UKC TEAM IN THE FIELD — An update from Domenick Muoio

The much-anticipated September issue has arrived, and you will find included in this publishing the American Field Hall of Fame voting instructions. As always, each household has two votes for *Person* and *Dog*. Last year, the voting process went very smoothly and was well received, so the process has remained the same. You will find the web address of the online ballot process in this issue (page 33), as well as a QR code. To get to the ballot, you may either type the web address into the browser on a laptop, desktop, or smart device, and it will direct you straight to the ballot. You may also use the camera on your smart device to scan the QR code, which should prompt you to follow the hyperlink on your device to complete the form.

Once you arrive at the form, you will be prompted to confirm your subscription status, and then you will find a list of all nominated parties listed twice each. Since each household is allowed two votes, you may select both instances of one name or select two different names. If the individual or dog you wish to vote for is not listed, there is also a write-in vote option.

In the shadow of the voting process, this issue also includes all the titles of individuals who will be on this year's Election Committee. If you were involved in the change (incoming or outgoing) of any listed titles, please let us know to ensure Election Committee ballots go to the correct individuals in October. Please also let us know if there were any issues with your Election Committee ballot last year (i.e., if it was forwarded to you or if there were any issues in the timeliness of your receiving it).

FIELD TRIAL SEASON NO. 149 COMMENCES Minimum Requirements for Field Trials

The new field trial season has begun, and with the start of No. 149, it is timely to recall the sporting tradition we share and our obligation to promote and safeguard our time-honored sporting pastime.

Last season's wins are in the books; the victories, achievements, and perhaps the disappointments are a thing of the past.

Much of the game, as in most sporting pastimes, is luck — the luck of the draw, luck of the weather, luck when birds are moving, luck when your dog is "clicking just right." It's been that way since 1874, when the first recognized trial was held in October near Memphis, Tenn.

Each new field trial season prompts optimism and enthusiasm. It is a new beginning, a fresh start. The advent of the 2023-2024 season provides an opportunity to review some pertinent items related to the field trial sport, among them the "Minimum Requirements," the basic regulations governing recognized field trials.

Club officers are responsible for ensuring that trials are conducted fairly and in conformity with the Minimum Requirements—their first and foremost duty. A list of these requirements is appended.

When the trial is completed, the results — names of the winning dogs, their owners, and handlers — are to be submitted to the United Kennel Club as soon as possible. Results received well after the trial (60-90 days) cannot be assured that the trial will receive suitable coverage. Trial results received six months after the conclusion of a trial will not be recognized. This is a great disservice to the winning dogs, their owners, and handlers.

• The No. 1 requirement is all-important for the recognition of a club's trial. The "Fixtures" columns carry the roster of upcoming recognized field trials. The name of the sponsoring club, date and place of the trial, and the name of the club official accepting entries must be shown in Fixtures at least 14 days before the date of the trial on the calendar at www.americanfield.com. Fixtures received well in advance will also appear in a print edition of UKC[®] Field.

All clubs hosting trials where placements may qualify a dog for championship competition are to publicize that trial with a suitable advertisement showing the date and place of the trial, location, time and date of the drawing, the stakes being sponsored, and the contact person (name, city, and state) who is accepting the entries.

• When owners and/or professional handlers enter dogs in a trial, they should provide full particulars (i.e., registered name and number of the dog, breed and sex, color, name of sire and dam) for their entries on the entry form. Club officials are responsible for forwarding the winners' complete particulars. Owners and handlers can assist them by providing specific information on each of their entries.

• The number of dogs competing in a stake determines how many placements the judges may award. In stakes with three dogs entered and competing, one placement may be awarded; in stakes with four or five dogs entered and competing, the judges may award two placements; and in stakes with six or more dogs, three placements may be awarded. [A fourth-place dog is named in a few select events, the Futurities, for example.]

• For dogs to receive credit for their field trial placements, they must be registered with the *Field Dog Stud Book*.

• All dogs (and all breeds) winning a championship placement (winner or runner-up) shall be required to have DNA on file with the *Field Dog Stud Book*. That requirement was subsequently extended to all dogs winning open stakes, earning points toward the Top All-Age and Shooting Dog of the Year Awards. DNA kits (instruction sheet, swab to collect cell samples, and an application form) are available and will be sent on request.

• Dogs earning Derby placements shall only receive credit for that win when that dog is registered with the *Field Dog Stud Book* at the time the win is awarded. (An application in process with the *Field Dog Stud Book* shall be deemed meeting this requirement.)

• When a club announces its trial in the advertising columns of UKC[®] Field and on the website calendar, the "order of running" is the prescribed schedule to be followed. Clubs are to adhere to the published "order of running."

• Following the conclusion of the trial, particulars on the winners (name, number, breed, sex, etc.) should be forwarded to the United Kennel Club as soon as possible within 30 days.

UKC[®] Field • September 2023

Any violation of the Minimum Requirements will result in the voiding of the trial and the placements awarded.

One last item pertains to the use of colored collars to distinguish two similarly marked or similar-appearing dogs. Custom dictates that the "top" dog shall wear the "red" collar and the "bottom" dog the "lime-colored" collar.

Minimum Requirements for <u>Field Trials for All Pointing Breeds</u>

As adopted by the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America, the United Kennel Club, and the *Field Dog Stud Book*.

Wins will not be recognized and recorded unless the trial and/or each stake in which such win is made conforms to the following conditions:

1.) The name of the club, place, trial date, and the secretary's name and contact information must be listed on the calendar at www.americanfield.com at least 14 days before the trials are to be run. Information received well in advance will also appear in a print edition of UKC^{\otimes} Field.

2.) Recognized stakes are:

Puppy Stakes: From January 1 to June 30 of each year for dogs whelped on or after January 1 of the year preceding, and from July 1 to December 31 of each year for dogs whelped on or after June 1 of the year preceding.

Derby Stakes: From July 1 to December 31 of each year for dogs whelped on or after January 1 of the year preceding, and from January 1 to June 30 of each year for dogs whelped on or after January 1 of the two years preceding.

All-Age: For dogs of any age. An "open" stake is one in which there are no limitations with respect to either dogs or handlers.

As defined by the By-Laws of the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America, an "amateur" stake is one in which all handlers are amateurs. Winners in Members' and Shooting Dog All-Age Stakes will be recorded, but winners of Children, Ladies' Brace, and other stakes not conforming to the foregoing definitions will not be recognized.

Championships, Winners' Stakes, and Futurities: Wins will be recorded only in such amateur events of this character as are recognized by the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America and in such open events as are recognized by the United Kennel Club and the *Field Dog Stud Book*.

3.) The minimum length of heats for all stakes other than Puppy Stakes shall be thirty (30) minutes on the basis of the time that an average brace takes to negotiate the course. In the case of one-course trials, no more than eight (8) minutes of the thirty (30) shall be spent in the birdfield. The minimum length of heats for Puppy Stakes shall be fifteen (15) minutes.

4.) A stake must be drawn no later than the night before the day the stake is advertised to be run.

5.) Dogs shall not be substituted after the draw.

6.) Braces shall be run and handled as drawn unless given prior consent of the judges, which consent must not be given for the purpose of accommodating owners, handlers, or dogs that are not available when reached in the regular order of the draw. In the case of withdrawals, the bracemates of such withdrawn dogs may be run together at the judges' discretion. Bitches which come in season braced with a male are scratched.

7.) No entry shall be accepted after a stake is drawn.

8.) No more than one brace of dogs shall be run on a course or any part of a course at the same time, irrespective of whether the dogs are in the same stake or in different stakes.

9.) Stakes shall be run only on recognized game birds whose flight shall not be impaired by caging, hobbling, wing clipping, brailling, or in any other manner.

10.) Bitches in season shall not be permitted to run in one-course trials. In multiple course trials, they may start only if, in the opinion of the judges, it can be accomplished under conditions which will ensure absolute fairness to other entries. Bitches in multiple course trials must be drawn in season and braced with a female.

Electronic Recovery, Tracking, and Communication Device Rules

The sole purpose of using the retrieval/ recovery device in a field trial is to assist the handler in locating a dog that may be lost and which is deemed no longer in judgment. The UKC rules, as adopted by the AFTCA for the use of a dog recovery unit in all recognized stakes, are as follows:

1.) The collar and receiver are to be used as received from the manufacturer, and the collar may not have any capacity to receive any communication or commands from the receiver other than its sole intended purpose to locate the dog. No modifications are to be made to the collar other than a name identification plate affixed. The collar must have a flat surface against the dog's neck. All components, including the collar, are not to exceed nine (9) ounces.

2.) Neither the handler nor the scout may have a receiver in their possession while their dog is under judgment. All of their receivers are to be given to the judges or a person designated by the host club.

3.) A receiver is any unit capable of receiving any signal from the collar, including but not limited to handheld devices, watches, and smartphones. The receiving unit must not have any capacity to shock, tone, vibrate, or deliver other behavioral commands to the collar. ALL receivers in the gallery, including those in the possession of the host club's designee, are to be turned OFF. (No one in the gallery shall "track" a dog while under judgment).

4.) No outside communication—no one shall communicate in any manner with the handler, scout, judges, or gallery members with any information obtained through the use of a recovery device while dogs are under judgment.

5.) A receiver may only be activated once judgment has concluded. If a dog is gone at time, that dog is still under judgment until such time as the judges indicate otherwise or the handler requests the receiver unit. Once a handler requests the receiver, the dog is no longer in judgment.

6.) If a dog is lost from a previous brace, the handler or designee may use the receiving unit during the succeeding brace solely for the purpose of locating the lost dog. Once the dog is recovered, the receiver is to be turned off.

7.) The use of a recovery device is at the discretion of the host club. It is the handler's responsibility, if they choose to use one, to furnish the device. The running of the stake shall not be held up due to the lack of a recovery device.

8.) While competing, a dog shall wear no more than two (2) collars. If a handler elects to use a recovery unit, the collar shall remain on during the entire time the dog is under judgment. Removal of a recovery collar during the competition will result in the disqualification of that dog.

9.) Companion collar shall be no more than two (2) inches in width and not more than five (5) oz. in weight, used as received from the manufacturer without alteration. The only addition is that of an identification nameplate.

10.) It is the responsibility of the handler to give the judge or club designee the receiver unit in the OFF position. A



violation shall be the disqualification of the offending handler from the stake; the handler's remaining dogs in that stake may be run by a handler of their choosing should they elect to do so, but the violating handler cannot participate in any way in the remainder of that stake and the dog in that brace cannot be considered for placement in that stake.

11.) Any person using a receiver to locate a dog currently under judgment must be reported to the stake manager immediately, and the handler and dog are immediately disqualified from the stake. It is the responsibility of the host club to report in writing all violations of these rules to the UKC no more than seven (7) days from the date of claimed occurrence. Failure to report violations can result in the suspension of the club's ability to host *Field Dog Stud Book*-recognized events.

It cannot be reiterated too often that it is incumbent on club officials to ensure the integrity of the drawing and that they apprise trial participants of the rules governing the use of electronic devices at recognized trials.

Field trial participants are advised to keep these pages for future reference.

PURINA AWARDS PROGRAM Awards Committee Meeting Minutes & Standards and Operating Protocol By Mark Johnson | Summerville, South Carolina | June 22, 2023

The Purina Awards Committee gathered on Friday, June 22, at the Hilton Garden Inn, Summerville, S. C. Committee members present were: Chairman Sean Derrig, Dwight Smith, Tom Griffin, and the writer Mark Johnson. Rick Stallings, Tim Ruff, and Mike Husenits were not able to attend due to health and/or family matters. Also present were Greg Blair representing Nestlé Purina—the sponsor of this extraordinary awards program, and Dominick Muoio, representing the United Kennel Club.

Chairman Derrig called the meeting to order at approximately 2:50 p.m. (EDT), and the writer distributed program material to each attendee. (Those unable to attend were mailed copies of all materials pertaining to this annual meeting). There were limited opening remarks, so the committee dove right into business.

Detailed review and discussion were held covering the 2022-2023 Purina Awards Program winners touching upon the success of each of the winning dogs, handlers, and owners. Mike Luebke and Dinora Wellmann provided the committee with exact point counts for each category tracked. Of note and reflecting accolades to this highly coveted awards program were the very close races for top dog in several categories. It was down to the wire as to who the winner would be. [Winners were announced in the July issue of UKC[®] Field.]

The committee reviewed prior year meeting minutes without additional discussion.

The committee then spent a good bit of time reviewing the "Standards and Operating Protocol" for this program, published in the July 2022 issue of the UKC® Field. As it pertains to the specific and comprehensive elements of the "Standards," the committee fully ratified terminology and protocol as published with very limited verbiage amendments. A good level of time was spent discussing the Professional Handlers list, included with the Standards and Operating Protocol. In general, the committee wants to ensure that individuals applying for inclusion on the Professional Handlers list meet the following criteria:

1.) The applicant has handled and competed with their own string of at least three (3) dogs over the prior three (3) years.

2.) That those individuals apply directly to the Awards Committee in writing. Their application should outline specifics confirming compliance with the preceding point. The intent is to ensure that those listed as "professional handlers" are such and compete proactively on the open trial circuit. Consistent with this area of discussion, the following actions were taken:

• One listed handler was removed from the list by request and with the intent to return to amateur status.

• Two applications were approved and will be added to the 2023-2024 list

• Two applications were denied pending meeting above outlined requirements

• And one handler name change will be reflected in the upcoming season's list.

Each of the above has been or will be advised directly regarding the above; additionally, the 2023-2024 Professional Handlers list will be adjusted accordingly.

The committee again entertained regarding the purported discussion dilemma involving the lack of sufficient professional handlers at several western U. S. trials and championships. While no obvious solution to this situation was fronted, chairman Derrig aptly reiterated that the Purina Awards Program and the obligations of the Awards Committee were to ensure that the program reflected a NATIONAL perspective. The concept of defining and administering a unique "western U. S." program would not be acceptable; likewise, redefining amateur points calculations and program administration to include amateur wins in open stakes would be inconsistent with the definition and intent of an amateur status/competition as far as the Purina Awards Program is concerned.

Moving on, the committee evaluated nine (9) applications for points consideration, two of which were reinstatement applications. All of these were approved and will be included on the 2023-2024 rosters published in the UKC[®] Field. The writer has communicated directly with each of these applicants.

Additionally, four (4) trials/ championships which had been listed will be removed from the approved rosters due to apparent inactivity and failure to report for two or more years. This wrapped up the formal agenda items for the committee.

The floor was turned over to guests Muoio and Blair. Domenick Muoio referenced current UKC ad policies and indicated the potential for an Awards Program link on the UKC website. Greg Blair then discussed some of the ingredients of the new and exciting AFTCA-PURINA sponsorship program, along with the program's operating philosophy and parameters.

The meeting was then adjourned at approximately 5 p.m.

Standards and Operating Protocol

The Purina Awards Program is sponsored by Nestlé Purina PetCare (Purina) and enjoys a long and extensive history of superior performances, recognizing handlers, and bird dogs in the field trial sport. The Top Field Trial Bird Dog Award (all-age) was established in 1963 and was sponsored by Ralston Purina. From the start, the Purina Awards Program was designed to stimulate interest in all field competition and recognize publicly the dog and handler which had excelled in a given field trial season. Over time, the program has evolved and expanded to include the Open Shooting Dog, Open Derby, Open Handler, Amateur Shooting Dog, and Amateur All-Age categories.

The primary role and responsibility of the Awards Committee is to administer the Purina Awards Program. This includes, but is not limited to, determining the manner in which the program shall be conducted, establishing a points system to determine the leading handlers and dogs, selecting trials where such points may be earned, and making determinations regarding other matters that may be related to the proper conduct of the Purina Awards Program.

The Awards Committee also carefully and consistently investigates written complaints-protest and/or negativity/ conduct relative to Purina Awards Program events. Misconduct will not be tolerated and will be addressed decisively. When appropriate action is needed, it may include but is not limited to loss of points, loss of eligibility to be named handler/dog of the year, or both. In all cases, when a handler chooses to compete in a trial awarding Purina points, they agree to compete under the oversight of the awards program. The same applies to clubs and championships that officiate approved Purina Points events.

Application for Recognition in the Program

In general, we are mindful that Purina Points trial status is not a given or automatically granted position. Purina Points trials must, in all cases, be reflective of premier bird dog competition, held on premier venues, showcasing top-notch handler and dog capabilities in a sportsmanlike and publicly appealing package. Purina Points trials and championships must also reflect baseline respect and appreciation for the MAJOR sponsorship contributions Nestlé Purina and the Awards Committee contribute to this significant and unrivaled bird dog awards program. Pertaining to new program applicants, an official application form must be submitted to the Awards Program recording secretary. New applications will be reviewed and acted upon by the full committee at their annual June committee meeting. Completion of an application does not guarantee approval. Typically, a three (3) year probationary time frame precedes approval.

Advertisement Requirements for Recognized Awards Program Events

• The Purina checkerboard logo must appear prominently in all points trial ads.

• United Kennel Club policy regarding the size of ads will prevail.

• Ads must appear in the UKC[®] Field/ American Field website well ahead of the start of the event.

• Judges' full names must appear in the ad. Judges "TBD" is unacceptable and can be cause for a club to lose points status. Likewise, changes in listed judges must be communicated to UKC and the Awards Committee.

• The starting date, venue, and stake particulars must appear in the ad.

• The Awards Committee must be notified of any and all changes to the running of a recognized and advertised Purina Awards trial via written/email notice to the recording secretary.

Standards and Protocol

• To qualify for annual points consideration, recognized Purina Awards Program points events must run a minimum of 16 dogs (derbies excluded). This standard has been in place for several years and reflects the program's intent to attract a broad event base reflective of the stature and prestige associated with the program.

Those approved events that are run but attract less than the 16-dog minimum must nevertheless report the fact that their trial was run, including submission of a running order (Open Shooting Dog stakes only) and the completed Form for Essential Data.

• All points trials must be reported to appropriate parties and the Awards Committee within 45 days of the event's conclusion. Points WILL NOT BE SCORED for clubs that fail to report results within 45 days of event completion. "Reporting" is defined as the submission of Form for Essential Data to the Open and Amateur Shooting Dog points tabulator-Mr. Mike Luebke-at trialpoints@outlook.com, along with a running order (for Open Shooting Dog stakes only) that indicates the dog's FDSB name and the handler's full name. Points WILL NOT BE SCORED for Open Shooting Dog stakes that fail to include a complete running order with their Form for Essential Data.

Note: trialpoints@outlook.com is the only acceptable manner to communicate results to Mr. Luebke and becomes the basis for his paper trail supporting his calculations. Open All-Age and Amateur All-Age stakes must be reported to the United Kennel Club in the traditional manner.

• Any change in venue must be approved by the Awards Committee.

• All dogs, handlers, owners, and club officials participating in approved Purina Awards Program field trials must be in GOOD STANDING with the *FDSB*/United Kennel Club. Additionally, clubs/ championships that elect to accept entries from persons/dogs not in good standing with the *FDSB*/United Kennel Club effectively relinquish their status as a Purina Points trial.

• All federal, state, and local ordinances apply to points trials.

• Failure to comply with any of the above points will result in a loss of Purina Points for that trial and may include suspension from the Awards Program.

Professional Handler

• Within the context of the Purina Awards Program, a professional handler will be defined as a person or persons who has actively competed in American Field/ United Kennel Club-sanctioned bird dog field trials for at least three consecutive seasons, with his own string of dogs numbering not less than three (3). • The following is a comprehensive listing of currently approved professional handlers:

• Handlers indicated in the abovereferenced list may be purged from subsequent years' listings due to inactivity in Open Shooting Dog Purina Points trials during the preceding year(s). Listed handlers will be expected to keep the Awards Committee aware of changes that would preclude their being listed.

• Consideration for additions to the approved professional handlers' roster can be made in writing and directed to the Awards Committee Secretary or any committee member. Such applications should indicate name/contact particulars

and kennel name, a summary of prior 36 months of handling dogs professionally, and a listing of Purina Points trials where dogs were handled as a professional. Consideration for additions will be at the committee's summer meeting.

Approved Points Trial Roster

• Annually, the United Kennel Club will publish a roster of approved Purina Points field trials-open, amateur, shooting dog, all-age, and derby.

• It is the responsibility of each club to confirm they have been listed.

Shooting Dog Points Calculation Particulars

• The 16-dog minimum prevails with a minimum of three (3) active professional handlers.

• For stakes with 17-24 dogs entered, there will be a minimum requirement of four (4) active professional handlers for points to be counted.

• For stakes with 25 or more dogs entered, the requirement is five (5) active professional handlers.

• In cases where the threshold number of professional handlers, as described above, is not met, points will be calculated at the level corresponding to the actual number of professional handlers participating. For example, if an Open stake drew 30 dogs, but there were only three professional handlers, points would be calculated at the 16-dog level.

Once again, these criteria are not intended to be burdensome or bureaucratic. Rather, they are specifically intended to reflect the prestige and stature of recognized Purina Points events by creating a more inclusive and broader base of competition in the shooting dog category. Club officials are most certainly encouraged to reach out to area professional handlers encouraging them to join their field trials with the intent to win but also ensuring that maximum points

thresholds are met for points calculation purposes.

• A three (3) dog bye brace limit will be in effect for awards recognition. Points calculations will be reduced accordingly for excesses. For example, if a stake drew 36 dogs, six (6) of which were drawn as bye dogs' points would be scored for a field of 33 dogs only.

· Awarding of Points: One-course trial venue will receive half points, while three (3) courses will receive full points based on the number of dogs entered.

The AYFTA had five youth trials this year with 86 total canine entrees. One trial was rained out. Next season, we have seven youth trials scheduled beginning in November through March. This year, the AYFTA had nine different youth handlers earn qualifying points toward Youth Handler of the Year. They came from Tennessee, Alabama, and Georgia. At year-end, only two points separated the top two points earners.

This was the first year for a new category of youth handlers for ages 12 and under called the Junior Division. Each youth trial recognizes a top dog handled by a youth handler in the Junior Division. The AYFTA put into competition a new revolving trophy in memory of the late Mrs. Pat O'Neall to be awarded annually to the Top Junior Division Handler. The first name engraved on the trophy is Hayes

Green. Hayes is a fourth-grade native of Union Springs, Ala. He took top dog awards in the Bama Quail, Shenandoah, and Central Alabama trials. In the off-season, Hayes also excels in baseball.

The AYFTA Handler of the Year runner-up is Reese Green. She, too, is from Union Springs. Hayes and Reese happen to be brother and sister! Reese received the Johnny Capps Memorial Trophy for Handler of the Year runner-up and will be awarded a \$500 scholarship by the Hartley Carter Foundation when she furthers her high school education. Reese earned her qualifying points by winning the Central Alabama trial and placing at Conecuh Station, Greenway, and Shenandoah. Reese is also the reigning Dixie Trace Youth Handler of the Year. Reese also makes time for her ninth-grade studies, volleyball, and cheerleading.

The 2022-2023 AYFTA Youth Handler of the Year reigns from Shelbyville, Tenn. This remarkable young man is only a fifth grader yet has raised, trained, and shown his six-year-old horse "Shiny" to not one but two World Grand Championship titles in the Saddle Horse Youth Division. He got into bird dogs on a quail hunt with his

The Field Trial Clubs of Illinois (FTCI) celebrated our 60th anniversary on July 8, 2023, at the Dog of the Year (DOTY) awards banquet at Hamilton's in Jacksonville, Ill. This event marked a significant milestone for FTCI, established in 1963 to promote and perpetuate field trialing in Illinois. The club's objectives include fostering high levels of sportsmanship and cooperation among various breeds, trial clubs, and individuals passionate about field trials.

The FTCI has continued to work hard for 60 years, collaborating with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) to develop and maintain seven class 'A' field trial sites across the state. The FTCI also provides an option for group liability insurance for member clubs. It provides a platform where sportspeople, dog enthusiasts, and hunters can lobby and have a voice in local and state affairs. The FTCI works with Quail and Upland Game Alliance (QUGA) for the improvement of habitat on both private and public grounds.

All that is required is an application form accompanied by a breeding certificate that has been filled in and signed by the owner of the dam.

These awards have been in existence for decades and are run in accordance with the rules of the UKC and AMFTC Constitution. Dogs in the Horseback and Cover Dog categories must run in three trials of member clubs to be eligible for points toward Dog of the Year awards. Dogs in the Walking and Restricted Breed Cover Dog categories must run in two trials of member clubs to be eligible for points toward Dog of the Year awards. Dogs must win a minimum of two placements at member club trials. Following are the dogs rewarded for their accomplishments. Thank you to all the owners, trainers, and handlers who have made it all possible.

Michigan Horseback Shooting Dog of the Year was awarded to Steller Wind, an English pointer female owned by James and Connie Cipponeri and handled by James Cipponeri. Steller Wind took the lead with five placements, including runner-up in the Michigan Shooting Dog Classic.

Michigan Horseback Shooting Dog of the Year runner-up was awarded to Crime Boss, an English setter male, owned by Will Langley and handled by Jim Cipponeri. Crime Boss took four well-deserved placements, all during the fall season.

Michigan Horseback Derby of the Year was awarded to Wicked Pursuit, an English pointer female owned by Sandy Maclean and Kelsy Hajek and handled by Sandy Maclean. Wicked Pursuit took four first placements as a puppy competing in the derby stakes, all during the fall season. Wicked is homebred and ran against many out-of-state contenders.

Michigan Horseback Derby of the Year runner-up was awarded to Windfall Mackinaw Straights, an English pointer male owned and handled by Joe Guzman. Windfall had a great showing for just being a puppy, running derby stakes. Windfall placed five times to include runner-up at the Michigan Open Derby Classic. A natural bird-finder, we expect to see great things out of Windfall in the future.

No Horseback Puppy awards were given.

Michigan Cover Dog Shooting Dog of the Year was awarded to Travel Alert. an English setter male owned and handled by Harold Holmes. Significantly, this is the fifth time Harold has taken this award with his dogs. "Buster" won with a decisive victory in the Northern Michigan Cover Dog Championship last October over an entry of 72 dogs from across the cover dog world, stretching from Minnesota across the Great Lakes to the East Coast. Buster had a grouse find at one minute into his brace, and another double grouse stand at 55. In between these finds a strong forward race that required very little handling. The finishing touch was that this spring, Buster finished second in the National Brittany Open Grouse Championship Association spring trial with an entry of 52 dogs.

Michigan Cover Dog Shooting Dog of the Year runner-up was awarded to Back Creek Lucy, an English setter female owned by Steve Graham and handled

by Richard Hollister. Lucy was steady through the fall and spring trials, winning or placing in four stakes. Of those wins, she took second place, with 27 entries in the Michigan Amateur Club's Open Shooting Dog stake in September; first place, with 32 entries in the inaugural Theda Langstaff Memorial Open Shooting Dog stake; first in the Beaverton Grouse Dog Club spring Open Shooting Dog stake with 38 entries and first in the National Brittany Open Grouse Championship Association spring trial with an entry of 52 dogs.

Michigan Cover Dog Derby Dog of the Year was awarded to Meredith Grade Penny, an English setter female owned by Dennis Keysor and handled by Scott Chaffee. Penny scored five placements over the 2022-2023 season, consisting of third in the Lake States summer Derby, with eight entries; second in the Lake States fall Derby, with 15 entries; second in the 32-entry Jack Pyler Memorial Derby run by the National Brittany Open Grouse Championship Association; first with 32 entries in the spring Dell Todd Memorial Derby, second in the Lake States Field Trial Club Open Derby and second with 23 entries in the Ruffed Grouse Club's spring Derby.

Michigan Cover Dog Derby Dog of the Year runner-up was awarded to Country Roads Acer ("Maple"), owned and handled by Chris Wasserman. Maple and Chris placed in four stakes in the summer and fall of 2022—first in the MAFTC Open Derby, with 17 entries; first in the National Brittany Open Grouse Championship Association fall stake, with 16 entries; third in the Bill Wendt Memorial Derby, with 27 entries and first in the Beaverton

Doc and Brent were consistent throughout the season, placing in five stakes and knocking on the door in the other four. Doc won first in the MAFTC fall stake with four entries; first in the MAFTC spring stake with 16 entries; first in the Kim Kinne Memorial stake with 12 entries; third in the 24-entry Lake States spring stake; and second with 17 entries in the National Brittany Open Grouse Championship Association spring running.

Michigan Cover Dog Puppy of the Year runner-up was awarded to Grouse Hill Princess, owned by John Capocci and handled by Scott Forman and Christy Helmes. Princess won two stakes over the season in Gladwin. Princess also took fourth in the spring at the Grand National Puppy Classic and second in the Venango Puppy Classic. Michigan wins included the Lake States fall Open Puppy with eight entries and the spring Beaverton Michigan Grouse Dog Puppy Classic with 20 entries.

Michigan Walking Shooting Dog of the Year was awarded to Faith's Maximum Justice, an English pointer male owned and handled by Ken DeLong. Justice placed second in the Kalamazoo trial, first at the Grand Valley Open, and second in the Grand Valley Amateur. Justice has been a tough competitor from the beginning.

House's Rain Cloud

Often, great dogs are overlooked for the election to the Hall of Fame. Due to the fact these canine athletes' life spans are short, and year after year, there is an infusion of these field trial performers becoming eligible for the Field Trial Hall of Fame. One of these great dogs is Champion House's Rain Cloud.

House's Rain Cloud (*FDSB*# 1403920) was a six-time champion and six-time runner-up champion; stud book record 37-74-387. Ch./HOF Miller's Silver Bullett x Judy Lyn sired him. The breeder of record was Buddy Smith (HOF).

House's Rain Cloud's championship wins were: Quail Championship Invitational (3x winner); Missouri Open Championship (winner and 3x R-U); Alabama Open All-Age Championship (winner and R-U); Border International Chicken Championship (winner); National Amateur Derby Championship (R-U); and Region 14 Amateur All-Age Championship (R-U).

There have been 59 champions named at the Quail Championship Invitational through 2022. Of the 56 HOF dogs invited to compete in this prestigious trial, 18 such HOF dogs account for 23 of those championships, and only five have won it twice. House's Rain Cloud is the only three-time champion in his six appearances.

"A LOST DOG" A Fictional Story By Tom Word

It was July 15, 2003, and Billy Culp was fixin' to turn loose for a workout in his first green derby of the season. He was training this year at a new place east of Lignite and south of Route 5. Twenty pointing dog trainers were working within a forty-mile radius of Billy, two hundred or more in the state, some serious pros, some serious amateurs, some just guys with a dog or two and a pickup truck.

Billy was a serious pro. He ran all-age dogs from his home base in Lee County, Georgia, where he had worked ten years after high school on a Yankee quail plantation until he got tired of saddling other men's mounts. An aunt died and left him \$50,000. He invested it in a horse trailer and three-year-old diesel dually and declared himself a pro. He had since been traveling the all-age circuit September through March, training up here July and August, fishing the Gulf April through June. He'd been married, then divorced five years ago, and was striving to stay single and ahead of his creditors.

Billy's deal for training grounds this year had been made with Frank Becken and his neighbors. Frank, great-grandson of homesteaders, owned and farmed four sections, some cultivated, some prairie pasture. It held enough cover and birds—sharp tails, Huns, pheasants—to make for good training. As a bonus, Frank had a vacant old cinder block bungalow with a working well and septic system that Billy and his helper Ronnie Blevins could live in. The bungalow lay east of an acre-plus shelter break, ideal shade for the 50-gallon plastic barrels to house the dogs short-chained to them.

Frank and his wife Becky had a 16-year-old son, Jimmy, who was autistic. He did not speak but was very bright, which he showed in many unexpected ways.

In October of the previous year, a pointer puppy, mostly white with a few orange specks on its ears, had wandered up to the Becken curtilage. It wore no collar, appeared to be about nine months old, and was thin and hungry. They tried to find its owner without success. It and Jimmy were soon inseparable. They named the pup, a male, Smiley, for what it made Jimmy do.

The Beckens had a quarter horse for Jimmy, and he rode it fearlessly. Without invitation, he began to ride with Billy whenever Billy roaded or worked a dog. He was not intrusive and, by watching Billy and Ronnie, quickly deduced how he could be of help to the training operation. At the end of the third training day, he had Smiley in a roading harness on a rope when Billy picked up the day's last derby to be worked.

By gestures, Jimmy indicated he wanted Billy to work Smiley, so Billy said, "Turn him loose," which Jimmy did. Smiley struck out for the front, hunting for birds from the first lick. He soon found a young pheasant, which he flash pointed, then flushed and chased gleefully. Billy smiled at Jimmy and gave him a thumbs up, which Jimmy returned.

Billy kept Smiley down a half hour, after which it was apparent the pup, now a derby had field trial potential. Wonder how he is bred, Billy thought. By the end of the week, he thought he knew, on the top side.

By August 1, Smiley was clearly the top derby in the string in training. He continues to mature and improve. His style on point was gorgeous, his gait fluid and light-footed with a cracking high tail, his speed great, but he did not outrun his nose. He always had finding birds on his mind. He revealed no obvious holes.

To have his field trial wins recognized, Smiley would have to be registered in the *Field Dog Stud Book*. Billy had no doubts Smiley would place in trials. Billy had already decided on a litter of pointers he had raised to claim Smiley a member of. He, like many breeders, always increased the number of pups claimed as born in a litter by at least one male and one female in enrolling a litter.

Billy, at lunch break, picked up at the Lignite post office a batch of mail forwarded to him by his mother from his box in Leesburg, including a copy of the American Field. Back in his dually, he opened it and browsed the contents. His eyes fell on a full page of text without photographs or a byline. Its headline contained the initials DNA.

He began to read it. Its message would revolutionize the breeding of bird dogs. No longer could trial dogs be misrepresented as to sire or dam (birth dates, the most often misrepresented fact, still could be, but at increased peril).

Billy wondered, could this lead to the discovery of Smiley's identity? And his next thought, if it does, will Smiley be claimed away from Jimmy? He would fight like hell against that.

On his drive back to Frank Becken's from the Lignite post office, Billy thought about the DNA announcement in the Field and wondered, if we send Smiley's saliva to the *FDSB*, can they determine who his sire and dam are, if someone has earlier sent saliva samples to the *FDSB* to enroll Smiley's litter?

Billy had a contact in the *FDSB*/ American Field office in Chicago. He called her and asked. She did not know but said she would try to find out. Billy thanked her and said he would call back in a few days.

Soon the end of August loomed. Billy called in his entries for the two trials scheduled to start Labor Day at Columbus, including Smiley in the two derby stakes. He pondered registering Smiley from the litter he had raised but decided to wait until after the Columbus trials.

Smiley was the stand-out winner of the first derby stake at Columbus. He scored two finds with acceptable fall derby manners and ran an ideal pattern with speed and hunting application. Jimmy rode in the gallery, accompanied by his parents. The joy on his face when the winners were announced warmed the hearts of all in the gallery; about forty riders, including a half dozen locals, the rest pro handlers and their summer helpers, and owners of other dogs entered the trial or trialing fans who had come to enjoy the show.

Smiley had gone down in the second brace when the second derby stake commenced. At the last minute, Billy decided to have Jimmy road Smiley at the back of the gallery during the first brace, then ride front for Smiley. Ronnie Blevins would scout Smiley. He was scheduled to fly home through the Atlanta airport from Minot the next morning to start his senior high school year in Albany.

Smiley shot to the front when released in the second brace and disappeared. Billy made a guess and motioned Ronnie to search right, then rode forward, hoping to spot Smiley. Both handler and scout were absent when Smiley came back toward the judges dead from the front, and Jimmy, the first to see him, yelled in a loud voice never before heard, "Billy, here is your dog," then blew three sharp blasts on his pea whistle, a gift to him from Billy just before the trials began.

Jimmy's mom burst into tears. Tears appeared on his father's cheeks (they had been riding right behind Jimmy). Billy did not hear Jimmy's yell but heard the three whistle blasts and soon rode in from the left front. He saw Jimmy's mom crying and was alarmed, then a judge called him over and explained what had happened.

Smiley won the second derby stake convincingly. Word spread instantly among the fraternity that Field Trials had a new derby rock star. Only slightly slower, word spread of Jimmy's first spoken words at age 16, "Billy, here's your dog."

Something else fateful had happened the evening of the day of Smiley's first field trial win. Billy sent completed forms to register Smiley from the litter he had enrolled earlier to the office of the *FDSB* in Chicago. Only Billy had to sign because he owned both sire and dam. Neither claimed parent had its DNA on file with the *FDSB*.

This action would allow Smiley to get credit, on the books of the *FDSB*, for his two derby wins at Columbus, albeit under false colors. And what would happen when Smiley won or placed in a derby championship? Billy contemplated that briefly, then said, "I'll deal with that when it happens."

Meanwhile, Smiley would be entered in trials as Lignite Smiley, James Becken, owner.

After the Columbus trials, Billy made a proposition to Jimmy's parents at the Becken home place. Let me take Jimmy down the road with me on the circuit as my helper and scout.

Jimmy had not spoken further since his call out to Billy during Smiley's race. Still, Billy was confident Jimmy could do the job, and the obvious joy he got helping work Smiley and the other dogs in the string confirmed that belief.

Jimmy's mom was reluctant at first, but a night alone with his father convinced her it would be best for Jimmy. Like all parents of autistic children, the couple was consumed by worrying about what would happen to Jimmy when they were gone from the earth or unable to care for him physically. While not without risks, Billy's proposition offered a chance for Jimmy to prove he could live independently of them.

Their first trial after Columbus was in Ohio, a pheasant trial with open derby and all-age stakes. Smiley placed first in the derby stake; Jimmy found him pointed twice, and he handled the pheasants with all-age manners. Then they were in Kansas at a wild bird trial on quail with derby and all-age stakes. Smiley placed second in the derby with a forward, responsive race and two broke finds. Jimmy found him pointed on the second near time.

Jimmy had not spoken again since his call out to Billy when riding front at Columbus. Billy talked to Jimmy on their drive from Kansas to Lee County about his need to call out when he found a dog on point. Jimmy nodded; he understood. This would be very important at the Lee County trial, the first piney woods trial Jimmy would attend.

They arrived at Billy's home, a trailer parked on forty rented acres adjoining Senah Plantation and containing twenty acres of pasture, the rest piney woods. Billy had kennel space for 20 dogs, an open-sided shed providing shade for horses, and dry storage for a few hay bales.

Billy supplemented his income during quail hunting season by taking hunting parties out to hunt over his trial string or providing his string and guiding services to shooting plantations needing extra capacity for shooting guests. In return, several of these allowed Billy to work his string on their hunting lands on non-hunt days and before the season opened and after it closed. Being a local and not a come-here was a distinct advantage to Billy.

For their first week home, Billy worked his string on three plantations. It was Jimmy's first experience in this terrain, but he adapted quickly. Smiley also quickly adapted.

Billy had been calling his contact at the *FDSB* occasionally about its ability to identify parentage from saliva samples when the names of both parents were unknown. He finally got this intelligence: only if the name of one parent whose DNA was in the data bank of the lab used by the *FDSB* could be supplied could (or would) the lab confirm that dog was a parent of the orphan pup whose saliva was submitted blind as to the other parent.

Billy had asked the hypothetical question; suppose I submit a sample and the name of the suspected sire whose DNA is on file with the *FDSB*. Will it advise me if my suspicion is correct? The answer was no. Only if the names of both claimed parents were submitted would the *FDSB* confirm or deny. Billy next asked if, in that case, one parent was correctly identified but the other not, would the *FDSB* tell the submitter which parent was incorrectly identified by the submitter? Billy could not get an answer to this question from his contact at the *FDSB*. This puzzled him.

The Lee County trial was next on Billy's circuit. It had a rich history, having been sponsored by the Moreland family and run on their lands for many years, headquartered at George Moreland Jr.'s Coney Lake Plantation just east of Leesburg. The trial was managed by Big George's son, George III, a professional trainer-handler affectionately known as Bubba. It offered open and amateur stakes in the Derby, Shooting Dog, and All-Age categories. Smiley would be entered in the Open Derby and All-Age stakes, his first in an All-Age stake.

He placed second in the Open Derby. Then in the hour All-Age, things got interesting. Shortly after his release, Smiley disappeared. Billy motioned right to signal Jimmy to search for him on that side of the course as he rode on following the course path, hoping Smiley would be found pointing ahead or would come back from the front.

In five minutes, Billy heard Smiley's bracemate's scout calling point and rode toward him to determine if the pointing dog was Smiley's bracemate or Smiley. When Billy approached, the scout said, "I was relaying to you your scout's call of point from in there (he indicated the direction by pointing). So, Jimmy had spoken for the second time in his life!

Billy located Jimmy, and he was sitting on his horse watching Smiley, pointed in a plum thicket and barely visible. But he had a single and stayed pointing stylishly when Billy flushed it, and the judge said, "saw it."

Billy said, "Good job, Jimmy!" under his breath to the judge as they rode to the front together, "That's the second time Jimmy has ever spoken in his life."

The next day, Smiley was announced the Open All-Age stake winner, making him half-qualified for the National Championship.

Smiley's next trial would be the Continental Derby Championship at Dixie Plantation the third week of January 2004, the only wild-bird Derby Championship and a hugely prestigious stake to win. Smiley and Jimmy were the talk of the field trial fraternity, and news of their win at Lee County spread quickly.

A long-time subscriber to the American Field Magazine was Harley Snead, a Missouri farmer who had been a quail hunter since boyhood. The reporter of the Lee County trial had included a paragraph on Smiley's mysterious appearance at Frank Becken's farm east of Lignite, North Dakota, in October 2002. The story sent a jolt through Harley.

The October before, he had embraced an adventure. He had loaded his hunting

bird dogs in plastic airline crates beneath the shell over the bed on his pickup and, with his fellow-farmer hunting partner, driven from Missouri to North Dakota to hunt sharp tails, Huns, and pheasants on publicly available lands. Included among the dogs was a green 9-month-old pup, a gift to him from his brother-in-law, a West Kentucky farmer.

While parked for the night at a motel in Fargo, his dogs had been stolen with their airline crates while he and his hunting partner slept in the motel. They had in the morning come down to let the dogs out to empty check cords to discover the theft. They had reported the theft to Fargo police, then driven home to Missouri, never to see the dogs again. The Field article he read about the Lee County trial, including the photos of Jimmy posing with Smiley for the winners' photo, made him wonder.

Rumors about how the new DNA rules would be interpreted swirled among trialers. Through the rumor mill, Billy learned that if the sire and dam of a dog in competition were dead, their offspring would be exempt from having to prove their parentage by DNA. Billy surreptitiously sold the claimed registered parents of Smiley to a South Texas supplier of truck dogs to hunting guides. He did not provide registration papers, gave a false name to the buyer, and insisted on payment in cash.

* * *

Lignite Smiley drew the last brace in the Continental Derby Championship. With Jimmy scouting, he ran a near-perfect race and scored three clean finds. Jimmy found him on the third, and Jimmy did not call out to Billy but rode to the course path, caught Billy's eye, then rode back to where he had left Smiley pointed, Billy following. Luckily, Smiley had stayed put (afterward, Billy would explain to Jimmy that this was too risky and again that he needed to call out, which he had done twice).

Riding in the gallery had been Harley Snead. While not a trialer, he had always wanted to attend the Continental trials and see Dixie Plantation. And he wanted to see Lignite Smiley. He had photos of the pup stolen from him at Fargo a year and three months earlier.

After Lignite Smiley was declared Continental Derby Champion, Harley approached Billy and introduced himself, then pulled from his shirt pocket snapshots of a white pointer pup with a few orange spots on its ears. He explained to Billy

and Jimmy the theft of the pup. He did not claim Smiley was that pup, but he saw tears on Jimmy's cheeks as the lad stood silently listening.

Billy said, "How was your pup bred?"

Harley answered, "My sister's husband bred him. He farms in Kentucky. The sire's name was Miller's White Powder. His dam was a Miller-bred hunting dog of my brother-in-law's."

Billy's long-held suspicion was confirmed. Billy waited for Harley to continue and claim ownership of Smiley, but he did not. Instead, he said this:

"My sister and her husband have an autistic son about Jimmy's age. I have seen what Smiley means to Jimmy. Good luck to you and Jimmy with Smiley. I look forward to the day he is named National Champion."

Billy impulsively grabbed Harley and hugged him.

"If you ever want to bird hunt North Dakota again, I am sure Jimmy's parents would like to host you and your brother-inlaw and your sister and their son."

"We will for sure take them up on that offer," Farley said.




