WELCOME TO 2022!

As the world is moving forward from the devastating pandemic, we wish everyone a safe and prosperous future with the opportunity for our exhibitors to be able to spend time once again with their dogs and friends. Please be sure to understand and observe state laws and regulations regarding the pandemic when attending events. Each state has their own set of guidelines that are required as well as the common recommendations from the CDC.

The year 2021 was a busy year at the United Kennel Club. UKC added new rulebooks, latest updates, and new clarifications to many of the Performance Rulebooks and Conformation. It is critical that UKC Judges stay up to date with any Rulebook changes or additions. To make these changes easier to find, a rule change insert has been added and is found on the last pages of the rulebook that details where the changes are found by Chapter and Section along with a brief description of the addition, change or clarification for a specific rule.

MOVING DOGS UP IN A CLASS

Please be aware that no club, Judge, or other exhibitor should ever tell anyone that their dog has completed a title, or to move the dog up. A club, a Judge, or another exhibitor does not know what points or wins are on a dog's record. They do not know if there are any invalid wins or, if they are trying to help an owner calculate their points if those wins or points are correct.

Moving a dog up to the next level is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor. If an exhibitor moves a dog up and the dog has not completed the requirements for the move up, UKC will not be held responsible, will not hold the club or other exhibitor responsible, and will invalidate the incorrect entry.

Should an exhibitor ask you to verify their wins toward their title, please feel free to let the exhibitor know they are welcome to check their dogs' points anytime through the UKC website. The link to the UKC on-line points check is found on the home page and is listed below for your convenience.

YOUR JUDGE'S BOOK AND YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

Judge's Books. Each Judge is responsible for the accuracy of the wins or scores that are recorded in the official Judge's book. Judges must keep copies of their Judges' books on file for at least one year following the event dates. Digital copies are acceptable.

- Reviewing Judges' Books. When judging has finished for the
 day, it is important for Judges to take some time to review
 their Judges' books. Be sure all placements are marked, all
 dogs have a score (with running time), NQ, or absent filled
 in, and any excusals or disqualifications are accompanied by
 a reason.
- Correcting a Judges' Book. By signing the official judge's book, the Judge is authenticating that the wins or scores and placements are accurate.
 - During the Event. All errors made by the Judge in the Judge's book during the event must be corrected and initialed by the Judge.
 - O After the Event. If a correction to a Judges' books is needed after the event is over, please notify UKC. All corrections to Judges' books must be made in writing with UKC and must provide the name of the club, date of event, event type, class, UKC number, breed and what correction needs to be made.
- Win Disputes. Should an exhibitor contact UKC and claim that
 there is an error in the official Judges' book, and the issue
 cannot be resolved, UKC will contact the officiating Judge for
 that event directly. UKC will provide a description of the
 claim and the Judge must check this against their copies
 of their Judges' books. It is imperative that a Judge
 responds to UKC within 10 business days and states
 whether a correction is needed or not. UKC will

make any necessary changes stated by the Judge. In cases where there is overwhelming evidence that a win is incorrect and needs to be corrected, UKC will adjust the records.

ALL-BREED SPORTS, CONFORMATION BREED UPDATES

Breed Standard Changes. The following changes to the listed breeds below are in effective as of January 1, 2022

- Romanian Carpathian Shepherd Dog to change groups from Herding to Guardian.
- Japanese Akita breed name to change to Japanese Akitainu
- Porcelaine: blue eyes are now a DQ.

GETTING READY FOR THE NEW YEAR

The All-Breed Sports has updated several event rulebooks with multiple clarifications. Each rulebook can be found on the UKC website. All judges should be aware of the rules and all updates for their specific activity and for the licenses they hold. Below is a quick overview:

Minimum age requirements for entry into UKC events. It must be noted that many events in UKC have different age requirements before being eligible to enter the specific event.

- 3 months of age and under 6 months: Non-Licensed class for Conformation Novice Puppy
- 6 months of age: Conformation, Obedience (including nonlicensed classes), Rally Obedience, Nosework, Dock Jumping, Precision Coursing Puppy Dash (6 mo. to under 1 yr.).
- 1 year of age: Precision Coursing, Lure Coursing, Drag Racing, Weight Pull,
- 15 months of age: Agility
- 7 years of age: Weight Pull Veteran, Conformation Non-Licensed Veteran Class

Rulebook updates. Clarifications and rule updates to some of the existing rulebooks are noted on the cover of each rulebook. For example, take the Official Nosework Rulebook: It has an "effective" date of January 1, 2020, but just below that date is an asterisk that lists a "revised" date of October 15, 2021.



Please be sure to check out all the Rulebooks for each event activity you are licensed to judge for any updates. If you are licensed for any event that has a *revised "date" on its cover, then it is advisable to review the updated clarifications. Updates and clarifications can be found in the Rule Change Insert, in the back of the rulebook.

PERFORMANCE RULEBOOK UPDATES

2021 Official Agility Rulebook. This rulebook was effective March 1, 2021 and had additional revisions that were effective on October 2, 2021. The March 1, 2021 rulebook was completely revised from the older version with new classes and opportunities for exhibitors.

The October 2, 2021 Rule Change Insert is located on page 40 and 41 of the Agility rulebook, and outlines the changes, additions or clarifications that became effective as of that date. In addition to the new classes and titles, some notable changes are:

- Age requirement has changed from 1 year of age to the current age of 15 months.
- Replacing Veteran with Minimum Jump Height, which is open to dogs of any age. Dogs jumping the minimum jump height will use the jump height of the division below their true height division and will have an extra five seconds added to their running time, working just like the Veteran did.
- Changing to make calling faults allowable in Intermediate.
 They may be called at the discretion of the judge.
- Clarifying that taking the correct obstacle in the sequence backwards (for example, entering the wrong end of a tunnel or taking a hurdle backwards) is scored as an off course.
- Correction added that no more than two obstacles with delimiting lines may be used on a course. However, these obstacles may be back-to-back.

2020 Official Dock Jumping Rulebook. This rulebook was revised and was effective April 1, 2020. No additional changes have been made to this rulebook. Please be aware that Dock Jumping is now fully under the management of the United Kennel Club and is no longer in partnership with Ultimate Air Dogs. This allows titles to be issued much faster and rules to be aligned with UKC principles. Any previous reference to Ultimate in a dog's title has been changed to Elite to reflect this change, and the division has now been renamed to Elite for future titles. The major change to dock jumping was the allowance of titles to be earned wherever the dog jumps. This allows the dog to earn titles in any division the dog jumps in on that day and at that trial.

2022 Drag Racing Rules. UKC is excited to announce the newly updated Drag Racing Rulebook. This rulebook became effective January 1, 2022.

Drag Racing Summary

- There are now more classes and opportunities to earn additional, and multiple Drag Racing titles.
- Inexperienced dogs will no longer need to run with dogs earning Champion points.
- All classes are Total Dog eligible
- Champion and Grand Champion point scale allows more dogs to earn points and competition.

Please refer to the 2022 Drag Racing Rulebook for all the new classes and changes now in effect.

2017 Official Lure Coursing Rulebook. This rulebook was effective May 5, 2017. At this time, the only change to the Lure Coursing Rulebook is that all classes are now eligible for Total Dog / Total Junior.

2020 Official Nosework Rulebook. This rulebook was effective January 1, 2020 and revised with an effective revision date of October 15, 2021. The October 15, 2021 Rule Changes Insert can be found on page 52

and 53 of the Nosework Rulebook. One of the main overall changes was the reference to "Certifying Official" being changed to "Judge," making the terminology consistent throughout all performance programs.

Additions to the rulebook for 2022:

- Addition of the Hall of Fame Awards.
- Toy Distraction required in Advanced level.
- Additional distractions allowed in Master and Elite levels.
- Time restraints added to when Handler Discrimination items can be brought to the ring and what happens when handlers are not present.
- Allowance for a Novice dog to make one incorrect call and continue to search within the allowable time frame with a fault.
 Second incorrect call will be a non-qualifying performance.
- Placements, Awards, and Ribbons given their own chapter.
- Qualifying ribbons are no longer mandatory and are optional for any trial.

Clarifications to the rulebook:

- Reuse of hide areas
- Running of trials and use of search areas
- Dog in White allowances
- Odor and hide placements
- Placement of boxes in Handler Discrimination

2021 Official Obedience Rulebook. This rulebook was effective January 1, 2021 and revised with an effective revision date of January 1, 2022. The January 1, 2022 Rule Changes Insert can be found on page 77 of the Obedience Rulebook. Additions to the Rulebook for 2022:

- Handlers will inform the Judge prior to the beginning of the exercise if they will be performing a sit or a down for the stay in Beginner Novice.
- Handlers will let the Judge know when they are ready to begin the Greeting exercise prior to telling their dog to stay.
- Pre-Novice and Novice dogs who tie in their prospective classes will perform any tie-breaking exercises on-leash.
- Time allowances and estimated numbers of judging per day.
- Qualifying ribbons are no longer mandatory and are optional for any trial.
- Requirement for clubs to include the new High in Trial Scoresheet with all trial reports.

Clarifications to the Rulebook:

- Eligibility of dogs in particular classes
- Handlers asking to be excused from the ring
- Entering regular and additional titling classes and All-Star eligibility
- Where the handler is allowed to stand for the Broad Jump exercise
- Leaving the dog for the Figure 8 and Down Stay exercise

- Scoring of additional sit commands
- Obedience to Odor clarifications
- Specifics to the Master and Elite classes

2020 Official Precision Coursing Rulebook. This rulebook was effective May 1, 2020 and revised with an effective revision date of August 24, 2021. The only changes to this rulebook were the clarifications of course designs for the Novice/Advanced, Superior/ Master, and Elite course designs.

2020 Official Rally Obedience Rulebook. This rulebook was effective January 1, 2020 and revised with an effective revision date of January 1, 2022. The January 1, 2022 Rule Changes Insert can be found on page 89 of the Rally Obedience Rulebook. Additions to the 2022 Rulebook:

- Qualifying ribbons are no longer mandatory and are optional for any trial.
- Removal of the word "directly" from Exercise 205 to reflect the handler taking one or two steps forward before facing the dog.
- Timetable added for schedule of classes and judging allowances.

Clarifications to the Rulebook:

- Handler asking to be excused from the ring.
- Exercise 409/410 using only three cones not six
- Entrance and exit for performance of exercise 418

2016 Official Weight Pull Rulebook. This rulebook was effective September 1, 2016 and was revised October 30, 2019.
