in pursuit of that third find. She finished strong to the front at time—a very good performance from Georgie.

Brace No. 9 was a pair of pointers for handlers Colby Tackett and Tom Curtsinger. Two Seamer (Tackett) and Stylish Hot Chic (Curtsinger) were turned loose at the corrals to start the third hour. Both dogs were away well to the front. This trend would repeat itself for the entire hour as both dogs traded casts in search of birds. Birds seemed to be scarce on course 3 on this day, and neither dog was able to produce any. Both dogs finished strong and were in contact at time.

Brace No. 10 consisted of Warjam's Big Mac Daddy (PM/Jim Corpening) and H P Shockwave (PM/Rodney Shoemaker). We turned loose after lunch from camp. back on course 1, heading up the big hill. Both dogs were away far to the front. Our next contact with both dogs came at the 10-minute mark when Mac was found pointed in the bottom where birds had been found previously. This time, however, there were only feathers to be found, and Mac was taken on without a relocation. While this was taking place, Shockwave had slipped into the creek east of this action and found his own birds. Handler and judge went to check on Shockwave, and the birds lifted upon arrival of handler and judge. Shockwave went with them, ending his bid. When we caught the front, Mac was far to the front, just prior to the road crossing on the first hour. He was gathered up and taken through the crossing and sent south to the creek crossing. He continued making large casts to the front, but eventually, his casts became too large, and after being gone for a spell, handler requested the tracker, ending Mac's bid.

Brace No. 11 brought Bitter Ark (PM/Frank Schoenborn) to the line. Due to scratches, Frank was a bye. We turned

loose at the road at the beginning of the second and headed north down the long draw. Bitter Ark was pointed at 10 in the draw, very close to where Georgie Girl had previously pointed a nice covey. A single bird was produced, and the dog was taken on. Bitter Ark never really opened and ran like he needed to in this all-age event, but nonetheless, he was pleasing to watch, had a nice find for his handler, and finished the hour with a huge cast.

The last brace of the Championship featured Lawless Speck (PF/Jim Lawless) and Bocomo Cherry (PF/Jay Lewis). Both dogs were loosed from the corrals at the start of the third hour and we were off, headed back towards camp. Speck was far-reaching at times in her search, and after a considerable absence where the scout returned empty-handed, the tracker was asked for, ending Speck's bid for the

day. Cherry was steadfast in her search. Birds had proved to be a commodity on course 3, and this brace was no exception. Cherry hunted the country hard but just could not produce a bird. She finished the hour strong to the front but was birdless. That was the end of the Championship, and now the decision was all that was left.

When the dust settled, our judges, Dr. Stan Wint and Justin Crook, named Lawless Georgie Girl, the fine pointer female owned and handled by Jim Lawless as this year's Region 17 All-Age Champion. Runner-up was awarded to H P Cottonmouth for handler Rodney Shoemaker. Both dogs exhibited strong ground races with birdwork that exemplified championship-caliber birdwork needed to win.

This year's event saw 22 dogs from

several states compete for the title of Champion. The weather was good. The company was good. And as always, the food was great. Hopefully, this renewal will jumpstart this Championship after recent cancellations and bring this event back to the level that has enjoyed in previous years. Many thanks go out to all involved who helped to make this trial happen. We're looking forward to the 2024-25 renewal, wherever that may be.

We enjoy hosting the Sunflower Classic Open All-Age and Derby every year at the beautiful Hell Creek Wildlife Management Area just outside of Blue Mountain, Mississippi.

The All-Age was judged by Morgan Brewer of Union Springs, Alabama, and Elton Bray of Holly Springs, Mississippi. It began on Saturday, November 4, under sunny skies and temps in the 40s, rising to the mid-70s in the afternoon.

#### **The Running**

Coldwater War Cry (PM/Weldon Bennett) and Lester's Front Porch (PM/Gary Lester) turned loose at 8:00 a.m. Front Porch had a UP in the pines across the first road crossing at 15. Another UP followed for War Cry at 39 in the big bottom before the second road crossing at CR 75.

Brody Byrd handled Superstition's Jake (PM), and David Russell handled Haney's Hurricane Seeker (PM). Seeker acquired his first UP at 10 at the end of the long bottom before the first road crossing before the grain bin field. Jake and Seeker had a divided at 28, followed by a UP for Seeker at 41, and he was picked up. Jake finished the hour.

The third brace began back at the clubhouse, with David Russell handling Como Rain (PM) and Weldon Bennett handling Coldwater Odyssey (PM). Rain

had a find at 23 in the first field across Hell Creek, followed by a back for Odyssey at 35, where he scored his first find. Bennett asked for the tracker at 45. Rain acquired his second and final find just before pick up at 58 before crossing Hell Creek to head back to the clubhouse.

Haney's Silver Dollar (PM/Chris Cagle) and Lester's Storm Surge (PM/Gary Lester) turned loose after the lunch break for the fourth brace. Silver Dollar was picked up at 10 for a breach of manners, and Storm Surge went on to have a find at

53 in the grain bin field before he finished the hour.

Korry Rinehart handled Bonner's Hot Rize (PM), and Chris Cagle handled Haney's Storm Warning (PM) in the fifth brace that turned loose at the road crossing behind the old house. Hot Rize had a UP at 3 behind the old house, and Storm Warning had a productive find at 7 in front of the house on the right before completing the hour.

Rock Acre Yellow Hawk (PM/Brody

Byrd) was braced with Beeler's White Knight (PM/Scott Beeler). Knight had a UP just before crossing Hell Creek, and the afternoon wrapped up without any more birdwork.

Thunder acquired a UP at 25 just before crossing the mile-long bottom, and both dogs went on to finish the

Late Hit (PM/Tom Shenker) and Lester's King Post (PM/Gary Lester) were braced together for the eighth brace. Late hit acquired a UP at 06, with a back from King Post.

#### KENTUCKY LAKE FIELD TRIAL CLUB

Haney's Hurricane Seeker Wins Kentucky Lake Open All-Age By Jon Lam | Blue Mountain, Mississippi | November 7, 2023

The 2023 running of the Kentucky Lake Field Trial Club's National Qualifying Open All-Age trial began November 7, 2023, at the Hell Creek Wildlife Management Area, located at Blue Mountain, Mississippi. The Mississippi Department of Wildlife Fisheries and Parks staff had the grounds in excellent shape and should be commended for their continued work in making this an outstanding area for field trials in the State of Mississippi. Those of us who enjoy this sport are very thankful for what the staff at Hell Creek does for field trials held on these grounds. A special thanks go to HCWMA employee Jack Griffin for his daily help and monitoring of the activities at the trial. The Club and the participants also want to thank Purina for their continued support and Pro Plan dog feed given to the winners of this trial. Last but not least, the Kentucky Lake Field Trial Club greatly appreciates the support of all who took part in attending and supporting this trial.

The judging responsibilities were done by two active field trialers, Joey McAlexander from Holly Springs, Mississippi, and Jon Lam from Makanda, Illinois.

#### All-Age Stake

A total of 16 dogs were drawn for this stake. Haney's Hurricane Seeker, a first-year dog owned and handled by David Russell, came to the forefront in the 6th brace with a ground-burning, two-find performance that upheld the standards for an all-age dog.

The following is a brace-by-brace summary of the action recorded in this trial. Prior to the start of the first brace, the running order was adjusted due to Weldon Bennett's scratching of two dogs, Coldwater War Cry and Coldwater Odyssey, due to his ill health and inability to make the trip to Hell Creek. In his absence, two dogs were moved from their originally drawn positions to facilitate the running. In addition to Bennett's dogs, Lester's War Bird (Lester) was scratched due to a torn pad.

#### The Running

Brace 1: Haney's Silver Dollar (Cagel) and Lester's Front Porch (Lester) came to the line and were turned loose at the entry gate to the clubhouse at 8:05 a.m. Weather conditions were partly cloudy, 50 degrees, with a light south wind. Both dogs

rimmed the west end of the field and took to the gap on the east edge. Silver Dollar hit the gap first and went into the bottom along the east edge. Front Porch followed along the same line. At the far end, Silver Dollar disappeared into the gap that went to the Long Bottom. Front Porch made the turn, covered the field, and was caught by Lester and turned toward the Pines. Point was called at 12 by Lester, with no birds produced. Front Porch was brought on hunting through the pines and hitting the edges nicely. Point was called at 30 on the field edge, where he readjusted into the brush. A flushing attempt was made, and no birds were produced. Front Porch was collared. Cagel's dog did not appear, so his tracker was taken.

Brace 2: After a ride back to the clubhouse, Como Thunder (Russell) and Miller's King Poast (Lester) were brought to the line at the intersection of the roads coming to the clubhouse. Conditions were near the same as both dogs were loosed at 9:10 a.m. Both dogs went immediately to the gap and turned on course. Thunder took the left line, and King Poast took the right line, with both handlers pointing out their dogs. Point was called by Russell for Thunder at 6. After a good flushing attempt, Russell elected to relocate. Thunder moved up and hit birds again. Russell flushed, and birds were produced. Thunder was released, and both dogs were back together at 10. Entering the field ahead of the woods gap, Russell called point at 12. The flushing attempt did not

produce birds, and Thunder was taken on. Proceeding through the woods to the bottom, Thunder took the left line as King Poast was across the field on the right line. King Poast made the gap first and took the left line, with Thunder following. Birds lifted well ahead of King Poast at 20, and he mannerly stopped at flight. Thunder backed as King Poast established point. After Lester's shot, both dogs were turned loose and proceeded to the road crossing, with Thunder working the road edge to the north and King Poast working through the thicket to the south. As both dogs approached the gap, birds were seen leaving the area. Both dogs stopped and marked flight at 25, where both handlers shot. Both dogs were led to the Pines and released. King Poast took a right-hand move, and Thunder cut the middle of the Pines. Point was called by Russell at 29, and birds were produced. Thunder was taken on and entered the bean field below the pines, taking a left line. Birds moved ahead of Thunder at 32, and he stopped to watch flight, Russell shot. Proceeding on, Thunder took to the center strip as Lester pointed out King Poast taking the field around the right edge. Both dogs were gathered up and taken through the gap into the long bottom and across the creek into the next field. King Poast took the left line, and Thunder took the right line and on into the next field. King Poast's move took him off course to the left, causing Lester to hold up. Point was called by Russell for Thunder at 45 and again at 55 with birds produced. A distant call of point was

called by scout Rinehart for King Poast at 56. Birds were produced, and both dogs finished their hour.

Brace 3: Haney's Pure Joy (Cagle) and Whippoorwill Vette (Huffman) were turned loose at the old brick house site at 10:30 a.m. Temperatures were moderating near 55 with a partly cloudy sky. Both dogs took a right-hand swing to the thicket edge. Both dogs stopped along that line in the location of King Poast's previous brace find. Both handlers collared their dogs and took them on. Each dog made the gap into the next field, making good individual moves through the country. Pure Joy took a long edge move and disappeared into the pines at 20. Vette, staying in sight and going through the pines, proceeded on course. Returning at 36, Pure Joy rejoined the front where point was called by Cagle at 50. Vette approached Pure Joy with a little more excitement than Huffman wanted and was collared. After a good flushing attempt, Pure Joy was sent on. Point was called at 55 by Cagle with birds produced. Pure Joy finished her hour.

Brace 4: Beeler's White Knight (Beeler) and Nosam's Sweet Water (Huffman) were released at 1:15 p.m. after lunch. Conditions changed to a partly cloudy sky, 62 degrees, with little to no breeze. Both dogs proceeded well through the country, running and hunting the edges. Approaching the pines, both dogs were seen pointing at 12. No birds were produced, and both dogs were taken on. White Knight was seen digging into numerous birdy areas throughout the early part of the brace. Sweet Water ran the country well, showing in all the right places. Point was called by Beeler at 49 with no birds produced after multiple relocation attempts. White Knight was collared. Point was called by Huffman at 59 with no birds produced.

Brace 5: Lester's Shockwave (Lester) and Bonner's Hot Rize (Rinehart) were turned loose at the road intersection near the clubhouse. Conditions had stabilized and were like the previous brace start. Both dogs were loosed at 2:30 p.m. taking the gap and the left edge. Point was called by Lester at 5 for Shockwave with Hot Rize backing. Birds were produced, and the dogs were taken on. Proceeding to the end of the field and around the bend to the woods, Rinehart called point at 7 with Shockwave backing. No birds were produced, and both dogs were loosed. Immediately as they entered the woods,

both dogs slid to a stop with a divided find at 11. Birds were produced, and both dogs were taken on. Released into the bottom, both dogs took to opposite edges, traveling through the fields. Point was called by scout Beeler for Shockwave at 27. Birds were produced, and Shockwave was taken on. Hot Rize took a wide right swing through the bean fields and was seen at 37, standing with a good forward find. Birds were produced, and Hot Rize was taken on. Shockwave was making a large left-hand move around the bean fields and made a cut up the hill toward the pines. where he was found pointed at 43. Hot Rize made the loop and came in for a back. The flushing attempt produced no birds, and Lester elected to pick Shockwave up. Hot Rize continued through the pines and showed well running the front, responding well to his handler at pick up time.

Brace 6: Haney's Hurricane Seeker (Russell) and Lester's Storm Surge (Lester) were turned loose at the old brick house location at 3:50 p.m. Temps were falling slightly, and clouds were picking up again. Both dogs moved quickly to the front, made the gap, and on into the next field. Judges entered the next field only to see Storm Surge entering the gap into the next field. Arriving at the next field, Storm Surge was on the left-hand edge going to the front. Point was called by Russell for Seeker at 10 on the right-hand line with the dog slightly in the edge cover with a stylish find. Birds were produced, and quickly, Seeker hit the gap crossing Hell Creek. Storm Surge got hung up on his left-hand cast and made the Hell Creek crossing shortly after Seeker. Seeker was seen making a wide and speedy left-hand circle around the field. Storm Surge was put on the right-hand side and traveled the edge well to the front and to the gap into the next field. Point was called by Russell at 13 for Seeker, and Storm Surge was backing. No birds were produced, and both dogs were sent on. Seeker was seen across the next field covering the course with an attractive gate. Lester grabbed Storm Surge and sent him around the right edge of Hell Creek, making the turn into the course gap. The next minutes of the brace were outstanding as both dogs independently covered the course, leaving little unchecked. Entering the third field point was called by Russell for Seeker at 27 with Storm Surge backing. Birds were produced with all in order. Both dogs were loosed. Seeker proceeded through the country, leading the race and responding

well to his handler. Storm Surge showed well, making good independent moves. Both dogs finished well into the course.

#### **Ricky Chism Memorial Derby**

This Memorial Derby stake is run in memory of our friend, co-heart, and fellow field trialer Ricky Chism. It has been sponsored by the Kentucky Lake Club since Ricky's untimely death. Unlike most other all-age derby stakes, it is a full hour, which puts these young fall derby prospects on the ground for a test of endurance. This particular year, the prospects displayed a promising future in the field trial world. Determination for this year's winners was a hard, hairsplitting decision for the judges and was expressed to the handlers at the winners' announcement. A total of 10 dogs were drawn for this stake. Eight of the 10 competitors had bird contacts, mostly with broke manners on each find. All competitors showed good all-age qualities and handling tendencies, which is a great reflection of the work and dedication put in on each dog by each handler.

Lester's Front Porch came to the forefront with an all-around performance for owner/handler Gary Lester. John Michael McCormick is the assistant manager here and is an asset in every way. Ben Melvin joined the team in the recent past and has learned his trade well. Gloria Hagan grew up on Dixie; her heart and eyes are on every part of this place. Thomasville, Georgia resident Til Hankley comes each year to drive the dog wagon. He is always on time and where he needs to be. CFTC board member Dr. Charles (Kent) Cantrell rode every brace, and we appreciate his insights.

The judges were Dr. Tom and Tiffany Bass of Ft. Meyers, Florida. Dr. Bass is a general surgeon with his own practice. Tiffany is a nurse, and she manages the business. Their history is mostly in the AKC Brittany world. They are a formable team, both in competition and in their

judging endeavors. Their decisions were well received. The Club was fortunate to have their expertise in the field.

The top three dogs in the Amateur All-Age stake took advantage of the weather conditions, time of day, and what Livingston Place has to offer. The venue presents a canvas for a field trial dog and handler to make their statement. All three of the place dogs excelled in their effort.

First-place dog Touch's Lone Dominator (Kent Cantrell), and the second-place dog, James Pond Knightranger (Woody Watson), both appeared in the first morning brace. There were plenty of birds as Knightranger connected at 16, with

Dominator scoring at 24. Both classy finds occurred before the first crossing. The pair used the open country in good form as they hunted ahead past Moccasin Creek, through the long fields, and their approach to Pike's Peak. Knightranger stood well in gridded cover on his approach to Acorn Hill. All was stylish. Moments later, the report of Cantrell's gun marked the second successful find for Dominator. Numerous coveys flushed wild as we finished the brace at the top of Acorn Hill.

Game Surge (Dr. Fred Corder) made his presence known in the sixth brace of the day. He was high and tight for his find at 8 near the Cadillac Field. Next, a strong cast was rewarded at 13 with perfect manners

on display. He continued to ply his trade with eye-catching form to be successful again at 51 on Kudzu Hill. He finished strongly.

The Amateur Derby was contested in the afternoon heat with the worst hunting conditions of the trial. Nonetheless three prodigies distinguished themselves in a manner that points to bright futures for these derbies. Miss Arkansas, owned by Mike Lemons, garnered the first-place award with a front-running race and one clean find behind the office. Dr. Fred Corder handled Miss Arkansas. He also handled his Game Nation to second place honors with his performance from Boyd Corner, through the Big Woods, across the sand road, and ahead to finish strongly. Mo's Curtain Call performed in the highest heat of the day as she was released at 2:35. She gained the front, ranged freely, and maintained contact with her handler, Tim Moore. She took advantage of the Long Field in fine form, crossed the main

road, and jumped in the water tank. The remainder of her time was most remarkable as she took in all the forward country on past the chimney to the distant wood line. She ran a deep swinging ark in a rightward bend to finish strongly, earning the third-place award.

All these derby performances were

remarkable and were expertly handled for a thoroughly enjoyable stake.

These grounds are magical, and this writer highly recommends seeing them in person.

#### NGSPA SHOOTING DOG INVITATIONALS

The Most Prestigious Events In The GSP Field Trial World

The 2023 editions were the 11th Open Shooting Dog Invitational and the 8th Amateur Shooting Dog Invitational for the National German Shorthaired Pointer Association. This year, the weather was a bit chilly at times, but it was much better than some previous years for the two events.

Only the top 12 point-earning dogs are invited to the Invitational each year for the Open Shooting Dog and the Amateur Shooting Dog events. The format of the trial is like no other trial run and requires three days of running, an hour each day, to win. On day one, the dogs are drawn randomly. On the second day, the dogs are braced so the dogs running in the morning of day one run in the afternoon of day two. The objective is that no dog has the same bracemate or runs on the same course. On the third day, the judges call back their top dogs to run again for an hour. The trial is designed to test the bird ability, biddability, range, and endurance of the best of our breed. After the third day of running, a champion is named.

Since our first Invitational, we have run at the Smith Farms in Gentry, Missouri. The grounds consist of three one-hour courses covering rolling cropland and dense stands of woods, which make for some beautiful lines for the dogs to run. The courses challenge the character and tenacity of even the best of bird dogs. We seeded the courses with over 1,000 quail for the six days of running, and every dog had multiple finds throughout the championship.

We are more grateful than words can express to Larry Smith and his lovely wife, Linda, for allowing us to run the Invitationals on their property. Larry campaigns English pointers, and he allows other championships to be run on his grounds, but no other GSP trials are allowed to use this land.

A huge thank you goes out to all our sponsors who helped make this trial what it is. Greg Blair and Purina were incredibly supportive, paying half of both Ross Young Oil paintings and dog food for the champion and auction. Also, huge thanks to SportDOG and Jim Morehouse for their many years of support by donating product. We are extremely grateful for the support of Garmin and Patrick Bowman for their contributions of product. We consider the very talented wildlife artist Ross Young to be a sponsor because he charges us less for

#### The Judges

The 2023 Open Shooting Dog Invitational was honored to have two very experienced and knowledgeable men in the judges' saddles. John Hicks and Jadie Rayfield have both been very active and successful in the pointer/setter field trial world as participants, judges, and involved in putting on trials. They are both very focused on the job at hand, but at the same time, they enjoy a bit of spontaneous humor and are fun to be around. It is the first time these two men adjudicated our breed, and they clearly showed they are looking for the same kind of dog we enjoy seeing placed as Invitational Champion.

The judges expressed amazement at how broke our dogs were. Over the three days, there were over 100 points producing birds with no breaches of manners on game and many dogs handling five or more flushes during their run. In nearly 50 years of running and judging dogs they had never seen such a group of broke dogs. They were also complimentary of the sportsmanship exhibited by the handlers and participants and the organization of the event.

## The Running — Champion Llano's Game On Greta

Llano's Game On Greta had 15 finds in three days, and each was handled with perfect manners and classy style. Greta ended her three days of performance with a memorable finish, demonstrating outstanding stamina and heart. Some of us knew she was running with an injured foot, but it never affected her performance. She was a fun dog to watch because she exuded the pleasure of the hunt, and her gait was snappy and fast with flowing speed as she covered the ground. Greta was very responsive to her handler and required very little handling, always showing to the front. Greta made some "monster casts," and one was particularly memorable as it was capped with a limb find. The judges were particularly impressed because she consistently had "two-step" finds where the birds were so well pinpointed that the handler only needed to take a few steps into the cover to flush the birds.

#### Other Memorable Performances

Perfections Huckleberry had an excellent rapport with his handler, who rarely needed to give him direction because he naturally coursed to the front. With 15 minutes left in the hour, Huck made a giant move that eventually took him over three hills and into the thickest part of the course, where he was lost to sight. After a 7-minute ride and to the relief of everyone, he was found staunchly standing on point, presenting one of the most exciting limb finds of the stake. As one judge said, it was a "dinger," which he had to explain to this Yankee reporter was a real "bell ringer." Huck had two days of solid performance, where he finished as strongly as he began, thus demonstrating his power and stamina. He was called back on day three and had a strong 45 minutes before he disappeared (on point, as it turned out) and failed to be returned to judgment.

P W Evolution's Recreation had the strongest first day of any of the dogs. The judges described his performance as "textbook" perfect. He ran with undiminished power and consistently showed to the front. His handler was able to ride and sing to Spike from the "money hole," explained by the judges as that 10 to 2 slot a reasonable distance from the judges, and show his dog making impressive moves; he had six finds on the first day, and three of them were limb finds discovered by the scout. Day two was not so pretty. His handler had been bucked off at the start of a scouting job just before his run. He climbed back on and stuck it out with a couple of broken ribs. It was obvious that his handling performance was affected, as was that of Spike.

P J Wildfire's Little Lexi had a good two days. She never tired and always held the front. Her bird work was pristine with excellent style. Her main downfall was that her run was a bit erratic and not as flowing as the top two dogs.

Slaterock's Mountain Heart impressed the judges. He was a big running, powerful dog who was also a great bird dog. He found a lot of birds every time he was on the ground and handled them with exceptional style, never making a mistake. He was impressive throughout his runs, which were unfortunately cut short on day two when he took a wrong turn and was lost from judgment at about 30.

P W Indian Brook Heads Up was off to a great start with a spectacular day one. She was fast, flowing, and powerful as she took every edge to its completion, never breaking off or checking back. She had seven finds with perfect style and manners. Enzi needed little direction and allowed handler to remain in the "money hole" while she did her job. On the second day, she was lost on the cast-off. The scout found her standing on course 3 and returned her to judgment, but 30 minutes had lapsed.

In the second brace of day one, Stoney Hill's Pinnacle Dee had finds at 7, 14, 22, 32, 41, and 59 minutes. Dee put her style on display for everyone to see, showing her

range and looking for birds in all the right places. In the last brace of day two, Dee couldn't give a repeat performance of day one. A couple of non-productive points and a little less responsiveness hurt her chances.

Both men are highly respected and bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to this very special NGSPA event.

#### The Running

#### — Champion B M B's Madison Avenue

On day one, Madison was in the first brace after lunch on course 1. Madison and her bracemate broke away together to the right. Madison's owner/handler, Brandon Blum, was able to quickly gather her up, and Madison went forward, where she staved to the front for the rest of the brace. Madison was found standing at 24 minutes by a big tree on the fence line where course 1 makes a left turn to drop down into the bottom country. Madison had run a long edge to get to this location and was rewarded with birds. Madison went on to have more finds at 42, 49, and 59. The judges noted that Madison stayed to the front with no hard riding from her handler

and was always mannerly on her birds.

On day two, Madison was in the second brace of the morning on course 2. The dogs were cast off by the gate along the county road at the beginning of course 2. Madison was standing at 5 minutes along a tree line. After a long flushing attempt around the trees, a single quail flew from a patch of grass between the trees and the dog. After the first find, Madison had some work to catch the front, and she was up to the task. She quickly caught back up and regained the front, where she was rewarded with another find at 12 minutes. Madison had her third and final find of the brace at 30 minutes on the dam of "Dead Tree Pond." As Madison's handler was preparing to flush, Madison's bracemate came over the hill and ran directly between Madison and her birds. Madison ignored the commotion and remained staunchly committed to her game, where birds were ultimately produced. Madison finished the remainder of the hour with a good forward race.

On day three, Madison had four more finds with birds at 7, 10, 44, and 50. Madison also carded her only two unproductives of the stake, but the bobble wasn't enough for the other dogs to catch her. The judges always pay attention to a dog's endurance on the last day of this grueling three-day performance, and Madison was found to show no letdown in speed, power, or endurance during the entire three days. Madison was named the 2023 NGSPA Amateur Shooting Dog Invitational Champion based on her consistent performance over all three hours.

#### Other Dogs Worthy of Mention

Other notable dogs were Llano's Game On Greta, Snowy Rivers So Far So, and Uodibar's Robbi Jo, who were all called back for day three. Greta, Sophie, and Robbi all showed strong class and talent over the first two days and earned their invitation to this event. But, for various reasons, they were not able to show the consistent three-day performance that earned Madison the championship.



championships, and numerous Dog of the Year awards. He had two of his dogs inducted into the Field Trial Hall of Fame. He worked tirelessly to promote the sport, serving simultaneously as president of the National Red Setter Club and the Northwest Field Association. He filled every role with these organizations as needed for 50 years.

Bob's degree was in Biology, and he began his career at Hennepin County Park Reserve District (Three Rivers Park Districts), where he served for 28 years. He started as the Public Information Officer, which was perfect for utilizing his skills in photography. He moved up in the organization to Naturalist, Director,

and ultimately Director of Public Safety. He instigated the mounted patrol program and was instrumental in getting field trials on the park grounds.

In 1982, he met his beloved wife Katherine. Together, they formed an inseparable team, enjoying the same passion for the outdoors. Hunting, fishing, field trialing, farming, and traveling filled their days. Their favorite trip included an African safari, but other highlights included Alaska, Australia, the Amazon rainforest, the Caribbean, and the National Parks. Both shared a love for historical sites and made many trips to the Mayan ruins in Mexico and Central America.

Bob's love of the outdoors and nature was always the driving force in his life, from his career to his hobbies. He is preceded in death by his mother, Constance (Bradley) Gove, father Robert Gove, brothers Michael, David, and Willard, and many of his beloved dog family, including Fling, Lefty, Buns, Shorty, Bella, and Binny. He is survived by his wife, Katherine Gove (nee Hartnett), and many loving extended family members.

The field trials were originally scheduled for Sunday, but with bad weather all week and the forecast calling for more bad weather on Sunday, they were able to move the trials to Saturday. Although it was wet in some areas and frosty in others, Saturday was by far the best day of the week for field trialing. It was a cool morning with temperatures in the low 30s. in the low 50s by afternoon.

Eight puppies were registered to complete; as it turned out, it was a full field of setters. Around 7:30, the puppy braces were set to go, and the judges let the handlers know they could turn them loose. The course started with a nice long breakaway. There was a field on the left and brushy edges that followed a beautiful pond on the right. This gave the judges a good first look at the puppies' speed and cast. After the breakaway, they entered the piney woods with saw grasses and more brush cover with trails cut through the cover for the handlers, judges, and the convoy of spectators, both by horseback and side-by-side UTVs. The course circled the property, maintaining mature standing timber to the far right of the trail.

The judges agreed the puppies did well for their age and somewhat tough conditions, each showing their own style and personality. They certainly displayed traits that could make them nice derby dogs in the coming fall.

After the puppy braces were completed, we transitioned to the Shooting Dog trial. There were 16 competitors—eight setters and eight pointers. These dogs turned it up a notch and showed some really good groundwork, style, and handling.

In the first brace, Lee Flanders' dog Jack looked really nice on the ground, handled well, had two finds, and ran a strong forward brace. Frankie Barnes' Dot had

On December 27, 2023, top shooting dogs east of the Mississippi assembled at the renowned Robert J. Gordon Field Trial area, Hoffman, North Carolina. There is no better place in the

east to show a single-minded, classy shooting dog in quest of the southern Bobwhite quail. In recent years, December in the south's weather has made this trial brutal for dogs, horses, and handlers. The weather has often changed during the Swamp Fox from unusually cold to remarkably warm, with a cold rain the custom. In late 2023, however, the weather was morning lows in the high 30s to low 40s, with the high temperatures in the 50s—more typical for this time of the year in the southeast. The mild weather resulted in many owners riding to see their dogs perform and others: Dr. Debbie Ozner, Dr. Tom Jackson, Jerry and Kristen Moisson, Smoot Carter, Ed and Megan McCoy, and George Hickox. I apologize if I missed recognizing anyone. The expectation of seeing talented dogs traveling on far hilltops in search of game and excellent food, together with good fellowship, always makes the Swamp Fox Classic the place to be in late December. The Swamp Fox Classic is skillfully managed by the Cock-N-Fire Field Trial Club.

This year, 53 entries in the Shooting Dog and 23 in the Derby vied for Swamp Fox honors. The Robert J. Gordon Field Trial area is under the management of the NC Wildlife Department; their work maintaining the grounds is gratefully appreciated by all. The grounds were in top shape with abundant cover for generous numbers of Bobwhite quail.

The responsibility of handling the organization of the Classic, soliciting sponsors, as well as making sure everyone was welcome and all went effortlessly was again in the capable hands of Coach Allen Johnson. Assisting him were Jerry Raynor, Steve Browder (handling marshaling duties), Cliff Brown and Raymond Brown (preparing meals), and Greg Robinson (driving the dog wagon and providing coffee, drinks, and snacks during breaks). Thank you for a job well done.

A major sponsor of the Swamp Fox is AgSouth Farm Credit, ACA; without their monetary support, we would not be able to continue to host an event of this stature. A second sponsor we recognize as vital to our sport is the assistance of Greg Blair and Nestlé Purina, providing dog food for the winners. The help of all sponsors is greatly appreciated.

This year's judges are very familiar with the Robert J. Gordon Field Trial Grounds in Hoffman, having handled and manned the judging duties at numerous trials over the years. Whitley Stephenson is a successful amateur handler and breeder from Smithfield, North Carolina. William Smith is a frequently sought-after judge of shooting dogs and all-age dogs residing in Nashville, Tennessee. Both gave their complete, undivided attention to each dog that came to the line and were ready to lend a hand to all participants. Their decisions were well received by handlers and the gallery.

#### **Swamp Fox Shooting Dog Winners**

The 2023 winner came to the line in the 19th brace on Friday afternoon, December

29, handled capably by Pennsylvania professional Mike Tracy. Miller's Record Heat ("Annie"), a white and orange pointer female, is no stranger to the winners' circle (recently placing second in the Dixie Classic). She is owned by Allen Linder of Livingston, Tennessee. She began her hour with resolve—attacking the cover in quest of the elusive Bobwhite quail. At the 9-minute mark, handler hailed point. Mike dismounted quickly, putting a covey to flight. Annie maintaining her composure, game well-located with great style throughout. Her handler quickly sent her on in search of quail. Mike, sensing something special, urged Annie on as she was spied far to the front, hunting for productive cover. Mike's urging paid off as Annie made a showy cast in the New Loop. To the front, a call of point could be heard. Again, Annie had a large covey of Bobwhite pinned; handler quickly put them to flight, as Annie remained high and tight with breath-taking style. Releasing his dog, again Mike pressed his dog to continue her effort to hunt the reachable cover where a covey of quail might be located. Annie finished as she began, attacking available cover, strong to the front, an excellent forward ground effort rewarded with multiple finds.

Second place in the Shooting Dog Classic came from the 25th brace on Saturday, Silver W Jill Z, owned by Dr. Debbie Ozner of Ochlocknee, Georgia. Jill is a white, orange, and ticked pointer female ably handled by Illinois professional Shawn Kinkelaar. Jill's strong ground effort was rewarded with a find after relocation. Finding her on point, Shawn dismounted, flushing extensively for his charge. His flush attempt did not produce birds, and he then asked Jill to relocate. Her relocation proved fruitful

with Shawn putting a nice covey to flight with Jill maintaining manners throughout. Released by her handler, Jill continued her pursuit of game with far-reaching casts, showing just enough to keep the attention of the judges. Jill finished her hour as she began, a strong forward ground effort.

From the 6th brace earning third was Faithful, an orange and white pointer female owned by Susan and Roger Duerksen of Hardeeville, South Carolina. Our third-place dog was handled capably by Mike Tracy. Tuesday afternoon temperatures were in the high 50s. Faithful began her hour energetically searching to the front pursuing Bobwhite. At 19 minutes into her hour, she was found pointing, indicating birds were around. Mike dismounted and soon flushed a large covey of quail, with Faithful standing steadfastly. Again, at 35, a cry of point was heard, Faithful confidently signaling that birds were nearby. Handler soon flushed another covey of Bobwhite. During this find, Faithful displayed much better style. She was credited with a solid forward ground race, always showing to the front. She finished her hour with a big forward effort hunting available cover.

#### Others

December 27, our first day, began with misty rain. Eighteen minutes into the first brace, Mike Tracy called point, finding Miller's High Heat Index signifying the presence of quail. Mike dismounted his horse quickly, putting birds to air. Releasing his dog, High Heat continued hunting with a snappy way of going, finishing his hour with no other contact.

In the second brace, Tug O'War was paired with Erin's Big Casino. Big Casino was found pointing at 3 minutes into

this brace with Tug O'War backing. Big Casino's handler (Mike Tracy) flushed but was unable to put any birds to flight. Tug O'War also had an unproductive 14 minutes into his hour. At 26 minutes into his hour, Tug O'War was again found standing. This time, his handler, Shawn Kinkelaar, was able to quickly flush a covey. Tug O'War finished his hour to the front but was lateral as time was called.

In brace 4, Upfront's McQuade had multiple finds. His first find was on a covey at 20 minutes, Shawn quickly putting a covey to flight. At 40 minutes, McQuade was found in the woods on point. Shawn again put a nice size covey to flight. At 45 minutes, point was called again by Kinkelaar. This find was also in the woods, handler quickly putting another group of Bobwhite airborne. McQuade had a very good forward-ground effort, just not as consistent as the winners.

Brace 5 found Waybetter Rebel (Mike Tracy) recording two nice finds. Rebel was nice to watch, having a smooth but snappy way of going. Rebel finished his hour the same way he had started. His ground effort was somewhat side-to-side at times, while the winners were consistently more forward.

Brace 6 featuring Faithful ended the first day with each brace of dogs having the likelihood of finding their quarry.

On December 28, temperatures were in the mid-40s during the morning running. Brace 8 brought Hauser's Rollin Thunder (Mike Tracy) to the line. This pointer male scored a nice find at 30 minutes into his hour. His ground race was shorter than the winners, and he quartered some. He finished to the front, going strong.

Brace 10 produced another contender, Hauser's Hard Line (Tracy). This male pointer had three well-spaced finds during the hour. During handler's flushing attempt, Hard Line lost composure. At 47 minutes, he was again found pointed, but Mike could not produce birds after an extensive effort. His overbid to contend was not as strong as the winners.

Friday, December 29, found the weather still holding to historically mild temperatures. In brace 15, Miller's Special Cinderella (Tracy) produced two finds of Bobwhite coveys. Her first find was not as crisp and solid, but she redeemed herself with a second location of a covey. As time was called, Cinderella was found on point. This, her second find, was high and tight, birds well located. Mike quickly put the birds to flight as Cinderella maintained her composure.

Many believe that judging the potential of youngsters is the hardest assignment one can volunteer to do (looking into a crystal ball to determine what kind of shooting dog this will be). The Swamp Fox judges gave each entrant their undivided attention and offered help to participants when required.

As the derby began, the temperatures were in the 40s; by afternoon, the weather was changing, with temperatures increasing to the 60s.

The blue ribbon was awarded to Mo's Curtain Call, a pointer female owned by J. Morrell and T. Moore of Fort Gaines, Georgia. She was handled by Pennsylvania pro Mike Tracy. Appearing in brace 11, Mo's Curtain Call displayed a good shooting dog ground race, easy handling, and always to the front attacking the cover. Her effort was rewarded with three covey finds exhibiting advanced derby manners. Mo's Curtain Call finished her half-hour aggressively hunting the cover with no letdown.

Awarded second place was Upfront's Bart, a pointer male handled capably by Illinois professional Shawn Kinkelaar. In brace 4, Bart exhibited a pleasing ground race with a find on a covey at 22 minutes, displaying advanced derby manners. He also had a good shooting dog ground race, handling easily, finishing his bid hunting the cover vigorously.

From brace 7 came our third-place dog, Morgans Cash Bail ("Cash"), a pointer male guided by Virginia pro Phil Stevenson. He had a wider ground race than the other two, attacking the cover in search of his quarry. with the extra day allowing for an hour all-age and an hour shooting dog, along with a 30-minute derby and a 20-minute puppy stake. We took out three braces in the morning and another three in the afternoon, with the trial chairs in every brace through the first day and a half. The temperature was comfortable, with no need to carry water as 4 inches befell Christmas day. The summer burn grass was high,

but with the water on the ground, it was easier to find the dogs with the rooster tails coming up behind them.

We have two rotating trophies awarded to the winners of the All-Age stake and the Shooting Dog stake. The Robert Brown plaque is awarded to the winner of the Shooting Dog stake. Rob was one of the founders of the AFTCF, and his daughters do their best to maintain his traditions of hospitality and sportsmanship for the club. Jim and Barbara Goza donated the B. J. Memorial in memory of Jim's champion, Bullett's Tradition.

Being New Year's, the social side of the trial always gets a lot of attention. On Friday night, we enjoyed the usual bring-your-own meat cookout, but there was more than enough to share with Justin grilling up a variety of sausages for starters and Petie's "bean dip," a recipe she devised from Deb McEwen. Saturday night's meal, sponsored by Purina, was catered by Laura (who kindly mucks stalls for us, too), with the main courses being pork tenderloin and salmon, along with many side dishes and desserts. As tradition would have it, tales of tails were told as we gathered around the Browns campfire. When the trial ended Sunday afternoon, it was just in time to take pictures before dark thirty, dine, and resume our celebratory festivities around the campfire, including Jenga, with only the hardiest staying the course until midnight.

In addition to the annual meal Purina generously provides, they also supply dog food for the winners. Thank you, Purina, for your much-appreciated support.

As stated, the grounds went from dry to wet in a day, but that didn't seem to bother the birds found in the slew grass, in the water, among the palmetto roots, and at the base of pine trees. In early December, we were concerned with our ability to carry enough water for the dogs and overheating with the scouts racing back to the trucks to exchange an empty jug for a full one. Now, the concern was not to stick the dog truck. Fortunately, the courses were marked sufficiently from the feed plots, and there was an abundance of water to keep the dogs cool.

#### The Winners

Birds were plentiful enough for the Open Shooting Dog stake; however, some of the best performers from the past were either AWOL, crashed, or ran too big. Thankfully, we had the entries needed for the Purina points stake, which turned out to be another first for Beth Brown, owner and handler of all top three placements. First place was awarded to Myakka Freddie Freeloader; second was Funseeker's Texas

Two braces of puppies finished off Saturday morning on a fun note with the promise of more fun in the future. Deb McEwen raised the spring litter with a lot of freedom, and it showed. Third place went to the Muzynskis heavily marked male, Rail's Lucky 7. Second place went to Beth Brown's Myakka Annie, who also had a nice snappy run. First place went to Myakka Debutante, aka Little Debbie (named for McEwen), who snapped on point before sticking her nose into the covey. The look on her face when the covey blew out of the palmettos was ecstatic!

The All-Age stake saw some bird action, but as per usual with wild birds, they can be spooky, as was the case where the dog is winding, or on the wrong side of the wind and the birds leave. Fortunately, this did not happen to Alex Mauck's setter, Mauck's Wyeast Owyhee Dallee, who showed her ability to hunt the country and point with style, earning her first place. Second place was Katie Lyon's Wiggins Pree Dawn Reward, handled by Tom Hennes, and third place went to Silverline Destroyer Gold, owned by the late Jim Goza and handled by Paul Daniel.

The Derby finished off the Everglades trial with some strong performances. First place went to Checkmates Country

The origin of the Ames Amateur Field Trial Club dates back to 1977. This year marked the 47th running of the trial created by Joe Walker and a few other local bird dog enthusiasts. Joe was the last living charter member of the club until his passing in June of 2022. For his years of dedication and commitment to the preservation and success of the club and upon his death, it was decided to amend the name of the club to the Ames Amateur – Joe G. Walker Memorial Field Trial Club in his honor.

From its early days, the thought was to provide amateur field trialers the opportunity to run their dogs on the same grounds as the National Champion. With the cooperation of Ames Plantation managers Jimmy Bryan, Jim Anderson, and Rick Carlisle, the dream became reality. Today, the Ames Amateur – Joe G. Walker Memorial continues to be one of the premier amateur all-age events in the country. Each year, contestants from far and wide travel to run their dogs on the famed Ames Plantation. It is this legacy that I am committed to preserving.

This year, the trial began on New Year's Day. Weather conditions for the trial were consistent with morning temperatures in the low 20s to low 40s in the afternoon with mostly overcast skies. Thirty-six all-age dogs and 20 derbies were drawn for the running.

"Tonto" ran the first brace of the stake.

#### UNITED STATES QUAIL SHOOTING DOG FUTURITY

Backcountry Champagnesupernova Wins 60th Running

elebrating 60 years of running the United States Quail Shooting Dog Futurity at the renowned H. Robert Field Trial Grounds in the Sandhills Game Lands in Hoffman, North Carolina, was a well-attended and successful event. The futurity is a birth-nominated bird dog event, which grew from a bird dog hunter who wants to compete at an earlier age than the traditional shooting dog classes. These hunters, along with the N. C. Wildlife and its' commissioners, founded the Futurity in 1964. Standards and Guidelines were established outlining desirable qualities for a futurity winner. In essence, the derby should show a desire to find birds and handle the same with intensity in all types of conditions. A derby should show intelligence to hunt independently while showing style and a pleasing appearance, whether running or on point. These guidelines were spelled out in detail and are still upheld today.

As the grounds at Hoffman continued to develop and become famous for their flow of courses, bird habitat, and proximity to restaurants, lodging, and shopping, so too did many types of field trials at Hoffman. Some folks prefer to call it the H. Robert Gordon field trial grounds in Ellerbe, North Carolina. Today, the grounds are some of the best in the United States. There are six courses, each approximately 6 miles in length. These courses are maintained by the state and are comprised of piney woods, open fields with feed plots, and water available via brooks and manmade water holes. Since 1981, the North Carolina Field Trial Association has worked with the state to adopt an early fall bid release program. These birds are fed regularly with a tractor disbursing seed. The six courses recently

gained mileage markers for EMS use if needed and to help handlers know where they are during a run.

For the fall of 2023 and into January of 2024, the birds have been plentiful at Hoffman. This does not mean that every day or every brace will have multiple coveys; however, it is good to remember that when folks go hunting, they are not always finding game either. The weather is a big factor! For the 2024 U. S. Quail Futurity, 34 coveys of quail were seen; some were pointed and flushed, others ridden up by horses. The big thing is "The birds were there!" On the first day, we had 13 coveys; on Tuesday, only six; and on Wednesday, we had 15 (eight of those coveys in one hour).

The bird program for the 2023-2024 season has been adjusted with the help

of many experienced birdkeepers. On the Hoffman grounds, the feeding and releasing of the quail has been planned and assisted by several experienced people. As noted by Sam Giddens, "Folks who trial here year after year are commenting on this being one the best years for birds." The coveys flush high and wild. The numbered count per covey was six and often more. The birds at this futurity were fat and healthy; therefore, despite the futurity, following two very large trials, one with 82 entries and the other with 76 entries, still finding ample birds was a tremendous improvement over the prior year. The Futurity drew 44 dogs around 2 years old, all running 30 minutes in the first series, and then those called back by the judges to further evaluate their bird sense, style on the ground, as well as running

endurance were asked to run for an hour. Four placements were made. The judges called back 14 dogs and stated that they had a hard time cutting it back to even that good-sized number. The 2024 entries were of top-shelf caliber. Entries in the Quail Futurity came from 19 different handlers. Of these entries, nine were amateurs handling their own dogs, and the remaining were professional handlers. There were 33 litters nominated for this 60th event.

The Futurity has an active committee, with jobs undertaken by different folks during the trial. Vice Chairman G. B. Hatcher announced all braces for the duration of the trial. John and Gretchen Adsit winter in North Carolina from Vermont and have become the head kitchen managers for the futurity and many other events at Hoffman. Greg Robinson is the wagon driver. Roger McPherson was on hand daily to serve as a marshal. Chairman Gary Miller was on hand Monday and Wednesday, albeit under the weather after a horse accident on Monday afternoon. Your reporter is the Futurity secretary and tries to keep everything in order. Committee member Earl Drew fills many roles throughout the year and picks up the slack during the trial. This year, he also was under the weather due to a fall the week before. Only two members, both from out of town, were unable to attend.

During the evening handlers' dinner, hosted by Madison McDonald and Allen Linder, owners of the 59th Quail Futurity winner, Miller's Little Duce Coupe, and assisted by Purina, a large crowd of 48 gathered. A painting of last year's winner was graciously accepted by Madison. The painting was completed by celebrated wildlife artist Leah Brigham, Somerville, Tennessee. For those not familiar with her work, visit her website. You will be pleased.

The Futurity is, as always, thankful for the support of Purina. Their hats, clothing for judges, banners surrounding the Hoffman clubhouse both in and out, and Pro Plan Sport feed to share are gratefully appreciated. Thanks, Greg Blair and Purina, for your continued generous support.

When announcements are made, each winner is advised that DNA is required to have their win count. The Futurity is a Purina Points top dog trial, which also requires proof of DNA. The winner will receive a painting presented at next January's 61st Futurity. Congratulations to all!

Sam Giddens addressed the group before supper Tuesday evening to highlight the excellent improvement in the quail count to this January date. Several changes

have been tried this fall and appear to be working. Thank you to the bird committee. This is the best year in a long time. Also recognized were several past and present members of the Futurity committee and NCFTA who have been ill or who had passed during the past year. A prayer for their recovery or peace in heaven was offered.

Judges this year were Rob McGuire, past officer of the NCFTA, and professional Steve Browder. The two gave every dog their attention and gave your reporter good feedback for the report that follows. Purina also thanked them with all-weather warm jackets.

First place went to Backcountry Champagnesupernova, a pointer female owned, trained, and handled by Chris Catanzarite from Scenery Hill, Pennsylvania. Supernova is a good-sized female, mostly white, from a litter bred by Mike Martino. Chris breeds many litters himself; however, this dog was whelped while Chris was recovering from a stroke. You might say Supernova and Chris progressed fantastically. In the first series, her brace ran about 45 minutes before sunset. She hopped out front and tried to point at 16, although she continued on, and handler waved off his call of point. However, by 19, she had cast well forward and was found to the side by scout. All tall, solid, and mannerly handled. Her white body was easy to follow as she toured the countryside with strong and merry casts. Nearing 28 minutes, we watched a distant white spot staunch up. Another nice covey handled with mature manners. As time was called, we were all pleased that we still had daylight and two dogs. Supernova ran in the first brace of the day in the second series. This brace will long be remembered by all who rode to watch and all who heard the retelling of the hour. This callback brace ended up being the first and second place dogs, with a total of eight coveys being pointed during that hour. The morning air was brisk; the sides of the path sparkled with morning dew, some of which was frozen.

The 18 horses quickly steamed up behind the forward dogs as if shot from a cannon. Backcountry Champagnesupernova had point called at 1 minute and 50 seconds. As handler dismounted, a good-sized covey burst skyward as a shot echoed in the morning air. By 7 minutes, she was stopped again for an even bigger covey. At 19, she and her bracemate were standing: A divided find or a point and a back, I am not sure. Regardless, both were there and looked awesome. There was a repeat of this flawless bird locating and standing for flush at 31. The pace of these two was fast and powerfully executed to all the right bird haunts. At 35, Supernova scored again. At 55, an unfortunate nonproductive was shared with bracemate beyond the bunker fields just before the road crossing near the water hole. The handlers quickly gathered up their charges, gave them water, and whistled them forward. Both dogs answered with another 5 minutes of snappy forward casts.

The second-place dog was Hausers Unhinged, a pointer male bred and owned by Sean and Deb Hauser, although handled by Mike Tracy. Hauser's Unhinged ran in the eighth brace of the first series, the second brace after lunch at the end of course one. A gallery of 24-plus riders accompanied this brace. He and his bracemate did not disappoint the gallery, reaching far to the front, first one then the other crossing in front or checking with handler just enough to establish an admirable team relationship. Below the clubhouse is a beaver dam; both dogs were there long before the gallery, stopping for a drink and one for a quick dip before bounding up the hillside, one on the right and one on the left. Hausers Unhinged had one find. In the callback hour, Hausers Unhinged complimented the winner. Unhinged had a well-pinned covey near the water hole early. Everything appropriate to wing and shot. At 14, a second find was scored, this time a definite back by Supernova. By 19, the pair were seen scouring the wide and long field of warm-season grasses. What transpired was a divided find, although some thought a find with a back. The truth is: both dogs were there, a large covey lifted, and the dogs looked tremendous. At 28, the course dips down toward the brook, with heavy cover on both sides of the horse path. Unhinged scored a large covey to the right. As mentioned above, the pair shared a nonproductive at 55 but finished with plenty of energy and desire still surging through their finely tuned, athletic little

The third and fourth placements came from brace 3 of the callback hour series. Third was Hatteras Storm Watch, a setter male owned by Jett Ferebee with Doug Ray. Jett was present to watch his dog with pride. Fourth was Mohawk Mill King Pen, a pointer male bred, owned, and handled by Gary Winall. The callback hour had an early nonproductive for Storm Watch. although a consistent forward race in constant hunting mode. He scored a good tall and proud location at 24 as the group passed behind the barn and headed toward the beautiful open back area, so delightful to see maintained at Hoffman. The liver and white King Pen was forward and often seen swinging to the next possible bird spot with a positive stride in his gait. He scored a big covey at 38. Both dogs were well to the front as time was called, which sent handlers and scouts to round them up. It was good to see Gary Winall back in the saddle, handling his dogs after neck and knee repairs these past two years.

In the first series, Hatteras Storm Watch, bred by Doug Hinton, ran in brace 17 just before the barn crossing on course 5. He showed the judges a strong forward race, which required very little scouting as he covered all the spots birds should have been. Mohawk Mill King Pen, bred by Ellen and Gary Winall, ran in brace 20 of the first series. Once again, no birdwork, but a front running, vigorously fast, and intelligent ground race earned him a callback.

#### **Thirty-Minute First Series**

Brace 1 opened the 60th running of the United States Quail Futurity at 8:09, following a welcome and prayer. I'm The Lone Ranger, a pointer male bred by Warren Parrott, owned by Sam and Nida Giddens, with Sam handling, was braced with Erin's Bad Company, a pointer male bred by Sean Derrig, is owned and handled by Kevin Stuart. Opening mornings at Hoffman seem to be exciting this year. The pair were off, Bad Company straight out to the longer field ahead, while Lone Ranger on the left went searching immediately in the wooded area before checking in. The pair shared a divided find at 16, buried deep in the high grasses adjacent to the plum brush before the water hole. Scout called point for the first one, then two dogs. All in order, the dogs were taken on. Lone Ranger's first 10 minutes were not as pronounced as his finishing time, although he and his bracemate were seen across the dip and crossing the far hillside at 27. By 28, the dogs were stopped, and a divided find was taken on a good-sized covey. Bad Company had a consistently forward-rolling race.

Brace 2 was away at 8:47 with Brian Ralph's Ralphy's Hillbilly, a pointer male bred by Judith Hamilton and handled by local trainer Calvin Curnutte. Owner

Brian was visiting from Pennsylvania to take in the performance. Bracemate was a dog bred by Ross Callaway, Caladen's Sterling Ridge, a pointer male owned by Frank Scarpinato. Frank is a "newbie" to field trials. He had attended a few field trials as a child with grandparents and is looking to get involved. Frank was down from Pennsylvania to watch his dog and gain a little field trial experience. Matt Basilone had recently gained the dog. The two are getting acquainted. Ralphy's Hillbilly ranged out and checked with handler frequently, with point called at 22. He was a little happy at flush and shot. A second call of point was heard with one minute to go. Despite a well-executed flushing attempt, no birds were produced as time elapsed. Sterling Ridge was rapidly to the front, then required some scouting assistance. He sailed to the left, crossed in front, and then, when he reached the dirt road crossing, he headed toward the clubhouse. Scout and handler soon had him rounded up.

Brace 3 called pointer female Upfront's Teeter, bred and owned by Lance Schulz with Shawn Kinkelaar. Backcountry Snake Eyes, a pointer female bred by Mike Martino, although owned and handled by Chris Catanzarite, was the bracemate. Upfront's Teeter was fast and independent. She required a lot of scouting and, at times, could not find the course. Snake Eyes had a lengthy unproductive at 25; however, a quail did lift from the area. Her overall race was a good hunting pace with classy motion.

Brace 4 called upon Upfront's Bart. pointer male, another entry bred and owned by Lance Schulz with Shawn Kinkelaar to serve as bracemate for Mike Tracy's, pointer female, Mo's Curtain Call, owned by Jim and Theresa Morrell and Tim Moore. This pair raced excitedly away at 10 a.m. Bart's dark head was easy to follow. At 6 stopped; however, a nonproductive was recorded. Bart finished his 30 minutes always forward, although frequently choosing the easy route. For a derby, his race was promising for a productive future. Mo's Curtain Call hunted with bracemate where all could see for about 13 minutes; however, by 21, Mo had made a wide sideways cast through the woods. When neither scout nor dog returned, a GPS was taken to safeguard Mo's return.

Brace 5 was Miller's Upgraded Dot Com, a pointer female bred by Jack and Fran Miller, owned by Fran Miller and Madison McDonald, with Madison scouting as Fran handled. Bracemate was Mohawk Mill Miss You, a pointer female owned by Bill McFadden with John Stolgitis. Dot Com had a reaching hunting range, which was rewarded with a covey at 4, followed by a second find at 15. The pair were snappy moving, with constant hunting casts covering every inch of the course. Mohawk Mill Miss You rolled forward, her several body spots easy to watch. Nice brace.

Brace 6 called Shawn Kinkelaar to the line with Upfront's Ghost, a pointer male, another of Lance Schulz's dogs. Bracemate was Sweet Sorrow, a pointer female owned and bred by Larry King with Pat Casey handling. These two were happy moving, covering much ground in a short period of time. They were mostly forward. The two were off to hunt some more after a brief swim in the brook at 23. At 28, Ghost indicated game; however, no birds were flown.

Brace 7 ran as a bye-dog after Dave Huffine's Sweet Grass Spike, an English setter male bred by Doug Hinton and littermate to the third-place winner, had to cancel. Chasin Coveys Lost Sorrow, an English setter male bred by Paul Cook and owned by scout Hunter Prevatte, was cheerfully moved forward as in a formal training race with Calvin Curnutte. He is a heavily marked black and white setter and was on course 1 opposite the clubhouse. He was down the right side and seen making his way through the lower bird area before marching up the hill and crossing the road into the right loop field. Scout and handler scoured the area before he returned at 15 to scoot down the cut, cross the brook, and march with style and purpose to the front. He had a second 6-minute absence, although finishing well to the front without birdwork.

Brace 8 found Hausers Unhinged with Mike Tracy and is covered with the winners. Bracemate Miss Lucille, a pointer female bred by Warren Parrott, is owned by Gary Miller, who, due to a horse accident on the opening day, was unable to handle. Trainer Rob "Lefty" Henry ran Miss Lucille. She showed interest at 18 but did not register a point. Her race was good and forward.

Brace 9 had Lou Palazzolo mounted to watch his pointer male, Pal's Prestigious Pete, with Mike Tracy. Judith Hamilton's pointer male, Higby Arcade Fire, was with John Stolgitis. Judith has been breeding and promoting field dogs for several years, and it was good to have her present and riding to enjoy two dogs from her litter run in this 60th Futurity. Pal marched power forward and was seen briefly before a GPS was requested at 24. Arcade Fire ran with an extremely active high tail. She scored a find at 28 after her nonproductive at 14. Her moderate range and drive increased

during her time on the ground.

Brace 10 had both owners present as well, with Jett Ferebee watching his English setter male, Hatteras High Tide, under Doug Ray's watch with pointer male Mohawk Mill Patriot, bred, owned, and handled by the Gary and Ellen Winall team. High Tide began a little inconsistently; however, as time progressed, he began to line out. He stood proudly at 15 with no birds produced where there should have been. Mohawk Mill Patriot put down a classy race, including a back with head and tail high at 15.

Brace 11 was off at 3:58, this time Shawn Kinkelaar bringing Upfront's Charlie, a pointer female bred and owned by Lance Schulz, as bracemate for pointer female Mohawk Mill Miss Ellie with John Stolgitis. Charlie's large white body boldly toured the cover with a respectable performance; however, no birds were located during this half hour. Miss Ellie ran a good-ranging, gleeful, constant hunting race. Her gait almost a double-time step matched by bracemate.

The last brace of the opening day called upon Pat Casey with pointer female Ubetcha Trixie, bred and owned by R. Spillman. Backcountry Champagnesupernova, a pointer female with Chris Catanzarite, is covered with the winners. As sunset was an hour away, the brace was quickly out of the wagon and whistled away. Trixie, with Casey, had a nice dark head, allowing her to be seen as she blazed forward, not retracing any steps; however, no birds were located.

On Tuesday morning, the weather was welcoming as Millers Enhanced Upgrade, pointer female, another Jack and Fran Miller bred derby, owned by David Steele, with Doug Ray, was met on the line by pointer male Browns Contender, from Paul Cook's litter with Calvin Curnutte. Owner Rev Andrew Brown was expected to attend but was among the missing. Upgrade proceeded to hunt with power and purpose, although drifted a little laterally at times. Contender was directionally challenged and did not complete his half-hour under consideration.

Brace 14 paired Laura Pergolizzi, a pointer female owned by Nicole Lombardi, and Douglas Swingley with Shawn Kinkelaar, with pointer male Chasehill Snoop Dog, as a strongly favored Stolgitis team entry. "LP" paced herself from beginning to end, a show of poetry in motion. Snoop Dog hit the cover every inch of the course, always showing to the front. No birds in this early brace on this second day.

Brace 15 had Jack Daniel's If U Please,

a pointer male owned by Theresa Morrell under the guidance of Mike Tracy with Mohawk Mill Hombre, a pointer male with Ellen and Gary Winall. The 30 minutes got off to an impressive quick start with dogs having handlers in tow. With dogs still motoring out front, Derby Road was covered by a vehicle to assure animal safety. These two males had a busy, moderate-ranging race; however, no bird contact.

Brace 16 was shared by two dogs recalled for the second series. Hatteras Storm Watch with Doug Ray and bracemate Mac's Slim Jim, bred, owned, and handled by Tim McClurg. Tim is another Pennsylvania and North Carolina bird dog split resident. Hatteras Storm Watch is covered with the winners. In the first series, Mac's Slim Jim earned a callback with a strong forward 30 minutes as he navigated the course with very little scouting required.

Brace 17 again called upon the Winalls to be on the line, this time with pointer female Mohawk Mill Finale. Bracemate was pointer male Glenmere's Cruiser, bred, owned, and handled by Jeff Haggis from Canada. Although Mohawk Mill Finale was in high gear with an appealing rolling forward race, the judges reported that Glenmere's Cruiser probably had the biggest race of the 44 dogs entered. His speed and range were commendable as well, and to still be available for pickup at 30 shows his intelligence.

Brace 18 seemed to be another family affair. Both dogs, Miller's Upgraded Patent and Millers Authentic Version, are littermates and were bred by Fran and Jack Miller. Upgraded Patent is shared ownership between Bob Canada and Harold Ray, with Doug Ray handling. Authentic Version is owned by Allen Linder; however, granddaughter Madison McDonald was present to assist Fran Miller in the running. Although I missed it, I have been told there was one find during this brace by Authentic Version.

Brace 19 found Erin's Ikon, owned by Jerrold Moisson, who was present to observe his handler, Shawn Kinkelaar, guide this classy setter. Ikon was forward with a spirited bounce, thrilling all setter lovers and those who favor pointers as well. He never ended his search for quail. High Drive Drinkaby, pointer female, also one of Allen Linder's dogs, this entry with Mike Tracy. Erin's Ikon never altered his cadence from beginning to end. High Drive reached side to side in a forward pattern, requiring a little scouting while maintaining an animated gait.

Brace 20 called Mohawk Mill King Pen with Gary and Ellen Winall as bracemate

for Sweet's Easy Money with Mike Hester. This pair deserved the callbacks they received as their races were strong, with purposefully made casts into expected bird areas. With each dog stretching the edges, disappearing for minutes, and returning to the front, exactly what a handler would hope for, making the brace a handler's pleasure. The only thing lacking was a piece of birdwork.

Brace 21 found John Stolgitis with pointer female Mohawk Mill Double E, part owner Ellen Winall scouting. Bracemate was Brown's Dolly, a pointer female with Calvin Curnutte. The bar had been set high by preceding braces, and although these two sped away and made an intense bid to join the callback group, their names were not called. On other days, both of these, with their intelligent searching patterns, would have been called back.

The final brace was 22 with pointer female Glenmere's Silver Roo, owned and handled by Jeff Haggis, and a littermate to callback dog Mac's Slim Jim. The bracemate was Millers Dusty Version, a pointer female owned by committee member Mike Husenits and handled by Mark Hughes. Applying themselves well, the pair covered both edges in a forward sweep of the heavy ground cover. They were each rewarded with a find.

#### **Callback Hour Series**

A record number of 12 dogs were called back. The judges stated there were so many top-quality dogs that a short list was impossible. Fourteen dogs were called back. Of these 14 dogs, three were littermates from Miller's Special Edition x Miller's Upgraded Version, two were from Wildcat Creek Athena x Erin's Wild Atlantic Way, and the rest were from assorted litters. All entries and their litter information are listed at the end of this report. Brace 1 of the callbacks was Hausers Unhinged with Mike Tracy and Backcountry Champagnesupernova; their brace is covered with the winners.

Brace 2 was Erin's Ikon, a setter male with Shawn Kinkelaar, and Mac's Slim Jim, a pointer male with Tim McClurg. Erin's Ikon had a very strong ground race, seen on the horizon navigating with a pleasing, consistent pace. He made game, hesitated, but caused handler to call off point a couple of times, leaving his hour with no birdwork. Mac's Slim Jim was always to the front, excepting near the old cornfield before mounting the push to

make the road crossing before the barn. In this area, he had cast way to the right, into the woods, and then down along the seed crop on the edge of the field. He did not want to leave the area, which led to handler and scout bringing him to the road crossing through the woods. Both dogs were collared across the road and finished going away. No birdwork scored this brace.

Brace 3 was made up of the third and fourth-place winners. Hatteras Storm Watch with Doug Ray and Mohawk Mill King Pen with Gary Winall is covered with the winners.

Brace 4 had a big gallery to watch Sweet's Easy Money, a pointer male owned by Jonathan Elrod with Mike Hester. Jonathan had planned to attend as he is getting involved with field trials and knew this was a good chance to get experience; however, he was unable to make it to Hoffman. Easy Money is a big dog who made good double-step buoyant casts in a moderate tour of the course. He was left to finish his hour as a bye-dog after his bracemate was lost before the 15-minute mark. Handler and dog had a mutual understanding of how their hunting pace should go and maintained it for the full hour. Bracemate Mohawk Mill Miss Ellie, a pointer female with John Stolgitis, was just a blur of a body beyond the lower thick area in front of the clubhouse. By the time the hunting party reached the top of the crossing at 15, Miss Ellie was not seen. After a quick scouring of the field and upper corner of the field, Stolgitis took the GPS and located her on the left side over the steep hill. Of course, still on point.

Brace 5 was put down just before the sign, indicating the start of heat 2—Millers Authentic Version with Fran Miller and Erin's Bad Company with Kevin Stuart. Starting a litter slowly, we could see Authentic Version seriously in search of birds, with handler heavy on the whistle to encourage an extension of the search area. After not finding birds close at hand, Authentic Version stretched out, improving her range while showing good tail and head action in her forward motion. She had a 12-minute absence and one other brief "missing in action" spell. She had a solid find with everything in order at 54 and a larger covey rise with everything in order at 59. Erin's Bad Company with Kevin Stuart is a solid-built and very muscular male pointer. He was wide and forward, often in close proximity with bracemate. The scouts for both dogs were called upon several times during this hour, especially in the field near the old candy cane tree and traveling across the sand road (Field Trial Road, I believe) toward turkey coop. Handlers and scouts called loudly and rode

briskly to ensure both dogs came forward. Stuart took his GPS before the hour was up. Miller continued at a more casual pace once we were headed toward the soldier's camp.

Brace 6 had two female pointers, Shawn Kinkelaar with Laura Pergolizzi and Fran Miller with Miller's Upgraded Dot Com. "LP" paced herself to a continuous forward and strikingly speedy march through the cover. Her power stroke lick took her through every possible bird cover on the course; however, she was unable to pin a covey for handler to flush. Dot Com started the hour with a thrilling promise: A solid indication that she maintained during a lengthy flushing attempt by handler and a hasty relocation attempt by herself. Judges recorded a nonproductive. The gallery could watch both of these two, well to the front, searching the cover, crossing the brooks, and then marching up toward McGee's Castle before separating and marching briskly down opposite sides of the long field. Her last 15 minutes were a little closer when she went into a less-ranging hunting mode.

Brace 7 concluded as Sam and Nida Giddens, with their pointer male, I'm The Lone Ranger, came to join bracemate Miller's Upgraded Patent, a pointer male with Doug Ray. Patent is co-owned by Doug's dad, Harold, and Dr. Bob Canada, who was present to observe the event. After a lengthy time in the box, these two went sailing out of sight with just an hour and a half of daylight left. Their high gear kept everyone sitting high in their seats, hopeful not to miss any of the expected action. The dogs were faithful in their appropriate attack of the objectives and cover; however, a nonproductive was recorded for I'm The Lone Ranger. Upgraded Patent had a find at 20 in high grass on the right approaching the brook. Their races were moderate hunting ranges most of the hour after their bird contacts.

## NGSPA OPEN ALL-AGE INVITATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

B M B's Free Ride Wins Sixth Running

The sixth NGSPA Open All-Age Invitational was held on January 4-6, 2024, at Hell Creek WMA, Blue Mountain, Mississippi. These grounds are considered by many wide-traveling field trialers to be the best all-age grounds in the country. The MS Department of Wildlife, Fish, and Parks has been kind enough to slot us into this time slot, which has proven to be very good over the years as far as weather is concerned. We are the only NGSPA event to be held here.

Hell Creek WMA is owned by the state of Mississippi and managed by their Department of Wildlife, Fish and Parks, led by Lynn Posey, Executive Director, and under the management of Nathan Blount, Regional Biologist. Nathan has been great to work with over the past six years. He helped us secure our time slot the first year and every year since. For most of our trialers who have never run here, these grounds were opened in 1999 and include dog kennels, a horse barn with 38 stalls,

outside paddocks, a spacious clubhouse with cooking facilities, and a hard-pack lot with some electrical hook-ups. Good grounds are essential to a good field trial, and these grounds are exceptional. They are large enough to accommodate three hour-long courses, with plenty of challenges to test our bird dogs. They are multi-use grounds, and we field trialers share them with hunters and others who love the outdoors and appreciate God's creation. We value the commitment to multi-use recreation found in the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fish, and Parks and are deeply grateful to them.

Although he retired in 2020, Jack Griffin remains the "face of the Hell Creek WMA." Recognizing the need to stay on top of the grounds, Nathan Blount has retained him to keep the grounds in top shape, which benefits the quail, deer, and turkey that call these grounds home, as well as the field trialers who hold Hell Creek in the highest regard. Jack shows up at every

event and is a big help in many ways, from opening gates to ensuring the facilities are in top shape. His work is extremely evident in the condition of the grounds, which keeps the forest from encroaching onto the grass bottoms and reducing game habitat. Thanks also to Jeremy Taylor and the Hell Creek Field Trial Club, who work to keep the area clean and in good condition during the year.

The grounds are varied and challenging, with a number of long bottoms, some piney woods, and smaller tree-lined fields. Despite heavy rain before we arrived, Hell Creek dropped to a safe level so we could use all three courses. There is plenty of dense cover to hold quail. The grounds demand a powerful all-age dog that stays to the front, carries a line to the end, and seeks timely guidance from its handler. Absences of 10 minutes or more are common. The courses flow nicely but penalize dogs that get behind, won't carry a line, are seen too often, or won't respond

to their handler.

We were blessed to have Korry Rinehart and Nick Thompson advise us on how to utilize the grounds best to produce three courses, and then they used their knowledge to plant quail in strategic places. All three courses provided challenges and opportunities to show and evaluate an all-age dog.

We were honored to have two outstanding judges: Joey McAlexander from nearby Holly Springs, Mississippi, and Keith Bryant from Denver, Colorado. Joey has won the National Amateur Invitational and has placed in many all-age championships. He is a third-generation dog man, and his father and grandfather have judged the Nationals at Ames. Keith has been running competitive German Shorthaired Pointers for many years and has won the Open Shooting Dog Invitational and other prestigious events. Both men are intimately familiar with the all-age dog and enjoy watching them perform. All participants agreed they did an outstanding job evaluating each dog in our event and selecting the All-Age Invitational Champion.

A talented crew came together to put on this quality event. Christy Harris and Tireca (ReRe) Turner teamed up to provide three wonderful meals each day this year. Both have prior experience cooking for this event, and many have said that our meals here are the best. Joe Frauendienst oversaw tons of details both in preparation for the event and throughout it, including dog wagon duties and many other preparation details. Fred Ryan pitched in to help with the administration responsibilities, and we all enjoyed the performance of our new auctioneer, Brandon Blum. We could not have put the event on without the oversight, attention to detail, and hard work of Bobbi Richardson and our Executive Assistant, Brittiny Haberkorn.

The grounds tend to be confusing for new handlers, and it was a tremendous help to have Korry Rinehart serve as lead marshal with assistance from Hunter.

Our incredible sponsors made this trial possible. Greg Blair and Purina support all three of our NGSPA Invitationals, which showcase the excellence of their product that is currently being fed to all dogs competing in this challenging endurance event. They provided important financial assistance, including 12 bags of product for the champion handler and 12 bags to auction, and helped with a Ross Young original oil painting of the champion gifted to the owner. Garmin provided the champion's owner an Alpha 10 tracking device, and SportDOG gave us a tracker, the Tek 1.5. Ross Young donated much

of his time because he is not charging full value for his truly fabulous works of art. The winning handler also earned a \$5,000 purse.

All attendees received an exceptional package of gifts, including a warm and attractive Eddie Bauer vest with dog and owner's names and logo, a beautiful multi-use handmade knife, a dog vest with a logo by Ruff Wear, and other items.

The Guidelines and Philosophy are essentially the same as the NGSPA Shooting Dog Invitationals. We ask the judges to pay close attention to our NGSPA All-Age Standard. The 12 top-winning all-age dogs from the past year are invited. There are three continuous days of running. The first two are hour stakes, and the third day is a 90-minute callback, which tests the endurance and stamina of the top dogs like no other trial in the GSP world.

The judges maintained a consistent pace, stayed on course, and expected the handler to "show them their dog," explaining that it was the handler's job to show his dog, not the judge's job to follow him around. Handlers were free to leave the "path" and do what they needed to show their dog to the judges. They wanted handlers to quickly gain the front after birdwork. They were both very experienced, and their depth of knowledge and "bird-dog sense" was apparent in their evaluations.

The judges had one dog that couldn't be beaten if it had an exceptional run in the callback. They decided to call back four dogs, with their number one dog in the first brace and holding the second brace in reserve. As things turned out, they decided to run all four dogs.

### General Comments by the Judges

The judges said this was truly a premier all-age event. The grounds are different

from any other NGSPA grounds and present difficult challenges to dogs and handlers, accounting for a fair number of dogs that were gone for a substantial amount of time. The ground was firm the first two days, when we usually have quite a bit of mud. On the third day, after a front dumped a lot of rain overnight, the ground was a bit muddy but not too bad. There was plenty of moisture at dog height, and the dogs were unaffected by the wetness and cold. During the trial, it seemed that the dogs were all in excellent physical condition, and it was noted that no dog appeared to be struggling with fatigue at any point in all three days.

#### The Running of the Dogs

## The Champion

B M B's Free Ride (Lewey) is owned by Brandon and Jennifer Blum, handled by Brandon Blum, and scouted by Josh Nieman. Lewey had two finds early in the brace and one NP at 47, plus an impressive back at time. He was absent a bit in the middle of his run but had a strong run overall on day one.

On day two, Lewey had finds at 2, 6, 16, 20, and 26, with an NP at 9. He had a flat spot in the middle but had a good ground race overall.

On day three there was a 90-minute callback, and Lewey had finds at 3, 13, and 45 with an NP at 23. His second find was difficult due to a prolonged flushing attempt. He started slow but built during the 90 minutes. He made three huge ll-age moves and finished strong. The judges noted that Lewey is 10 years old and showed no sign of slowing down during the three days.

Overall, Lewey's birdwork was flawless. His head and tail were high and staunch,

with no movement on the flush. His intensity was remarkable, and he pointed his birds a long way off. He had two difficult finds with long flushes. During the three days, he tended to get stronger during the brace with big finishes. He was biddable and required only a little scouting. He was always to the front and exhibited all the qualities of a true all-age champion.

#### Other Callback Dogs

• Uodibar's Robbi Jo (Robbi) owned by Sherri Tangsrud, handled by Kirk Loftin, and scouted by Sherri Tangsrud. On day one, Robbi had three finds early and ended the hour with a huge move, ending in a limb find at 50. She handled pretty well and was stronger as the hour went on. Her range was all-age, and she exhibited plenty of power and speed.

Robbi had a find at 27 at the end of a huge move and finds at 40 and 44 with a back at 11 on day two. Her finish was not as strong as day one.

Robbi was in brace 1 with the champion for their 90-minute run on day three. She had a back at 45 but no finds and a lot of absences. She ran big, was a bit rogue, and required some aggressive scouting. She was stylish on her birdwork but not as strong as Lewey.

Looking at all three days, Robbi had plenty of power and range and was mostly to the front. The judges said that if she had done on the callback what she did on the first two days, she might have been named champion.

• PW Bert's Joke On Us (Bart) is owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson, handled by Rich Robertson Jr., and scouted by Nick Thompson. On day one, the judges said that this run of Bart's was the best run of the entire trial. His first find at 3 required an extensive flushing attempt, and the first bird flushed right over his head, and the other took flight at his feet, during which he was impressively staunch with nice style. His second find at 45 was impressive. He made a huge, exciting move along a

long edge where he disappeared in the distance. The handler rode to where he was last seen and eventually found him standing. Bart made powerful, fast monster moves throughout the brace and didn't need much handling or scouting. He was the clear number one dog on day one.

Bart had a find early on and became a bit rogue after that, where he was brought from behind a couple of times. His range and power during the entire 60 minutes on day two were the epitome of an all-age dog.

Bart ran in the second brace during the callback on day three. He took a wrong turn around the first corner after being cast off, and the handler could not call him around. He was not seen again.

• Chicoree's Glitter and Gold (Glitz), owned by Dr. Fred Ryan, handled by Dan DiMambro, and scouted by Stegan Smith. Glitz had finds at 6, 13, and 50, where she handled nicely during a very difficult relocation on day one. She had a nice run but experienced a few flat spots. Glitz had excellent birdwork with classic style.

Glitz was much stronger on day two, with finds at 2, 6 (at the end of a huge move), 9, and 26, with an NP at 40. She seemed like a different dog this day as she made some nice all-age moves, exhibiting more power and motivation. Glitz handled very kindly, and her birdwork was pristine.

Overall, Glitz did a good job, but day one hurt her.

### The Rest of the Dogs

- B M B's Freeloader (Hewey) is owned by Brandon and Jennifer Blum and handled by Brandon. On day one Hewey had one find and disappeared soon after that. He was scratched by the handler on day two.
- Chicoree's Riden High Trixie (Trixie) is owned by Dr. Fred Ryan and handled by Dan DiMambro. On day one Trixie had two finds but came from behind once. She had two finds but came from behind twice on day two.

- Hi N's Allison Miranda (Allie), owned by Kirk and Larry Loftin, handled by Kirk Loftin. Allie had two finds and one back on day one. She was lost early in the brace on day two.
- Tulli's Faraway Giddyup (Fairgo) is owned and handled by Joe Amatulli. On day one, Fairgo had three finds at 19, 29, and 59. He pointed with intensity and high head and tail. Fairgo started slow but finished strong. The judges liked his first-day performance and rated him No. 3. Fairgo had a find at 20 and an NP at 12, then he checked out, on day two.
- B D K's Twelfth Man (Aggie) is owned and handled by David O'Brian. Aggie checked out at the cast-off and checked back in at 58 on day one. Aggie was gone for the hour. on day two.
- High Standing Cuttin Edge (Woody) is owned by Anthony and Dayna Rusciano and handled by Dan DiMambro. Woody was not seen on day one. On day two, Woody was gone until 45, then showed up and had two finds at 48 and 54, displaying very nice style.
- AO Tripps To Win (Tripp) is owned by Alan O. Davison and handled by Josh Nieman. Tripp had a back at 18 and a divided find at 25 on day one. He was gone thereafter. On day two, Tripp had a find at 11 and was not seen again.
- Stoney Hill's Pinnacle Dee (Dee) is owned by Kirk and Larry Loftin and handled by Kirk Loftin. Dee had a divided find at 28 and finds at 39 and 44. She did not have enough punch for the judges. Dee was beautiful on point on day one. Dee showed up for the first time at 30 and had a find at 40 with a strong finish on day two.

Whippoorwill Vette and Owner Dale Bush Win Open All-Age

The 71st renewal of the Hobart Ames Memorial Classic was sponsored by the Ames Amateur Field Trial Association and run on the National Championship courses of Ames Plantation January 8–11. The Classic drew 31 all-age entries and 10 derbies.

First place in the all-age competition was won by Whippoorwill Vette, owned by Dale Bush from College Station, Texas, and handled by Larry Huffman from Michigan City, Mississippi. First place in the Open Derby Classic was won by Quail Woods Pine, owned by Dr. Greg Adams from

Norfolk, Virginia, and handled by Randy Anderson from Vinita, Oklahoma.

The second-place winner of the Open All-Age was Touch's Fire Away (the sire of the first-place winner of the Derby stake,) also owned by Dr. Greg and Carmen

Adams and handled by Randy Anderson. Haney's Hurricane Seeker, owned and handled by David Russell from Como, Mississippi, won third. The second-place Derby winner was Game Nation, owned by Dr. Fred Corder from Corinth, Mississippi, and handled by Ike Todd from Dancyville, Tennessee. Ike Todd also handled the third-place Derby winner, Erin's Firehouse Waitress, owned by Gordon Jones from Draper, Utah.

Judges for both the All-Age and Derby competitions were Greg Bain from Pound Creek, Alabama, and Joe Hughes from Moulton, Alabama. Both judges, successful field trailers who have run dogs on Ames Plantation many times, handled their judicial assignments professionally and attentively, with their placements well received and their services much appreciated.

The weather was generally normal for January in western Tennessee. Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday started with the ground slightly frozen and the day becoming pleasant. Tuesday was a violently windy day with early periods of light mist, but which ended with thunder and lightning that coincided with the end of the second afternoon brace and shut down the running until Wednesday. The wind on Tuesday gusted in the 35-mile-per-hour range part of that day but did not reach the 50 to 60 mph predicted in some of the earlier weather forecasts.

The organizational meeting and drawing were held in the Plantation Office at 7 p.m. on Saturday, January 6, with Matt Backus, the Assistant Center Director of Ames, very smoothly conducting his first drawing. Assisting were Pat Bryan, spinning the squirrel cage, and Kay Carlisle recording. Others attending were Dr. Rick Carlisle, Secretary-Treasurer of the host club; Charlie Frank Bryan; Ryan Braddock, one of the field marshals; and Jim Atchison, reporter.

Dr. and Mrs. Carlisle, who have provided over four decades of leadership and hospitality on Ames Plantation, made sure the judges and reporter and his wife were well fed and entertained throughout their time on Ames, with the crowning event being a gournet dinner prepared by Mrs. Kay Carlisle and served in their home on Wednesday night. Also, Mrs. Kay prepared wonderful lunches each day that were served at the Rhea Reception Center and provided by the host club. Ashley Bateman staffed the kitchen during each of those lunch gatherings.

## The Winners

## Open All-Age Classic

Whippoorwill Vette produced an outstanding performance that earned first place as he produced game four times in brace 5, which was run over the second hour afternoon course. He first had birds in a feed plot at 22, followed by additional finds at 35, 40, and 53. He exhibited excellent style each time he stood for the flush and shot and possessed the same style as he ran smoothly throughout the hour and appeared to always be where he needed to be. Also notably impressive was that he performed all of the above pretty much on his own. Larry Huffman, in typical "Larry

Huffman style," rode in front of the judges and trusted Whippoorwill Vette to do the task for which he was trained, with minimal instruction and also minimal scouting.

Touch's Fire Away won second place, with three finds, under the whistle of Randy Anderson. Although drawn to compete in the second brace, the placement was achieved primarily on the first hour morning course. The situation was that one dog in the first brace was picked up for an error, and the other dog failed to make the 90-degree turn that was necessary early in the first brace, thus never crossing the Buford Ellington Road. So, the second hour of the contest was run mostly on the first hour course. Fire Away had his first find at 6 near the south end of the Morgan field, followed by his second find at 35 and third find at 38. He then finished the hour by hunting a significant amount of time circling the Mary Scott loop. He ran a strong and stylish race for Anderson and did not require excessive handling or

Haney's Hurricane Seeker ran a good race for his amateur owner and produced two finds with one unproductive stand during his seventh brace effort. He had a find at 7 before crossing the Buford Ellington Road early Tuesday morning and the second find at 11 on the west side of the Morgan field. The unproductive came at 22 while moving toward the first Turner Road crossing. Hurricane Seeker, now 3 years old, was an outstanding derby and promises to continue his winning ways as an all-age contender.

### Other All-Age Entries

Bonner's Hot Rize was the top dog in the first brace. His owner, Jannie Chapman, was in the gallery while Korry Rinehart handled. Como Rain, owned by Doug Arthur, Billy Blackwell, and Rachel and David Russell, was the second dog and was handled by David Russell. Hot Rize pointed at 2, and Rinehart flushed. Como Rain made an error and was put into his harness. But later, Hot Rize failed to negotiate the

90-degree turn toward Ellington Road and was out of contention.

Southern Nation, owned by John and Susan Ivester and handled by Lefty Henry, was paired with the second-place winner in the second brace. He found no birds and was picked up before the end of the hour.

Southern Thunder, owned by Chris Campbell and handled by Tom Shenker, was paired in the third brace with Miller's Speed Dial, owned by Mick Marietta and handled by Randy Anderson. These third brace dogs hunted the second hour course, with Speed Dial having one find, which came at 19 on the west side of the Morgan field, while Southern Nation finished the hour but found no birds.

The fourth brace entries, using the third hour course, were No Strings Attached, owned by Dennis Buford and handled by Randy Anderson, and World Class Instigator, owned by Mick Marietta and handled by Matt Cochran. No Strings Attached was picked up by Anderson at 20 near the National Championship Road, while World Class Instigator finished the hour but had no birds.

Painted Owyhee Toad, owned by Bridget and Jim Ledington and handled by Bridget, was braced with the winner in the fifth brace. He ran well and had finds at 33 and 47. Additionally, he backed his bracemate at 35 and 40 and finished the hour under judgment.

Ascension, owned by Pat, Julie, and Ted Roach and handled by Korry Rinehart, was braced with Touch's Cocaine Blues, owned by Matt Griffith and handled by Randy Anderson. Ascension had an unproductive at 32 as both dogs continued to the last minutes of the hour, at which time a large bolt of nearby lightning and thunder ended the running for the day. Rain followed later during the afternoon and night, but running resumed on schedule the following morning.

On Tuesday morning, I'm Gallant, handled for Randy Anderson for owner Jay McKenzie, was the second dog drawn to compete in the seventh brace and ran with the third-place winner. He finished the hour and backed the unproductive of his bracemate at 22. When time was out, Anderson got his tracker and soon returned to the National Championship Road with I'm Gallant.

Late Hit, owned by Chris Campbell and handled by Tom Shenker, and Haney's Storm Warning, owned and handled by Chris Cagle, were loosed for brace 8. Shenker picked up Late Hit at 24, and Cagle asked for his tracker at the same time, resulting in the next brace starting at Kyle's barn on the National Championship

Road.

Randy Anderson had Lester's Stem Winder, owned by Don Hensley, braced with Game Surge, owned and handled by Dr. Fred Corder, in the ninth brace. Anderson asked for his tracker at 15, while Game Surge ran a strong forward race for the entire hour but found no birds.

After lunch, Chris Cagle, the owner and handler of Haney's Silver Dollar, and Randy Anderson handling Bonner's Bulletproof, owned by Dr. Chris Cornman, loosed their contenders. Cagle asked for his tracker at 41 and Anderson elected to pick up, as the wind was gusting violently throughout most of the afternoon.

Superstition's Jake, owned by Ric Peterson and handled by Brody Byrd, and Como Thunder, owned by Doug Arthur, Billy Blackwell, and David and Rachel Russell, went next. Byrd asked for his tracker at 26. Thunder had birds at 29, which David Russell flushed easily. No more birds were found during the brace.

Brace 12, the last of the second afternoon, also ended early. Dr. Corder had Game Heir, and Randy Anderson had Slick Water Frac, owned by Raymond Marlow. Game Heir had birds at 11 but became lost, and Dr. Corder asked for his tracker at 37. Slick Water Frac backed Game Heir at 11

but moved a few steps after the flush and was picked up.

Valiant Sunrise, owned by Adam Sprunger and handled by Randy Anderson, and Big N Wild, owned by Phil Witter and handled by Matt Cochran, were loosed on Wednesday morning at 7:45 for brace 13. Big N Wild had an unproductive at 52, but no birds were found by either dog during the brace.

Miller's Wide Out, handled by Randy Anderson for owner Don Stroble, and Nosam's Sweet Water, owned by Jeff Busby and handled by Larry Huffman, went together in brace 14. Wide Out pointed at 14 with Sweet Water backing. After the flush and shot, Huffman realized his dog had an injured pad on a front foot and picked him up. Wide Out continued but became lost, and his handler asked for his tracker at 27.

Brace 15 started at Kyle's barn with Rock Acre Yellow Hawk and Lester's Storm Chaser competing. Yellow Hawk, owned by Ric Peterson and handled by Brody Byrd, found birds at 5 and continued, finding no more game. Storm Chaser, owned by John Ivester and handled by Lefty Henry, hunted throughout the hour but found no birds.

The last dog to compete in the all-age competition was Misty Morn Masked Man, owned and handled by Joey McAlexander, the president of the sponsoring club of these Classics. Masked Man had birds along the side of Ames Road in the first 20 seconds after being released. He then had an unproductive at 32 and was picked up prior to the end of the hour.

## **Open Derby Winners**

Quail Woods Pine and Game Nation, respectively, the first and second-place winners of the derby competition, were braced together in the first derby brace. As mentioned, Quail Woods Pine is owned by Dr. Greg Adams and handled by Randy Anderson. Game Nation is owned by Dr. Fred Corder and was handled by Ike Todd. Each derby had one find and one unproductive during the brace, which was run mid-afternoon on Wednesday. Game Nation first had an unproductive at 28 almost immediately after coming up into

the west end of the Jack Harris field. After the unproductive, he hunted for a couple more minutes, advancing toward the Harris cabin, and pointed again. The birds flew, and everything was in order. At about the same time, Quail Woods Pine was pointed at the east end of the large field, near the Harris cemetery, and Anderson flushed, with all in good order. Both dogs handled well and continued to hunt until Quail Woods Pine then had his unproductive at 44. Both derbies were impressive, holding excellent promise to mature as good all-age competitors.

The third-place winner was Erin's Firehouse Waitress, also handled by Ike Todd for her owner, Gordon Jones from Draper, Utah. put on a first-class event. Plentiful stables are available for horses. Full hookup campsites are on site. A huge fieldhouse with plenty of dining space and a stocked commercial kitchen provides a comfortable place for gatherings. Their hard-working staff is on hand throughout the trial to handle any needs that pop up. It is truly a blessing to be welcomed into this heaven on earth!

The field trial courses on Conecuh Station have never been better. No expense has been spared to create the perfect grounds for big-running shooting dogs. Six continuous one-hour courses meander through the 4,000+ acres of gently rolling hills and ancient coastal savannah. Towering loblolly pines spread as far as the eye can see. The Conecuh River, which begins below the bluff in Union Springs, cuts through the plantation as not much more than a sandy bottom creek fed by crystal clear spring water. Magnificent White, Blackjack, Willow, and Pin Oaks are scattered about, making for easy landmarks through the courses. Water tanks are strategically placed along the courses for thirsty dogs. The Conecuh Station crew is busy year-round mowing, mulching, raking, burning, plowing, and planting feed strips. Miles of brown-top millet and love grass rows provide excellent cover. Bobwhite quail were plentiful. Every dog

had ample opportunities to show his stuff.

You can't have a great field trial without great judges. The championship was privileged and honored to have two well-respected bird dog men of the highest caliber adjudicate this contest. Mike Moses of Lake City, Florida, and Gary McKibben from Hernando, Mississippi, made the long trip to make the call.

George Cole and Faye Duncan were in the kitchen every day before daylight, preparing a delicious hot breakfast for everyone to enjoy. Ban and Allison Stewart served up some delicious lunches and a Saturday night wild game buffet that was superb. The venison tasted like filet mignon! Local musician Bill Brabham played guitar and sang everyone's favorites Saturday night. Steve Hutto was Johnny-on-the-spot with the dog wagon throughout the trial. "Hutto" always has a smile on his face and a funny story on his tongue. Brian Peterson and Lance Servais served as head marshals. A very special thank you goes out to Lawton Huggins for unselfishly stepping up when we needed help. Thank you, Lawton! The weather cooperated to the most extent. We got a brief rain one afternoon, but it did not cause any delay.

Claiming the Championship was Backcountry Bruiser, a 7-year-old male,

white and orange English pointer. Bruiser was sired by the very well-known 14x Champion Erin's War Creek. Bruiser hunted intensely, in the front his entire hour. What impressed this writer most was that Bruiser never took the easy route and ran down a road. He was always in the cover hunting. He also seemed to adjust his range according to the terrain and thickness of the cover. He would reach far to the front in open country and then shorten up slightly in heavy cover, always responding to his handler. He scored five perfectly executed picturesque finds along the way and finished big, going just as strong as he had started. Excellent breeding, expert training, exceptional handling, and advantageous conditions all converged to produce a championship performance.

Backcountry Pure Gold was named runner-up champion. Although Gold only had one find, it was a doozy. It came halfway through her brace. Standing on a big covey, she was polished and solid as a rock. Her unrelenting front running pattern in the cone set her apart from several other dogs that also finished with bird work. Gold is not quite 3 years old yet, so she likely has a very bright future ahead of her!

Both the champion and runner-up champion are owned and handled by Chris Catanzarite of Scenery Hill, Pennsylvania. Interestingly, both dogs were whelped by Catanzarite's female, Backcountry Tornado. That has to make Chris very proud. What an accomplishment!

Other notable performances were rendered by Rester's Powered Up (Cecil Rester), Southern Shadows Wave (Lance Servais), Pineywoods Showstopper (Darron Hendley), and Electronic Warfare (Bucky Street). A big thank you goes out to all those who participated and helped out in this prestigious event!
